County Band, Soloists Superior At Festival

It was another great music festival for the Rockcastle All-County Band Tuesday when it was awarded a superior rating at the State Regional Music Festival at Eastern Kentucky State College, Richmond.

It was at least the fourth straight year that the band has been awarded the highest rating for a senior band under the direction of Jack L. Adams.

For some, the rating might have been unexpected, since several top bandmen graduated that year. But when final judging was over, once again the top rating was awarded.

Judges who wrote their comments, left no doubt as to how they liked it. Some of the comments are listed below:

"The band played very well. It is commendable to the director and the communities that such a nice group can represent the county. These boys and girls deserve all the support possible."

"Another: 'The band played very musically. It is difficult to find anything wrong with your band.'"

Actually, only in one event did a participating group fall below the superior rating. The band received an excellent rating for sight reading, which is not a required event.

The Livingston Junior Band came in for a measure of glory when the judges awarded it a superior rating in this, its first year, at the Mt. Vernon Girls Glee Club, working for the past six weeks without its director, Mrs. Margie Wilcox, won a superior. They were the only vocal group that participated in the festival from Rockcastle. Two other boys scheduled for solos were unable to perform because of conflicts in schedules at the festival. They were Phillip Owens, of Brodhead, and Donald Mullins, of Livingston. Both will perform their numbers as solos in the Spring Band Concert, scheduled for May 6 at the Renfro Valley Barn.

Grand Jury Recalled In Falin Death

Circuit Judge R. C. Tartar has called the Rockcastle County Grand Jury back into session Monday to investigate the death April 8 of Earl Falin in the County Jail.

The step was not unexpected since a considerable number of persons had asked the judge if the grand jury would check into the death.

Young Falin, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Falin, of Brush Creek Road, was asphyxiated in the jail after he was arrested on a public drunk charge. His father and Jaileer Sam Hoskins found the youth about 7 a. m. in a smoke filled cell set aside for persons arrested for drunkenness.

When found, straw mattresses and blankets had been piled in the center of the floor and were smouldering.

An inquest into the death was not held after no one appeared.

When the grand jury is in session it could investigate other cases as might be required by the count. In other action this week, a jury failed to agree on the storehouse breaking case against Lee Smith, of Mt. Vernon, and the case was set for the July term of court. Smith was one of four men accused of breaking into Barnett's Grocery at Mt. Vernon.

Namoi Abney, of near Brodhead, was fined one dollar and costs on a guilty plea on a charge of assault and battery.

Industry Brochure Received

Brochures on industrial sites in Mt. Vernon were recently received by the local Chamber of Commerce.

Information contained in the brochure was compiled by members of the Mt. Vernon Chamber of Commerce and published by the Industrial Development Department of Kentucky Utilities Company.

W. O. Nelson, KU manager, explained that the purpose of the booklet is to provide essential information about industrial sites to industries interested in a plant location.

Included in the booklet are a map of the area showing available industrial sites, copies of options on the sites and pertinent data on the sites and community.

Mr. Nelson pointed out the increased competition involved in industrial development and emphasized the need for optional sites to put the community in a competitive position in its efforts to attract new industry.

He said most industries have only a limited time to see a site and won't waste it in towns not having sites available at a fixed price. (Continued on page 4)

The men are: Edward Ray Philbeck, Lloyd F. Coffey and Raymond Carpenter.

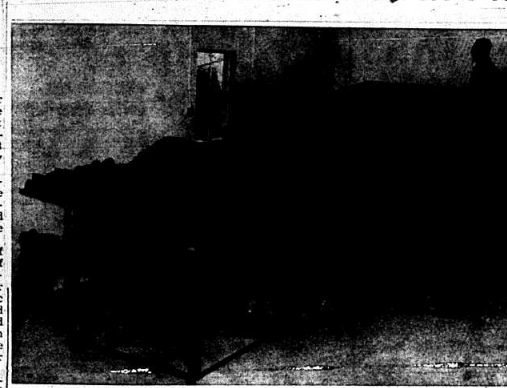
Easter Services

IMPACT RIPS TOP FROM CAR

Three Brodhead men were killed early Wednesday when their auto crashed with tremendous force into a bridge on US 150 a short distance from the Rockcastle-Lincoln counties line.

Killed instantly were Paul Douglas Sargent, 25, and John Orville Shafer, 17. Dying about 6:30 p. m. Wednesday at a Lexington hospital was Edgar Leeve, 20.

In a serious condition at a Lexington hospital is Charles Shafer Jr., 33, brother of John Shafer. He suffered fractured ribs, left ankle and upper left leg.

Police reports on the accident occurred about 7:15 a. m. The car was traveling toward Crab Orchard and apparently the driver, not identified, failed to negotiate a curve at the bottom of

The car struck the bridge on the front left side. The impact ripped the car apart, throwing the rear seat and a over a 50-foot embankment. The front seat area and motor remained on the bridge, partially upside-down.

John Shafer and Sargent were in the front seat and were pinned to the wreckage. Charles Shafer and Leeve were thrown out of the car, an old model Oldsmobile.

Funeral Director Maurice Howard, of Crab Orchard, described the wreck as one of the worst he had ever seen. It was several hours before the men were positively identified.

Paul Sargent was born in Rockcastle County, the son of Cecil and Jess Sargent. Besides his parents, he is survived by his wife, Mrs. (Continued on page 4)

The county would not raise taxes, but look for approval of a bond issue. The money from present taxes will be enough to pay for the loan commitment, Judge Carter said.
The building is expected to house the health department, welfare office, agriculture office, county judge offices, county attorney offices, county clerk, and the sheriff. Offices now being used by these people at the courthouse will be turned over to the Circuit Court and other state and federal offices as needed.
Final plans for the building remain to be completed, but Engineer Jack Crawford estimates the building will be 48 by 96 feet, of brick construction, and will have entrances on US 150 and on Church Street.

Wool Payments Filing Date Told

April 30, is the last day for filing applications for payments for the 1961 marketing year under the wool payment program, growers were reminded today by R. H. Chairman of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service committee.

payments for the 1961 marketing year for shorn wool and unshorn lambs marked not later than March 31 of this year. Later marketing will be eligible for payments for the 1962 marketing year.

The Chairman stressed that the fact that the payments on wool ads lambs are not made automatically - growers must file applications which are supported with all the necessary sales records in order to receive payments under the program.
Since these sales records will be the basis of calculating the national average price received by farmers for wool during the entire marketing year, it is a grower's advantage to file his application early. When the average price can be determined, the payment rates for shorn wool and unshorn

lambs sold during the 1961 marketing year will be announced. The payments will be made to growers during the coming summer.
Wool program applications should be filed at the producer's local ASCS county office, and this should be done as soon as possible, but not later than Monday, April 30.

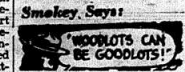
Bluegill for central and eastern sections of the state

Stock Farm Ponds With 65,000 Bluegill

More than 65,000 bluegill of the adult class will be stocked in approximately 2,000 farm ponds throughout Kentucky in the next three weeks, Bernard Carter, director of Fisheries for the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, announced today.
Delivery will be made by four trucks and a crew of eight men who will cover the entire state in considerably less than a month. Following the initial stocking another trek will be made throughout the state, on the same routes, to deliver large-mouth bass, the second species in the balanced fish stocking program. This delivery is expected to start early in May but will be dependent on the weather conditions. Applications are urged to be present at the designated time and place to pick up their fish.
