## Town's Unsightly Areas Catches City Council's Eye

### ALSO APPROVE SEWER LOAN

Unsightly, unsanitary and undesirable areas in Mt. Vernon may be the subject of considerable discussion, and possible legal action, in the future.

At least the Mt. Vernon City Council spent considerable time discussing undesirable areas at its meeting Thursday night.

The council also timed out to accept a \$380,000 loan recently approved by the Federal Housing and Home Administration (Community Facilities Administration) for the construction of a sewer system in Mt. Vernon and authorized City Atty. John Allen and Engineer Jack Crawford to draw up the necessary papers to forward to the federal agency.

The approval of the loan came as no surprise since the council had agreed earlier to build a sewer system if the federal government would loan the city the money of a three and three-eighths percent interest rate.

Voting Thursday night in favor of accepting the loan were the following councilmen: Willis Craig, William I.

Norton, David McCauley and Kenneth Cummins. Councilmen Floyd Owens and Russell "Burdick" were absent from the meeting.

The council was told at the meeting it would take until September to complete plans and specifications for the sewer system, and that actual construction work would have to begin after that time.

Under these circumstances, and due to the lateness of the year, it will probably be the spring of 1963 before work actually begins.

The discussion of the sewer system, which will eliminate many of the city's sewage problems, brought on the discussion of other types of unsightly areas in the town, including dumping areas, hog pens, and outside toilets.

Mrs. Craig also reported that Mrs. Laura Hotland is chairman at Livingston, and Mrs. Carol Jean Riddle at Broadhead.

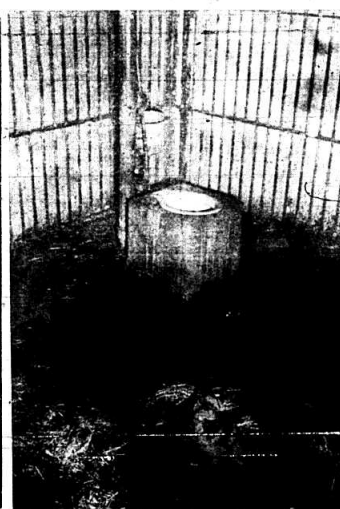

Marcum pointed out that every individual, single or married and not living with husband or wife, who had a gross income of \$1,200 or more in 1961 must file, except individuals 65 years of age or older, who must file if they had a gross income of \$2,400 or more.

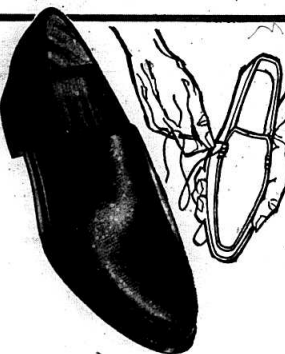

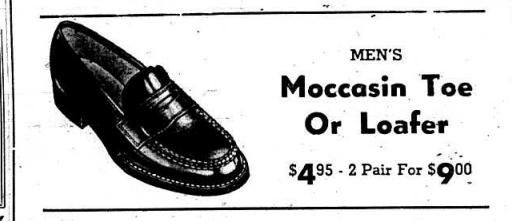
