

**Burley Cooperative Reports Good Year**

The Burley Tobacco Growers Association took a total of 8,381,141 pounds, or 1.94 per cent of marketings of burley in the five states it serves—Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia and Missouri.

The sales memoranda procedure, in effect for 20 years, is considered an important record system in the effective administration of marketing quotas for burley. A recent administrative order of the U. S. Commodity Stabilization Service directed the elimination of the sales slips, but the burley industry has been unanimous in asking that they be kept.

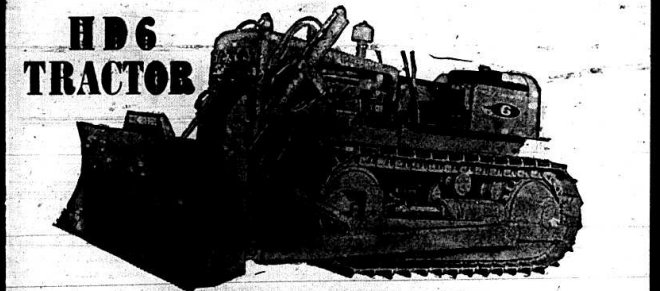

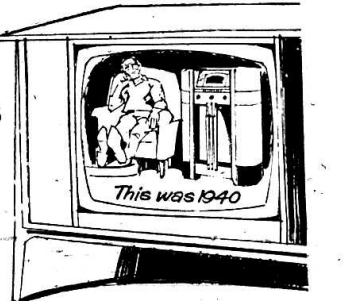

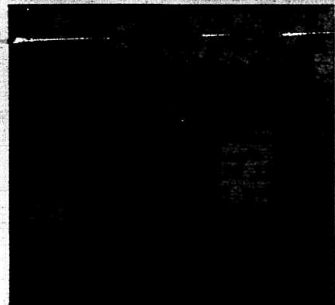

## Flood Leaves Many Homeless; Half-Million In Damage



GENERALLY Mt. Vernon escaped the water except in basements and this one house rented by Edmund Wilson on Crawford Street. Backwater here was caused by a clogged sinkhole.

### Red Cross Official In County For Survey

A deluge of rain over Rockcastle County Monday night sent creeks and rivers out of their banks and into homes and businesses in the worst flooding in 15 years. Damages in the county to property, roads, bridges and vehicles is estimated at about \$500,000. (An editorial on the flood will be found on Page 4 of this issue.)

The Kentucky Disaster File gauge recorded 7.87 inches of rain between Friday night and Wednesday morning, with 3.85 inches recorded Monday night.

Almost all areas of the county that were close to a creek or river felt the impact of the raging water. About 20 families were homeless Tuesday, or driven out of their homes temporarily. Some lost all their furnishings and clothes. Others lost part. Some escaped with flooded basements, and some escaped with no water at all.

As reports of damage to homes and businesses trickled out of rural areas, the American Red Cross sent a field worker from Virginia to check damage in Rockcastle County.

The representative met with local officials and promised to furnish food, clothing and shelter to homeless persons if needed. He reported also that other Red Cross workers will be in Rockcastle Friday to take applications for aid.

Persons desiring help should advise Mrs. Rudolph Burdette or Dr. John D. Henderson Sr. Residents may also contribute money to the local Red Cross Chapter to aid local residents.

Residents along usually peaceful and quiet Dix River and Roundstone Creek by far bore the blunt end of the swirling water. At the same time, Pine Hill, with no creek, had water standing two-foot deep in places.

### Craft Group Asks U.S. Help

Sponsors of a proposed handicraft center in Rockcastle County have applied to the United States Area Redevelopment Administration for a loan to help finance the project.

Whisman said his office is working with the project sponsors on technical details of the loan request and shortly will forward it to A. B. A. Whisman said the idea for the handicraft operation, designed to increase employment in the area, originated with the Rockcastle Association set up under his agency.

### Youth Charged For Stabbing

C. R. Clark, a Jackson County constable, was reported to serious condition Monday by Gibson Hospital authorities after being stabbed Saturday night by a man he had arrested.

Clark allegedly was stabbed by Ronnie Cox, 15, who gave his home as Mt. Vernon, after the officer had arrested the boy on a charge of being drunk.

The stabbing occurred after Cox had been put in the back seat of the constable's car.

Hospital officials reported that Clark was stabbed in the left kidney, in the back and twice in the shoulder.

### Pulp Boom Due Here

Lieutenant Governor Wilson Wyatt told Laurel County Friday night that they, and surrounding counties, are cutting on top of a future pulpwood-industry boom.

He said pulpwood will pour from the area in May upon completion of a \$3,700,000, nine-mile branch railroad line in Tennessee.

Wyatt said the rail line, to serve Bowater Southern Paper Corporation, "will be exactly the same as putting a pulp-using industry in Southeastern Kentucky."

A trickle of pine pulpwood now moves out of six South-eastern Kentucky counties via the Louisville & Nashville Railroad system. Wyatt said Laurel County is 64 percent forest. Other counties that will benefit from the new line are Knox, Jackson, Clay, Rockcastle, and Whitley.

Citing figures released Friday by Business Week magazine, Wyatt said that personal income in Kentucky is up almost 8 percent for 1961.

Brodhead became the first county "victim" of the 46th District Basketball Tournament Monday night when host team Memorial High School downed the Tigers 45-44 in the first game of the series.

### County Court Held Monday

Judge C. C. Carter held Monday at 10 a. m. in the County Court building in Paducah, Ky. Cases on the docket.

Judge Carter reported he will hold court the fourth Monday of each month, and it cases will be heard by a jury.

In action Monday, Ralph Rutherford, Jr., and Hobbs Randall, both of Paducah County were fined \$50 and given 30 days in jail on a charge of possession of intoxicating liquor in a local option territory.

Robert Rowe, of Mt. Vernon, was fined \$50 and given 30 days in jail on a charge of possession of intoxicating liquor in a local option territory. A motion was made to appeal the case to Circuit Court.

Dewey Lee McClure, of Livingston, was fined \$20 and given 30 days in jail on a charge of possession of intoxicating liquor for the purpose of sale.

Mellie and Charles Shaffer of Brodhead, were fined \$5 each on a charge of failure to send minor children to school. Judge Carter suspended the sentence if the defendants start sending their children to school. Judge Carter said if the children fail to attend school, the children will be sent to a state correctional institution.

A 14-year-old Brodhead youth will be sent to Kentucky Village until he is 17 for failure to attend school. Judge Carter reported he had repeatedly warned the boy about attending school.

A child absent from school for three days without an excuse constitutes a violation of the attendance law.

Several children at Livingston Grade and High School who rode the school bus along US 25 south had to remain in Livingston homes overnight. School attendance generally showed a drop Monday at 11 schools.

Officials familiar with the actions of "Old Man River" said Monday night's rain of 3.85 inches, on top of ground soaked with 1.60 inches Sunday and 1.40 on Friday were the culprits behind the abnormal flooding that brought the highest water to Rockcastle since 1947.

At Livingston, water reached the bottom of cottages on the L & N Bridge, or some 50 feet above the normal river level.

At that, the water was a eight inches below the 1947 flood at Livingston, but four feet below the 1947 flood level at Lanesboro, proving that the bulk of water this year came from Roundstone Creek and its tributaries.

At Brodhead, peaceful Dix River became a raging torrent almost without warning. Water from Negro Creek, closed US 150 for a time. Water was lapping at store fronts in downtown Brodhead. Northwest of Brodhead the home of Buster Northern was swept about a quarter of a mile downstream, destroying the house and contents, and leaving the five in the Northern family homeless. The family escaped uninjured before the flash flood occurred.

State Police were called to rescue Mrs. Clyde Le FEVER, who was trapped in her home near Brodhead.

The L & N cancelled trains on the Berea - Corbin line for a time as water threatened to cover the tracks at Brush Creek and Livingston. KU reported one pole down. The Kentucky Telephone Company reported a line down.

IN THE DISTANCE is the home of Charlie Carpenter. Sand Hill Road, south of Livingston, covered with water about noon Monday. The water eventually was up to the eaves. The Carpenter family moved out before the river came into the house.

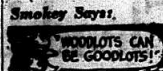
Feed Grain Program Regulations Listed

What will participation in the 1962 feed grain program mean to farmers who grow 25 acres or less of corn and grain sorghum? Farmers can divert the entire acreage to soil conserving crops and get a payment based on 50 to 60 percent of the normal yield for the farm. To participate in the program they must divert 20 percent of their base acreage. For example, the farmer who grows 18 acres would have a minimum diversion of 3.6 acres and a maximum of the total 18 acres. Farmers who grow between 25 and 100 acres will have a minimum diversion of 20 percent and a maximum of 20 acres plus 20 percent of the base acreage.

## Flood Shows Need For A Dam

Monday morning hundreds of residents of Rockcastle County got up to find property underwater and untold damage from some of the worst flooding in the county's history.

It is estimated that losses in the county to homes, furnishings, vehicles, stock, land-washing, bridges and roads will run somewhere in the neighborhood of half a million dollars.

A great portion of the damage done was along normally quiet Rockcastle County that runs from Livingston through Brush Creek, Orlando, Hummel, Wildie and Roundstone. When this great surging water reached the Livingston area where it joined the Rockcastle River to the east of town, the Rockcastle began to rise to a point near the 1947 high water mark. By 1 p. m., Monday, busy, tourist-travelled US 25 was blocked and was to remain that way for about 12 hours, causing hopeless tangles of traffic and re-traffic.

Bob Waddle, Livingston city clerk, who has kept reports on the river's temperament for many years, came up with startling figures.

The high water mark at Livingston was eight inches below the 1947 mark. But at Lamero, several miles up the river from Livingston, the high water mark was four feet under the 1947 mark.

These figures prove that the great portion of water at Livingston and down river came from Roundstone Creek.

It also points out that if the water in the Rockcastle River above Livingston and in the area of Lamero, Parker's Creek and Jackson County had been controlled, the river channel could have moved Roundstone Creek water out of the area at a considerable faster rate, and thereby reduced the property losses.

We have never seen a more obvious talking point for

a dam above Livingston. Such a dam would have controlled Rockcastle River water. A dam at the narrows, it seems to us, would have only intensified the flooding at Livingston and above. If the Narrows were dammed, where would all that water go in an emergency?

We hope the United States Army Corps of Engineers will make a close study of this recent situation and put a dam in a location that will prevent the recurrence of such a disaster.

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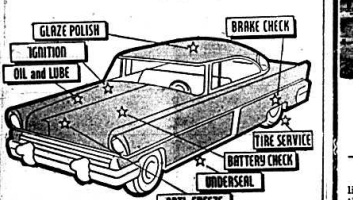
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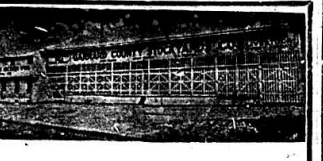
