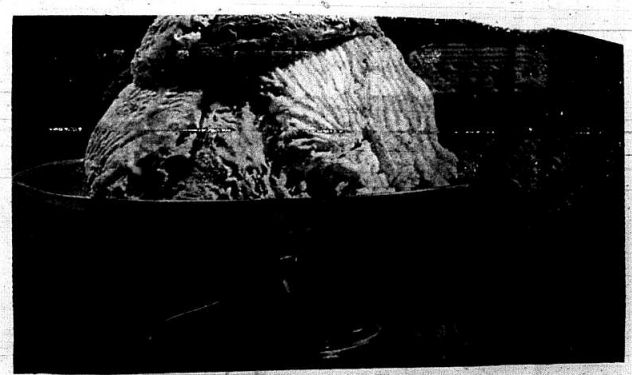

Some 300 persons gathered at Renfro Valley Friday for ceremonies opening a new craft center.

On hand was Gov. Bert Combs and other state officials to cut the ribbon and launch the new handicraft project.

Everything went according to plan, and even the weather smiled on the group.

Governor Combs told his audience in his dedication speech that the center is one of several in the state that is designed to improve local economy, and that the state will help in any way possible to make the craft industry a success.

He cited the success made by his administration to boost the state's economy, and recounted the state's industrial growth during his term.

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### Dairy Day Wednesday

The dairy industry in Rockcastle County will be king Wednesday when the county observes Dairy Day at Mt. Vernon.

### Local School Budget

A near million dollar budget has been set by the Rockcastle County School system for the 1962-63 school year, according to a budget report presented recently to the Rockcastle Fiscal Court.

A total of \$900,000 is expected to be allocated to the school system for the year. Of the \$900,000, a total of \$752,000 comes from the state's Minimum Foundation Program, an \$80,000 from last year. About \$130,000 is the total estimated income from county school taxes.

Among budget expenditures expected by the Board of Education is a \$600,000 for teacher salaries (instruction) an \$86,000 item for outgoing transfers and refunds such as the \$20,000 of program, and \$37,000 for transportation which includes school buses.

Other expenditures include: Administration, \$28,000; attendance service, \$9,000; health service, \$1,000; operation of plant, \$19,000; maintenance of plant, \$22,000; fixed charges (tax, security and insurance), \$7,000; community services (libraries and playgrounds), \$1,000; capital outlay, \$20,000; a total of \$900,000.

Below is a complete listing of income, which balances the \$900,000 expenditures.

District tax receipts—Balance in general fund, \$200,000; school district tax revenue, \$47,000; total, \$247,000. State tax receipts—State tax receipts, \$19,744.57; assessed value of land, \$1,254,000; total, \$21,000. With costs of collections from tax delinquencies and other items collected from the district, the estimated income from district taxation is \$313,596.60.

Estimated receipts from all other sources other than district taxation is as follows: Rental of school facilities and other revenue, \$3,000; Foundation program, \$75,000; other state aid, \$22,000; Public Law 804, \$10,000, for a total of \$77,000.

### STATE APPROVES COUNTY BUDGET

The State Department of Finance has approved the 1962-63 county budget as submitted last week by officials of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court.

The budget calls for an expenditure of \$92,963, as reported previously, and is \$3,730 under last year's budget. The decrease this year is caused by a \$300,000 decrease in assessed valuation of franchise corporations and personal property.

There are few changes in this year's budget. One change is a decrease in the mileage allocation to the office of the County Agent.

The decrease apparently eliminates the Home Demonstration Agent in the county since certain mileage requirements are necessary in order to comply with state regulations.

One new item appears in the budget. It is a \$2,400 appropriation for the county's contribution to the employee retirement fund which was approved by the court this year.

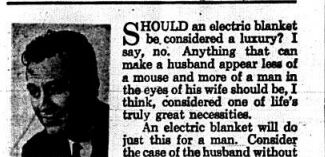

But with an electric blanket this type thing can always be avoided. If you wake up cold, you just reach over and turn up the control. With luck you will never wake your wife at all. Without luck you may hit her in the mouth with your elbow but this still doesn't make her as mad as having to make that polar expedition to the blanket closet.
And, along the same lines, a wife, who gets up first in the morning, will hate her still sleeping husband much less if he is lying there under a little, thin electric blanket rather than under a bunch of thick, woolly covers. Of course, he is really snugger and more comfortable under the electric blanket but it doesn't look that way and where his glaring wife is concerned, that's what counts.
And all of this can work in reverse and benefit wives, too. Because, unfortunately, there are some wives hardy enough to out-wait their husbands about getting up and getting extra blankets and some cruel enough to lie in bed when they should be getting breakfast for their husbands. But when an electric blanket benefits the average wife most is in the normal course of a winter night's sleeping.
It works this way: give her an ordinary blanket and she isn't content just to sleep under it, she wants to sleep in it. To do this, she will get hold of a corner of the blanket and start rolling up in it. Pretty soon she is so wrapped up in it, that she looks like a woolly mummy. He, poor husband though, looks like a human torso. He's got nothing left over him but the sheet, and he's having to fight to keep it.
To get any of the blanket back, he will have to grab hold and spin his wife like she is some sort of a human top. And, on a cold winter night, this does very little towards promoting togetherness.
In short, an electric blanket is not only good for the body, it's good for the soul.

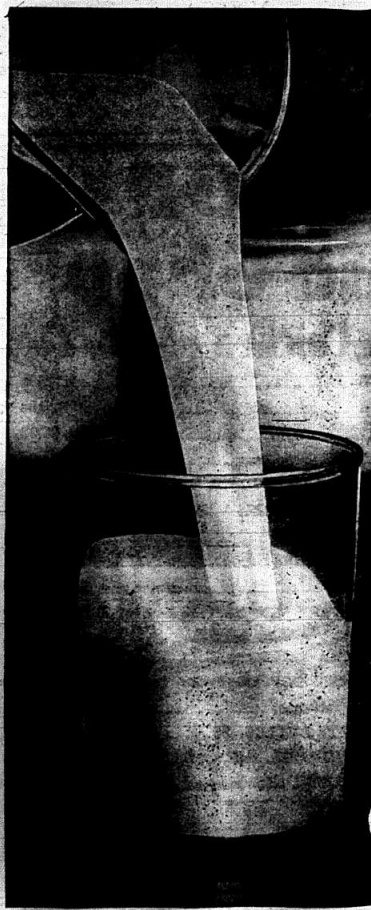

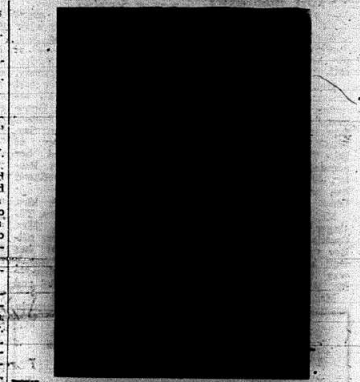
