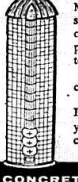

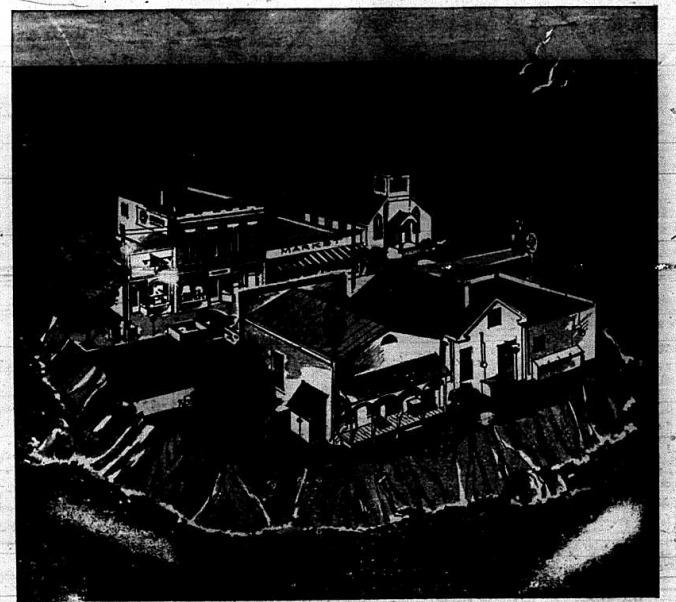

Burley Quota Circuit Court Opens Monday Wins Again

Preliminary returns from growers indicate a 99.2 percent approval of continuing marketing quotas for the next three years on burley tobacco; 88.8 percent approval of quotas for the same period on Virginia sun-cured and 86.1 percent rejection of quotas on cigar-filler Type B tobacco.

This means that marketing quotas will be in effect on the 1962, 1963, and 1964 crops of burley and Virginia sun-cured tobacco but not on Type B cigar filler tobacco, which is grown primarily in Pennsylvania.

Figures on the three referendums (preliminary) are: burley, 173,857 voted in favor of quotas, 1,577 against, with a total of 175,434 votes; sun-cured, 1,252 voted in favor, 16 against, with a total of 1,268 votes.

Although your Congressman voted against it because it was the only measure offered to us, yet he knew then as he knows now that this bill would not even begin to solve our problems. Not one step has been taken in Southeastern Kentucky to implement this law. Not one industry has been lured our way through this depressed area legislation. The law does not put the jam on the lower shelf where we can reach it.

"A much better plan was the one offered by your Congressman to give a tax incentive to industries locating in depressed areas. Such a plan would have cost the taxpayers nothing and would have created no bureaucracy. It was so simple that the 'braintrust' abhorred it like Naaman abhorred taking seven dips in the Jordan River. Too simple! Yet it has some real jam for the lower shelf of our economy."

While State Snoozes

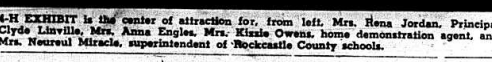
Renfro Valley, Ky. — The Bluegrass country is cold and brown in the winter.

Night comes early and the horses are taken inside to sleep in heated barns. The farmers sit around pot-bellied stoves and pass the time with a banjo and a jug and sometimes a bit of talk. Not many visitors in the winter. Not much to do, either.

Here in Rockcastle county the biggest event of the week is the Saturday night show in a little room on the map called Renfro Valley. McEburn and a recording studio on U. S. highway 26, about 50 miles south of Lexington,

Ten years ago they flocked to this place like pilgrims to the shrine—not just from the nearby Bluegrass towns, but from all over the nation. They came for the country music and the All-Day Sings and to get a look at the Old Kentucky Fiddlers. They'd heard so often on their radios at home. It got so big that 15,000 people showed up one summer Saturday night, and a national magazine sent down a team of cameras to record the scene for posterity.

Now perhaps 15,000 will show up. They come down from Preshersville, and from places like Egypt and Shoupsville, across the mountains. Not many from out of state. Not even enough to justify using the barn, which

Name County Disaster Area

Pres. John F. Kennedy designated 34 Kentucky counties as disaster areas Monday, including Rockcastle.

The number was 10 more than asked for by Gov. Bert Combs.

The action makes the counties eligible for federal aid in repairing damage done by floods during the past two weeks.

Governor Combs asked the president to declare 16 counties eligible for the federal aid. Rockcastle was not included in the 16. But the president apparently took a look at reports of damage and added 10 to the list, including Rockcastle.

(An editorial on federal aid to Rockcastle is on Page 3 of this issue.)

Combs, who visited the White House with a Kentucky delegation that included two of the state's congressmen, announced the presidential declaration.

Other counties may be added to the list later, Combs said, if they file the proper reports showing heavy damage by high water. The Governor estimated damage from floods in his state so far as \$400,000,000, including \$80,000,000 to roads alone.

Representative John Combs, who accompanied the Governor to the White House, said he was "delighted" to have turned out that way.

Representative Carl Perkins, Hindman Democrat, also in the group, said "I feel every confidence the President will exercise all means under the law to be helpful" to Kentucky.

Mayor Paul Jud of Frankfort who accompanied the Governor here, said "now we can go to the other agencies and tell them what we need."

Combs said Kennedy acted more quickly than he had hoped in designating as major.

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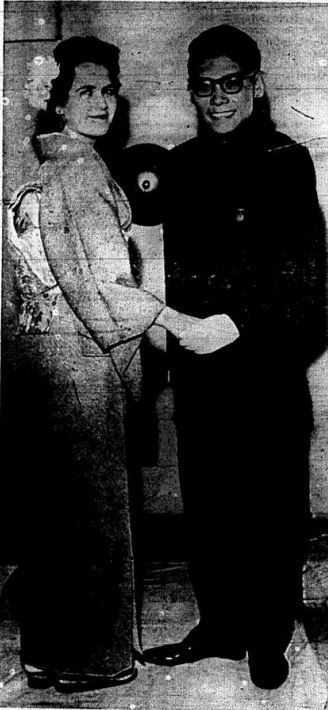
