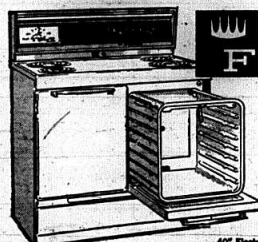

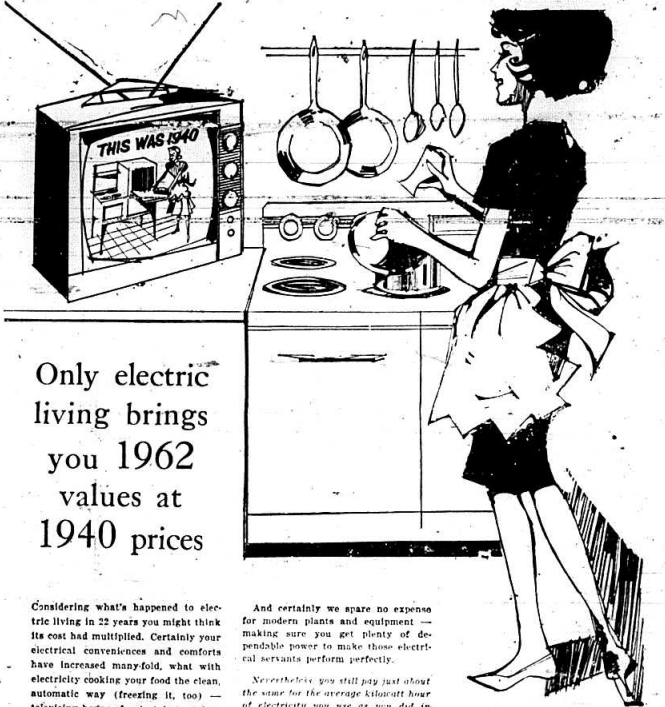

County Gets \$199,000 For Roads

The completion with blacktop of the Brodhead-Conway Road has been scheduled for this year by the State Highway Department, according to a letter from Ted Marston, commissioner of roads and highways, to Clell Pike, of Livingston.

The stretch is 4.2 miles and will connect US 23 and US 150.

Also approved by the department was blacktop of the Negro Creek-Brodhead Road, 2.6 miles.

Cost of the two projects is estimated at \$199,000. Bids will be taken for the construction.

In the case of both projects, the road will be adequate drainage and the placement of salt stabilized surface. This type of blacktop will be used on the surface, the letter stated.

Some 12 other projects of road improvement in Rockcastle County roads will get underway as soon as weather permits, the State Highway Department announced.

The number of projects may be increased later, the department reported.

Work on the roads will include patching, stretches of reconstruction, and a sealer coat for protection from the weather.

Roads to be repaired are as follows:

- Sand Springs Road, 2.5 miles, from South Mt. Vernon city limits to end of the highway.
- Brodhead-Conway Road, 5 miles from southwest of US (Continued on page 4)

Housing Survey Figures Told

A survey of housing units in Rockcastle County, as well as other facilities and services, has been announced by the United States Department of Commerce, Washington, D. C.

The department came up with the following figures:

The 1960 Census on Housing counted 3,597 housing units in Rockcastle County. Of these, 770 were in sound condition with all plumbing; 3,304 were occupied; 2,330 were occupied by owners; less than 35,000 are the medium value of owner-occupied places; 974 were occupied by renters; and 430 were the medium gross rent of rented establishments.

In 1960, a total of 1,032 had hot and cold running water; 925 flush toilets; 937 bathtubs or showers; 654 basements; four trailer homes; 46 households had air conditioning; 1,385 had radios; 2,887 had radios; 724 had telephones (now 1,107); 2,778 washing machines; 108 clothes dryers; 322 had one or more home food freezers; 1,885 had one automobile; 238 had two or more autos.

Detailed information on housing for the state, cities, and counties is presented in series HCL No. 19, Kentucky, and sold for \$1.25 by the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C.

14 PROJECTS SLATED BY STATE

The stretch is 4.2 miles and will connect US 23 and US 150.

Also approved by the department was blacktop of the Negro Creek-Brodhead Road, 2.6 miles.

Cost of the two projects is estimated at \$199,000. Bids will be taken for the construction.

In the case of both projects, the road will be adequate drainage and the placement of salt stabilized surface. This type of blacktop will be used on the surface, the letter stated.

Some 12 other projects of road improvement in Rockcastle County roads will get underway as soon as weather permits, the State Highway Department announced.

The number of projects may be increased later, the department reported.

Work on the roads will include patching, stretches of reconstruction, and a sealer coat for protection from the weather.

Roads to be repaired are as follows:

- Sand Springs Road, 2.5 miles, from South Mt. Vernon city limits to end of the highway.
- Brodhead-Conway Road, 5 miles from southwest of US (Continued on page 4)

FISCAL COURT HEARS OFFICIALS

There will be \$216,394 in the Rockcastle County rural and secondary road fund in the current 1962-63 fiscal year about the same as last year.

A total of \$199,394 of this amount will be furnished by the state, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court was told at its meeting Tuesday by Dave Hacker, State Highway Department engineer, and John Stangell, assistant engineer.

The remaining \$17,000 will be turned over through the county budget. Destined to be spent will be about \$12,000 for a pavement on all-terrain \$44,000 in road machinery purchased about two years ago.

Of the \$199,394, the state will spend \$162,452 under the gasoline tax allocation. A total of \$36,941 will come from the \$66.3 million dollar appropriation for county roads. The \$199,394 comes from the state reported.

The court also voted to put three acres of land on Red Hill Church to Claude Gilliam's Store under the state's 1962-63 fiscal year. The stretch of road is about three miles and is set up for reconstruction, and eventually, blacktop.

The state agreed at the meeting to discuss this road with the idea of making it a part of the 1963-64 program.

In other action, the court amended the county budget \$2,935.50 to make a payment on its 1962-63 program.

It also looked at the salary of Community Clerk Jesse Hurley and raised his salary \$20 a month.

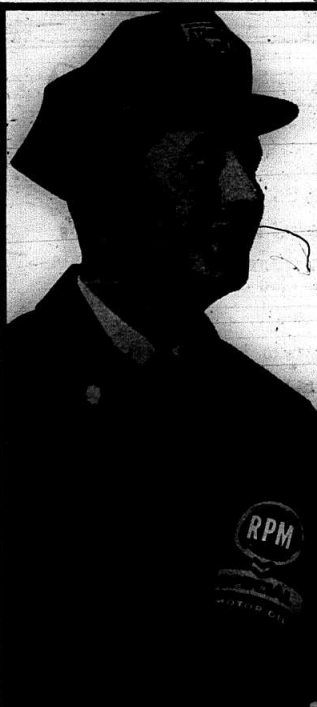
