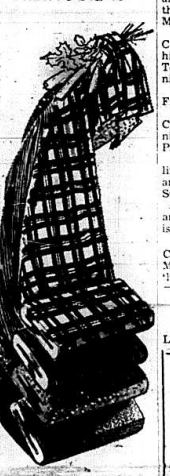

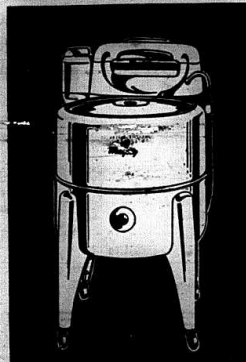

## County Roads Got \$320,000 In Two Years

Nearly \$320,000 has been spent or committed by the Kentucky Highway Department on 283.3 miles of rural secondary roads in Rockcastle County since December, 1950.

In addition, the Rural Highway program is providing \$37,001 this year to assist in maintaining 104.8 miles and constructing 76.8 miles of county roads. Rockcastle County participates in the Co-operative Program by renting equipment to the Department.

The Secondary Road program is financed with one percent of the seven-cents state gasoline tax, and the county road money comes from a state-wide appropriation of \$5,000,000. Both these state funds are allocated among the counties by formula.

The statistics were announced in Frankfort by Rural Highway Commissioner T. R. Marcum. "Governor Combs, Commissioner of Highways Henry Ward and I are aware that a good part of the traffic (Continued on page 4)

One son, Donald Edgar Leeco, was killed in an auto crash a few weeks ago at the Rockcastle-Lincoln county line, along with two other youths.

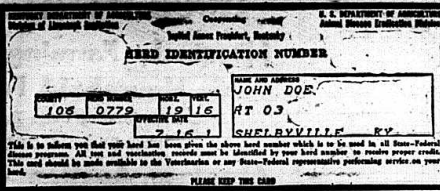

## New Livestock Cards Issued By State

Cattle farmers in Rockcastle County are now being issued Herd Identification Cards, Agriculture Commissioner Emerson Beauchamp has announced in Frankfort. According to Beauchamp, these cards are being provided for every herd in Kentucky and will have the effect of assigning a permanent number to the herd. This innovation is a part of the Kentucky Department of Agriculture's electronic system of data processing and will be utilized for the immediate location and identity of a herd in the vent of disease outbreak or other livestock sanitation matters.

When he receives his herd card the owner should retain it as a permanent record because it will be needed when his veterinarian or livestock sanitary officials have occasion to visit his farm.

Beauchamp stressed the following points in connection with the herd numbers: (1) Every herd that is maintained separately, regardless of ownership, has a separate herd number. In cases of the same ownership of more than

one herd, these herds are further identified as Herd No. 1, Herd No. 2, etc.

(2) If ownership does not change but herd location changes within the same county, the herd number is retained.

(3) If the herd is moved to another county, the number of assigning a permanent number to the herd. This innovation is a part of the Kentucky Department of Agriculture's electronic system of data processing and will be utilized for the immediate location and identity of a herd in the vent of disease outbreak or other livestock sanitation matters.

(4) If the herd is jointly owned but is dissolved by one of the partners moving his part of the herd out of the farm, then the herd number is retired and new ones may be assigned.

(5) No cases will a herd number be taken from one ownership and assigned to another.

(6) Any changes in herd ownership (dispersal sales, dissolution of partnership) or should be reported to the Kentucky Division of Livestock Sanitation.

Beauchamp revealed that 1952 herds with approximately 8,357 cattle have been assigned numbers in Rockcastle County.

## Council Signs Sewer Papers; Forwards To Federal Agency



Final action of obtaining a \$380,000 loan for a sewer system for the City of Mt. Vernon was taken Friday at a called meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council.
