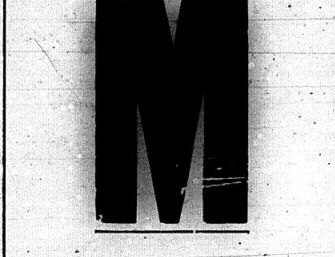

Don't Forget Items On Income Tax Forms

Whether the selected Federal income tax return is the "simplified" 1040A or regular 1040, many taxpayers forget some important items," Mr. V. E. Weitzel, acting district director of Internal Revenue, stated today in Louisville.

Some of these are: (1) failure to attach W-2; (2) no signatures; (3) tax information not readable; (4) failure to list dependents and exemptions; and (5) failure to total deductions.

What happens when the Internal Revenue Service

gets an illegible or incomplete tax return? Mr. Weitzel said this type of return cannot be properly processed and, therefore, will delay the issuance of any refund due the taxpayer. The results are that we get either a letter or phone call questioning us and, of course, Mr. Weitzel added, this

slows down the processing of legible, accurate returns. Mr. Weitzel suggested that the taxpayer review his return as soon as it is completed, put it aside overnight, then review it again the next day. After he is certain it is clear, complete and correct, he should mail it to the District Director of Internal Revenue, Box 60, Louisville 1, Kentucky. Checks should be made payable to "Internal Revenue Service." If it's a tax return claiming a refund, mail it to: Refunds, Box 1063, Louisville 1, Kentucky.

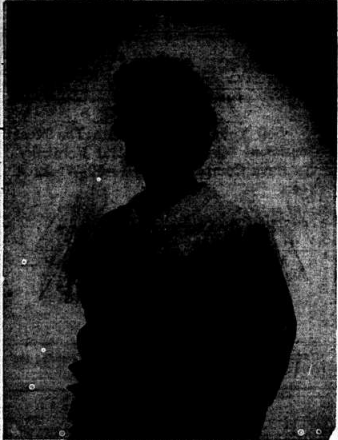

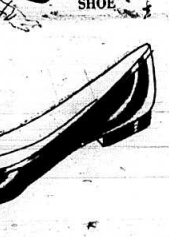
