## Site Change For Price Trial

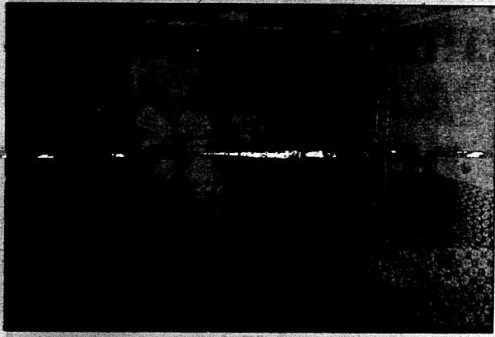

## Public Works Funds Requested

President John F. Kennedy asked Congress Monday to approve a hurry-up \$800,000,000 public-works program for depressed areas and other communities suffering from high unemployment.

The proposal involves expenditures of \$350,000,000 during the next fiscal year. It was presented to the House Public Works Commission as an amendment to the President's request for a two-billion-dollar stand-by public-works program to combat future recessions.

Administration spokesmen denied that the \$800,000,000 proposal carried with it any implied criticism of the area-development program authorized by Congress last year to deal specifically with areas of severe and persistent unemployment. Rockcastle County is designated (Continued on page 4)

Dr. Walter W. Heller, chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers, told the committee that his new proposal would cover many projects

also in line for the new funds would be communities in 34 states not now official-

ly designated as depressed areas, but which have had an unemployment rate of 6 percent or more over the past year. Louisville and Owensboro were specifically mentioned in this regard by Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg, who followed Heller to the witness table.

Both proposals drew fire from Republicans, but the outlook for the immediate future looks brighter than for the two-billion-dollar standby authority, which was attacked by G. O. P. committee members as an attempt to bypass the House Appropriations Committee.

The two billion dollars would be taken for money appropriated, but not yet obligated by Congress, to a specific project.

The President said construction projects under his immediate program would be limited to those which could be initiated or accelerated within a reasonably short time and completed 12 months later.

The program would finance such State and local projects as water-supply improvement, sewage systems, modernization of public buildings, and port improvements. Also included would be conservation activities to improve public land; water, fish and wildlife resources, and the construction or improvement of federal laboratories and other public buildings.

Under the proposal, funds could be allocated to federal capital-improvement projects in eligible areas and for grants and loans to States and localities for improving community facilities.

The federal payment could go as high as 50 percent of a project's costs, and even higher in exceptional cases.

### Final Selling Date

March 31 is the final date for selling wool and unshorn lambs if the producer intends to file an application for a government incentive payment for the 1961 wool marketing year, according to R. O. Wilson, chairman of the Kentucky ASC Committee.

Wilson urged sheep producers who sold wool or unshorn lambs during the 1961 marketing year, which began on April 1, 1961 and ends on March 31, 1962, to file their bills of sales with the local ASC County Offices before April 30.
