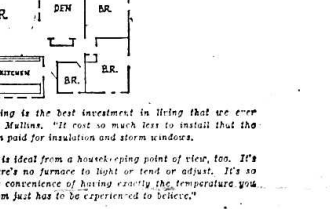

Precinct 7—Climax, voting at Climax. (No designated building.)

Precinct 8—Orlando, voting at Orlando. (No designated building.)

Precinct 9—East Livingston, voting at Livingston Jail, or within 200 yards of the jail.

Precinct 10—West Livingston, voting at Livingston School, if possible.

Precinct 11—Bullock, voting at John Nichols Store.

Precinct 12—Brown, voting at Quail School.

Precinct 13—Climax Broadhead, voting near Frank Dees property.

Precinct 14—North Broadhead, voting at Broadhead City Hall (Jail).

Voters are urged to make arrangements to learn the use of voting machines before the election.

Handcraft School At Renfro

Work is being pushed on getting necessary housing ready at Renfro Valley in which to conduct classes this summer for the benefit of area people, and especially those who cannot work at more advanced occupations. John Lair reported this week following a meeting on handcrafts held Friday at Renfro Valley.

Plans are being pushed to move in a sizeable working plant as soon as arrangements can be made. Lair said this plant will be equipped with special machinery for roughing out more quickly things which will be assembled and finished by hand in the homes of mountain workers.

Mr. Lair reported that many area people will be offered free training as part of the school, and at the same time, be paid for whatever they can turn out.

He stated the weaving and spinning instructors have been hired for and space is now being made ready for them and their classes. Materials are being collected in the woods for the making of baskets, work must be done at this particular time of the year.

Miss Lair said these plans are fairly set up. When arrangements are complete attention will next be given to bringing in someone to operate a pottery wheel, and teach the ancient art to persons interested.

Since very good grade pottery clay is available in this area it is felt that mountain families might, with proper instruction, be able to go into business for themselves on a small scale. Mr. Lair declared.

\$500 Loss At Climax

Food and other articles, valued at about \$500, were reported stolen in a break-in at Climax School over the week end.

According to Deputy Sheriff Tip Reppert, taken in the break-in were an electric pump, dishes, utensils, and considerable food, including three cases of apple sauce, five gallons of peanut butter and cheese.

Sherriff Trooper Johnny Sims and Deputy Sheriff Wayne VanHook investigated the break-in. The thieves entered the school through a window.

Sue Local Man For \$342,500

A Tennessee family is asking a total of \$342,500 damages in connection with a two-car collision near Bardonia.

The suit was filed in United States District Court last Thursday against Marvin K. Hines, of Mt. Vernon, and the American Republic Insurance Company, with offices in Lexington.

Area Close To Bomber Tests

Jet bomber crews of the Strategic Air Command began flying missions on February 16 against simulated targets near Berea.

Radar bomb scoring equipment mounted on an air Force train parked near the target will score the accuracy of simulated bomb drops by means of radio and radar signals.

The bombers will enter the route at high altitude beginning over Lexington. When the bombers arrive at a low level entry point in the vicinity of Prestonsburg, they will descend to an altitude between 1,000 and 1,500 feet and fly over a route 10 miles wide into the target. Upon approach to the target the bomber will climb to 5,000 feet for a simulated bomb run. The plane will then climb to high altitude over Louisville, Ky.

SAC planes making the simulated bomb runs will be B-47 and B-52 bombers.

A target and route selections have been coordinated with the Federal Aviation Agency. Populated areas of heavy air traffic will be avoided.

The RBS Express, designation for the mobile radar bomb scoring site, will inject more realism into SAC's training program, providing crews with a wider range of unfamiliar target and unfamiliar routes.

This will be done by moving the RBS site to a new geographical location 45 days to simulate new and different target areas. With each relocation, a new route terminating near the RBS Express will be implemented.

State Checks County Fishing

Walleye fishing this year should be good along the Rockcastle River, or at least State biologists think it will be good. They plan to move their checking operations to the Rockcastle River headwaters after several years of checking on the South Fork and Lake Cumberland.

Such was the gist of a report in the column "Cast-jig About" by Jim Eddleman in a Lexington newspaper last week.

Mr. Eddleman said netting, tagging and releasing walleyes has provided a lot of information in recent years, which possibly will pay off in better fishing in the future. The biologists get most of their information in the winter-spring runs when the walleyes come to the headwaters to spawn.

He said Rockcastle provided more good catches for fisherman last spring than any of the other headwater streams, so the biologists decided to move with the fish. Cumberland walleye fishing hasn't held up too well in recent years, he noted but Dale Hollow, which used to produce plenty of outside fish, is showing up well again this year. Most of the big ones at Dale this time of year are caught by live bait fishermen working off the sloping points in the upper end of the lake.

If you want to fish go to Rockcastle.

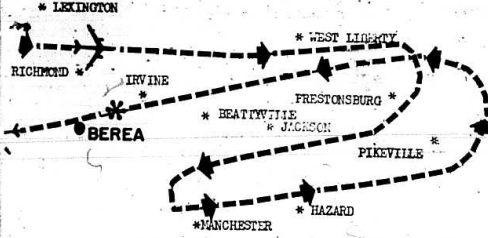

conducted against fixed sites under the code name "Oil Burner" since November 19, 59, and these will continue in use in addition to the mobile sites to provide SAC aircrews all-weather operational training.

The RBS train will carry about 65 Air Force personnel needed to operate the train and furnish other support. Civilian train crews will move the train between target complexes.

Each train has 10 cars carrying radar and communications equipment, fuel and supplies.

Electronics equipment aboard the train will be used to jam the aircraft's radar during the bomb runs against the targets. Bomber crews will use electronic countermeasures to overcome the jamming while attempting to pinpoint targets.

The trains consist of existing U. S. Army stock from the Ogden General Depot in Utah.

Tax Lists Now Open

Homer Hale, Rockcastle County Tax Commissioner, announced that the office, located at Courthouse is open from 8 a. m. to 4 p. m. for taking 1962 property tax lists.

A real estate, tangible and intangible property, with the exception of tobacco in storage, cash on hand and cash in out-of-state banks, owned on January 1, 1962, must be listed for state, county, and school tax purposes during the period January 1 to March 1. Tobacco in storage, cash on hand and in out-of-state banks owned as of September 1, 1961, must be listed during this period.

Mr. Hale emphasized the importance of all taxpayers giving a complete list and description of all their property in order that a complete and equitable assessment may be made.

The tax commissioner pointed out that motor vehicles must be listed as of January 1, 1962, the same as other tangible property, and that motor vehicles would be included on each tax bill along with real estate and other property. This is the result of a Court of Appeals decision last year which ruled the special motor vehicle assessment, collection, and lien law unconstitutional.

Description of all their property were assessed as of March 1. Tangible personal property includes automobiles,

trucks, merchant's inventories and equipment, tractors, farm machinery, livestock, and in the case of manufacturers, manufacturing machinery, raw materials goods in process and finished goods. The tax commissioner said household furnishings used in the owner's home are exempt; however, household furnishings used in furnished rental property are required to be assessed.

Intangible property for tax purposes includes bonds, shares of stock, notes (secured and unsecured) accounts receivable, cash on hand and cash in out-of-state banks, life insurance benefits, and other credits. The tax commissioner added that it is not necessary for owners of stocks and bonds to secure the January 1 market values

since he has this information available in his office. He also has a list of corporations whose stock is not taxable to the shareholder.
