Governor Here For Opening

The official opening of the Renfro Valley craft center will be Friday with a dedication address by Gov. Bert Combs.

The Governor's address is scheduled for 10:30 a. m.

(Band students meet at the Mt. Vernon School band room Friday at 9:30 a. m. Band mothers will provide transportation for the Renfro Valley performance.)

The new center will consist of six craft shops in which handweaving, spinning, pottery making, basket weaving and wood and metal work will be done. The shops, along with a "country store" for the marketing of items produced in the center, will form an old fashioned "Main Street."

Initially, 10 to 12 craftsmen will be employed in the center. They will act as teachers for people of the area who want to do handcraft work in their homes.

The center will be operated by the Renfro Valley Foundation, Inc., and all profits will be used by the foundation to aid young people of the area in attaining education.

John Lair is the director of the Renfro Valley center. The Division of Arts and Crafts of the Kentucky Department of Commerce has provided technical assistance on the development of the Rockcastle County project.

Other state officials who will attend the opening ceremony are Commerce Commissioner E. B. Kennedy, Jaul Hadley, director of Division of Arts and Crafts, and Miss Susan Black, State supervisor of arts and crafts. The public is invited.

JUNE DAIRY MONTH

From Farm Bureau News

The announcement that "June is Dairy Month" is one we've heard in this country for more than 45 years. This month dairymen in Kentucky and throughout the United States again call attention to their industry through its 26th June Dairy Month observance. And what an important spot dairying occupies in America's economy—representing one-fifth of the nation's agricultural income.

In the true spirit of cooperation and togetherness, the dairy interests—producers, handlers, processors, retailers—band together to promote their industry the year around, and on such special occasions as June Dairy Month. Dairy interests in Kentucky build and stage one of the nation's top statewide June Dairy Month promotions.

The American Dairy Association, voice of the dairy farmer in the market places of America, provides its Chicago office as national June Dairy Month headquarters. Each state office of the American Dairy Association serves as state headquarters, with Kentucky's located at 3412 Rowena Road, Louisville.

Like Kentucky, every state has a June Dairy Month Committee and state chairman. Tens of thousands of volunteer June Dairy Month workers throughout the country give freely of their time and effort to make the promotion a big success, and to increase sales of dairy products, not only in June, but also throughout the year.

In promoting their products, dairy farm families are providing June Dairy Month leadership by: (1) consuming more milk and dairy foods themselves; (2) working on state, county and local committees; (3) reminding friends and neighbors of the goodness of dairy foods; (4) encouraging use of milk in the schools; (5) getting food store cooperation; (6) urging "Milk now, coffee later," at restaurants, church and community gatherings; (7) and advertising and merchandising 12 months a year through their voluntary set-aside investment in the American Dairy Association.

As important as anything is the fact that dairymen themselves through their own organizations and the assistance of research, education, and marketing agencies of government are taking steps toward efficient production and a greater degree of control over marketing and pricing of milk.

The Signal joins with the Farm Bureau News in saluting the dairy industry during its 26th observance of June Dairy Month, with the hope that this vital industry progresses more and more each year.

Mileage Cut Dooms Home Agent

A cut in the auto mileage allowance by the office of the County Agent has apparently doomed the position of Home Demonstration Agent in Rockcastle County.

Unless the final county budget, to be approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court June 30, is changed to increase the mileage allowance to the Office of the County Agent, the state will terminate the employment of Mrs. Kizzie Owens, Rockcastle Home Demonstration Agent, as of July 1.

There apparently seems to be little chance that the mileage item can be changed before the budget is finally approved.

The state made the announcement Wednesday through its representative J. W. Kidwell, district leader of county agricultural extension agents at the University of Kentucky, after tentative approval of an estimated budget by the state.

The budget allows \$720 yearly allowance for auto mileage for the county agent and the home demonstration agent. Last year the mileage totaled \$1,440.

Fire Damages Self-Service Laundry

A fire of undetermined origin did about \$700 worth of damage to a self-service laundry owned by Mt. Vernon Policeman Carl Kelley Friday afternoon.

The laundry is located in the Spout Springs area of town, and northeast of the Courthouse square.

The fire was discovered by Mr. and Mrs. Russ Fisher, Mt. Vernon, who were in the laundry at the time. When firemen arrived smoke was pouring from the building and it appeared firemen would be unable to save the structure.

The fire department fought the blaze for more than an hour before bringing it under control. They had to return later to the site when it flared up again.

According to Mr. Kelley, it is most likely that the fire started from a spark igniting lint from the dryer, but he was unable to pinpoint the cause. It is generally believed to have originated in the roof area.

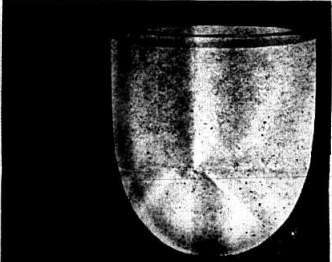
