County Budget Gets Approval Of Fiscal Court

Passed without change. This sums up the 1952-53 county budget as finally approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court in a special meeting last week.

No changes were expected if the budget since the court had ok'd the budget at its last meeting, and the State Department of Finance had already stamped its approval.

Biggest and most important change in the budget was the discontinuance of the allocation for a home demonstration agent for the county, which mean the discontinuance of the office.

Unless the county shares in the gasoline expenses of the home demonstration agent, the state will not pay her salary. The court voted to eliminate the gasoline appropriation, and in turn, the state discontinued the work of the home demonstration agent.

Below is a breakdown of appropriations as finally passed by the court:

General government, \$28,571; protection for person and property, \$4,500; health and sanitation, \$1,430; hospitals, charities and corrections, \$8,950; libraries and other educational activities, \$3,300; debt service, general fund, \$300; miscellaneous, general fund, \$4,000.

Below is a list of appropriations for other departments:

Highways, \$17,300; highway rentals, \$9,000; forestry \$1,000; hospital, \$2 cents per acre, \$1,200. Total revenue, \$95,195.

Miss McCowan attracted the attention of a passerby, Ed Hise, who took her to a phone, where she called police.

Reece, owner of the cafe, went to the scene and said he found Paul Johnson committing the assault.

A juvenile court investigation placed charges against the youths.

Don't Use Toxaphene On Tobacco Plants

Do not use the insecticide Toxaphene on tobacco at any time, recommends R. L. Miller, U. S. Department of entomology specialist. Toxaphene affects the flavor of tobacco and makes it useless for commercial tobacco products.

The odor of Toxaphene, which is a chlorinated camphene, can be easily detected on tobacco. Buyers are sure to notice this odor in the warehouse, he warns.

Insecticides recommended for use on tobacco are DDT, Dieldrin, Sevin formulations other than dusts, or a combination of these, set Toxaphene, Miller says.

CPA Announces New Type Loan

Because of changes, constant and rapid in recent years, the need for better educated and better farm-trained operator has been emphasized, according to a release by C. C. Sherman, general manager of the Cumberland Production Credit Association.

Persons who wish to take the test may obtain complete applications on the day of the examination.

Qualifications are as follows:

The applicant must be a resident in the county in which the vacancy exists. He must be a graduate from high school. The minimum age is 23. The maximum age is 33. He must be of medium height, with a minimum height of 5 feet 9 inches, and a minimum weight of 150 pounds. Candidates will be required to pass a physical examination prior to employment.

Duties include immediate change of law enforcement duties with reference to fish and wildlife conservation in a specified area.

Former County Woman Active In 4-H Activities

A former Rockcastle resident, who believes the 4-H Club is the most important organization in existence today, has built her life around the 4-H Club work in this area and other areas of Kentucky.

She is Mrs. Onie Silvers Smithers, now a resident of Irvine.

Mrs. Smithers' 4-H Club work began about 53 years ago when Mrs. Ella Carson, Brodhead, called on her family home at Cove and tried to interest the 12-year-old girl in a 4-H project.

As it turned out, she did become interested and took tomatoes as a project.

Mrs. Smithers tells it thus: "She talked to me about 4-H Club work and asked me to join and take a project. I was thrilled to try, and pretty soon I received my record book and all the other pamphlets that I needed. I went to work and cleared off my plot at the side of the barn which was the richest spot on the farm. I planted my seed, and when it was time to set the plants I had a fine place for them. They grew and produced some of the finest tomatoes I have ever seen."

Soon after her project began, Mrs. Smithers was given directions on how to obtain her equipment for canning and labeling. When the project was completed, Mrs. Smithers remembers she was very proud of her efforts.

She worked in the club for about three or four years. Her family moved to Mt. Vernon when she was 17 and she entered the eighth grade. She finished high school in three years and went a summer term at Eastern Kentucky State College. She then took a teachers' examination and was assigned a school at Pine Hill where she taught until the flu epidemic closed the schools in 1918.

In February of 1919, Mrs. Smithers entered the Business Department at Berea College. She was given a job in the dean's office, since she had had lessons in shorthand and typing under Miss Ethel Arbill (now Mrs. Hatfield) Secretary, the late Atty. C. C. Williams.

When Mrs. Smithers graduated from the Business Department at Berea College she remained to teach in the Commerce Department. Later she attended Western Kentucky State College at Bowling Green.

She taught at Berea until June 1925, when she resigned to marry.

She and Mr. Smithers moved to Irvine where they have made their home since that time. Son and daughter, Walter and Sallie Lou, later joined the family and when old enough they too became interested in 4-H Club work.

With a shortage of teachers in Estill County in 1942, Mrs. Smithers again turned to teaching and taught for 12 years. She later took a teaching position at Irvine Grade School where she is at the present time.

During her years at Irvine she has been a 4-H Club member for the past 33 years. She has been active in the 4-H Club since that time.

Several Materials For Tobacco Apsids

Several materials, used in tests last season to control the green peach aphid on tobacco, looked "very promising."
So says Richard Thurston, UK Ag Experiment Station entomologist, this week. He noted that the materials did as well as, sometimes better, than Malathion, one of the

recommended insecticides for this pest.
The materials were Cygon, Metaphos, Mangar, 4787, Phosphamidon, and DD 362. All were used at 99 percent and averaged around 90 percent control. However, they will not replace Malathion this season on the recommended list as more testing is needed, Thurston said.
Egins was not effective when applied once, though when applied at certain rates every 10 days from setting out to just before harvest gave excellent control. With Sevin, Thurston said, there was a large buildup of aphids on the treated plants despite the sprays every 10 days. Thiodan gave good control on this basis. A biological material called Thurstonigens gave no control at all.

Thurston said Malathion would be the recommendation this season until further tests are run. Also recommended will be Thiodan, Dieldrin and Parathion. Thurston noted Parathion is a highly toxic material which requires very careful handling.
