county works roads under this program until they meet state specifications and are taken over by the state to maintain.
The county learned it may also be able to purchase a larger road grader and three new trucks for use on county roads. The new grader and trucks would be paid for on a rental basis to the state through a contract to haul rock for state roads.

Attending the Somerset meeting was Ted Marcum, commissioner of rural roads in Kentucky. He spelled out the state's program of rural road work to officials from several counties who attended.
The hearing concerned a Government to adopt this as the final route.
The preliminary study must be approved by the Bureau of Public Roads before actual engineering surveys begin.

70-mile, \$73,308,000 stretch of I-75 beginning at a proposed bridge across Croley's Bend in the Cumberland River just north of Williamsburg.
The route roughly parallels KY 26 to Corbin and follows west of U. S. 25 from Corbin past London north to the line at the Rockcastle River. Laurel-Rockcastle County.
If the route is approved, Corbin will be served by two interchanges. One would be on U. S. 25-W a mile south of the city; the other would link I-75 to U. S. 25 a mile north of Corbin.
London also would have two interchanges, each a mile from town. The southern one would be on KY 192, the northern on KY 80—Somerset Road.

I. K. Cross, president of the Somerset-Pulaski County Chamber of Commerce, said Somerset favored the route, although this meant the highway would be farther from it.
This endorsement surprised many Laurel Countians, a spokesman said later. They expected Somerset interests to oppose it.

ment, flood control structures, contour cultivation, strip cropping, channel improvements and other conservation practices, clean, clear water flows down the hillsides and the streams, and soil erosion and flood damage are brought to a halt.
It is all a part of the Conservation Department's expanded educational program to show city dwellers, school children and farmers correct conservation practices.

According to Commissioner of Conservation, J. O. Matlick, considerable effort and expense has been put into the building of the exhibit to make it the most outstanding in the United States. Says Matlick: "Conservation is everybody's business, but if we expect the general public to support legislation and programs designed to conserve and develop our State's natural resources, we must carry on an education campaign. We must explain the various programs, problems, and opportunities and how each individual citizen can assist in efforts to maintain and develop our natural resources for the benefit of this and future generations of Kentuckians."
The Caravan is being made available through the cooperation of the Rockcastle County Soil Conservation District. Supervisors for the District are W. E. Proctor, chairman, John Houston, vice-chairman, Bradley Sawyer, secretary, Kenneth Stewart and W. C. Coffey; Clay A. Colson, soil Conservationist, says the Caravan will have the following schedule:
May 14, Roundstone School; May 15, Brodhead High School; May 16, Livingston High School; May 17, Mt. Vernon High School, Friday and Saturday May 18 and 19 the Caravan will be at Mt. Vernon parked by the Kentucky Utilities building.
Jim Hill, area representative of the Division of Soil and Water Resources, Frankfort, will be with the Caravan to answer questions and explain its operation.
