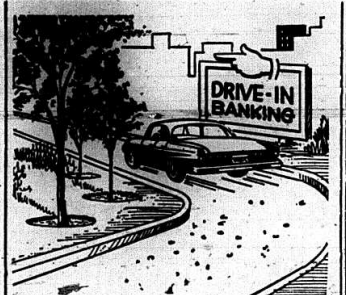

Not Indictment In Falin Death

A Rockcastle County Grand Jury Monday investigated the death of Earl Falin, who was found dead April 8 in a cell at the county jail, failed to return an indictment.

The Grand Jury was in session for most of the day and heard about 15 witnesses in the case before making its decision.

The jury did not detail its findings, but merely returned the regular form checked "no indictment."

Young Falin, 19, was asphyxiated in jail. His father, Ed Falin, found him dead in the smoke-filled cell.

The jury was dismissed at the end of the Monday session.

In the final act of this term of Circuit Court, a jury found Mose Brock, Route 3, Crab Orchard, not guilty of unlawful conversion.

COUNTY HIGHWAY SUPERVISOR DIES

Monroe "Rody" Parsons, 56, of Mt. Vernon, died April 23 at Fattie A. Clay Hospital, Richmond, after an illness of several weeks.

Mr. Parsons was supervisor for rural roads in the county and had also been a farmer for most of his life. He was a member of the First Christian Church and Ashland Lodge 640 F&AM, Mt. Vernon.

Mr. Parsons was born in Rockcastle County, the son of John W. and Betty H. Parsons. His mother still lives at Roundstone. His father preceded him in death.

Besides his mother, he is survived by his wife, Jewel Chapman Parsons, and one daughter, Mrs. Nell Wanda Craig, of Mt. Vernon. Two sisters and three brothers survive.

Mrs. W. L. Hiatt, B. H. Parsons, S. B. Parsons and Jack Parsons, all of Wildie, and one grandson, are survivors.

Funeral services were conducted April 25 at the Wildie Christian Church with Bro. Larry Johnson and Cecil Daily officiating. He was buried in Elmwood Cemetery, Mt. Vernon. Sparks Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Clean-Up Week

Next week has been designated "Clean-Up Week" in Rockcastle County and most organizations are sponsoring the drive to beautify the county.

Shooting Charge Against Bradley

A warrant charging "shooting with intent to kill" has been issued for Eugene Bradley, of Mt. Vernon.

Bradley, about 21, is charged with wounding Charlie Powell, of Conway, Sunday near Horseshoe Bend. Powell was reportedly wounded in the arm.

During the shooting, Powell went to the office of County Judge Charles C. Carter and obtained a warrant. Bradley has not been apprehended to date, officers reported.

Mason Charged

Charles "Red" Mason, of Mt. Vernon, has been held in the July term of Circuit Court on a charge of "malicious mischief."

When city police reported Mason was arrested Saturday night after he was charged from the roof of Jasper Proctor Store at Mt. Vernon. Police said Circuit Court jumped from the roof and injured his foot. He was taken to Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital and then taken to the county jail.

Vernon Theatre Closes Soon

With the final performance April 30, the curtain will come down on the operation of the Vernon Theatre at Mt. Vernon.

After 35 years the closed sign will be hung on the door.

(An editorial on the theatre will be found on Page 4 of this issue.)

According to Mrs. Dalry Miller, owner, the decision to close is not sudden, but was taken after considerable thought.

She stated neither she nor members of her family would operate the movie again. For the present, no decision has been made on what will be done with the building and equipment.

The closing of the theatre decreases the number of movie houses in the county to two. At one time there were four. Open during the summer is the Valley Drive-In. Open on week ends during the winter is the Gray Theatre at Brodhead.

The Vernon Theatre opened its doors in 1927 with a silent movie entitled "Men of Steel" starring Milton Sills. The movie at that time ran with the only sound coming from a three-piece orchestra—Mr. and Mrs. Bragg Thompson, and son, Robert Huffman.

About 1933, along came sound and the Vernon installed the "novel" device. The Vernon has been managed by the Miller family, except for a short time, since it opened. Eddie Arnsstein and Teddy Slaughter

State Schedules I-75 Meet To Discuss Laurel Routing

A supplemental public hearing on the location of some 36 miles of Interstate Highway 75 through Laurel and Whitley Counties will be held May 7 at London.

Highway Commissioners Henry Ward and James H. Hensley will conduct the hearing to be held in the circuit court room of the courthouse beginning at 2 p. m.

The first public hearing on this section of the super-highway was held Dec. 14, 1961. A new study indicates now, Ward said, that the highway may be moved closer to London and Corbin.

If-75, when completed, will extend in Kentucky 186 miles from the new Cincinnati-Corbin bridge across the Ohio River in northern Kentucky to the Tennessee border.

Some 60 miles of the highway should be open to traffic by the end of this year, according to Highway Department estimates. A section 21.5 miles long from Corbin to Florence was opened late last year.

Any changes in the location of I-75 north of the Rockcastle River are not expected. A proposed route through Rockcastle and Madison counties has been scheduled for completion this year as a 12-mile section from Florence to Corbin. A four-mile portion from the Clay's Ferry Bridge, across the Kentucky River to near Richmond in Madison County; a four-mile section from Sexton to the Tennessee River; and four miles from Florence to Fifth Creek in Covington; and four miles from Dry Ridge to Williamson.

Rockcastle County, which is located at London begins 3,400 feet south of the Cumberland River and extends to the Rockcastle County line, a distance of 36,228 miles.

Performance Noted On Beef Calves

Kentucky stockmen have asked for many years: How do straight-bred beef calves perform against calves that are crosses from beef sires and dual-purpose dams?

UK Ag Experiment Station beef researchers for the last three years have been trying to find out. They have checked straight Hereford calves against Hereford-Red Poll crosses for preweaning and post-weaning performances.

Neil Bradley, researcher, says one phase of the test involved use of low-gaining sires and high-gaining sires. Crossbreeds were 116 pounds heavier at weaning than the Herefords, but the Hereford calves graded about a third of a feeder grade higher than the crossbreeds.

Later, in a 207-day feedlot test, Herefords gained slightly faster than the crossbreeds and required about 134 pounds less feed for each 100 pounds of gain. Calves sired by the high-gaining bull had a better feed efficiency than those sired by the low-gaining bull. The "high-gaining" calves also had more red meat as measured by the ribeye area.

While carcass grades of

both groups were close, one-foot conformation score of the crosses was more than a third of a grade lower. Apparently this was because the crosses lacked beef conformation in hind quarters and loins; but in the carcasses this faulting did not carry through. Only carcasses were graded down for poor beef conformation.

The crossbreeds carried more fat over the rib, Bradford Smith, but the Hereford calves had a larger percentage of their carcass weight in the desirable rib-eye area. Heifer carcasses of both groups slightly heavier, carried more fat over the ribs, and were a third of a grade lower in carcass conformation than the steers.

Bradley said the experiment would be tried again this year, but that the sires would be switched to the other group of dams. This would control the influence of the dam during the preweaning phase.

Sod Land For Tobacco

Sod land to be used for this year's tobacco crop should feel the plow within the next three weeks, says Russell Hunt, U. K. Ag Extension Service tobacco specialist.

Plowing now will let the sod begin its decay, he said. Leave plowed land in the rough (not worked down) so sheet erosion won't be a problem.

Hunt strongly recommends addition of fertilizer to fields to be plowed BEFORE the plowing is done.

This means there will be little "leaching" of plowed-down fertilizer, as the "leaching" season is now over.

Some other tips: Fertilizer to be applied depends on (1) cropping history of the land, and (2) the soil test that determines needs. With these two pieces of information, county agents can give recommendations for the type and amount of fertilizer to be used.

Hunt says good reasons fertilizer should be plowed under at this seasonal plowing are:

Plowed down fertilizer is distributed throughout the plow slice, not put overly deep nor left at the surface. If put deep enough by plowing, ground moisture will put the fertilizer in solution; this is the only way fertilizer can be utilized by growing plants. Tobacco has extensive root systems, and the fertilizer is relatively deep, plant roots will go to it; this makes for continued growth even under unfavorable growing conditions. In dry seasons, deep-placed fertilizer will help plants survive; where fertilizer is close to the surface, plants may burn

because the fertilizer is NOT in solution but has crystallized.

An, last, fertilizer four to six inches in the ground is not as readily available to weeds and grasses as fertilizer closer to the surface.

the state, but which were eventually to be accepted by the state, are affected. No state or county official would speculate for publication on what would happen in the county and state failed to work out the program at the May 7 meeting.

Should the county and state fail to work out the program, in all probability the state would cancel its contract with the county and proceed with road work in areas it chooses as it did prior to 1960.

The operations were halted by telegram. Below is the telegram reproduced. It came from Frankfort and was addressed to D. L. Hacker, Somerset, with a carbon copy to County Judge Charles C. Carter.

"You are hereby directed to cease all operations in Rockcastle County relating to Rural Highway and Rural Secondary projects a n d funds, except routine maintenance operations, until further notice from this office."

Responsible Department of Highway personnel shall give close supervision of routine maintenance operations." Signed: T. R. Marcum, commissioner of rural highways.

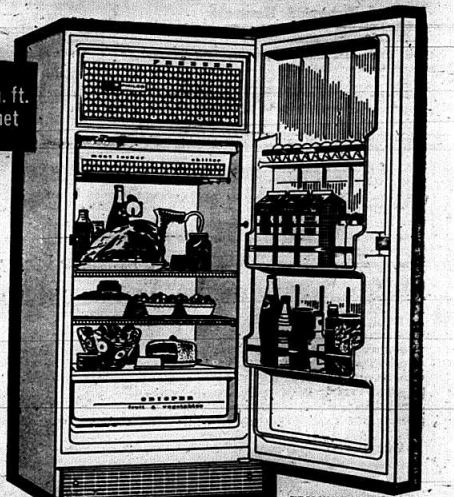
