## Summer Recreation Program In Trouble As Tempers Flare During Council Meeting

**BULLETIN**

(Preston Parrett, playground director at Livingston, resigned as playground director Wednesday night.)

The Rockcastle County Recreation Council was rocked with dissent and threatened resignations Tuesday night that jeopardize the continuance of the summer recreation program on a county-wide basis.

Mrs. Joyce Henderson, secretary-treasurer, and Mrs. Barbara Burdette, council member, both of Mt. Vernon, said they would rather resign from the council than have "a part" in a program voted Tuesday night at a Livingston meeting.

The dissent, apparently settling for some time, arose over a motion made by Bob Waddie, of Livingston, that softball games be played on alternate nights at Livingston and Mt. Vernon, and later at Brodhead when the Brodhead ball-field is equipped with lights.

The motion carried 7 to 2. Voting for the motion were: Mr. Waddie, Mrs. Gertrude Bales, Guy Bullock, Mrs. Christine Mullins, Mrs. Joyce Waddie, all of Livingston; Preston Parrett, of Brodhead; and Livingston basketball coach, and Mrs. Tom Payne, of Brodhead.

Voting against the motion were: Mrs. Henderson, Mrs. Burdette and W. O. Nelson, all of Mt. Vernon.

Mrs. David McCauley, of Mt. Vernon, abstained from voting.

Mrs. Henderson and Mrs. Burdette left no doubt as to how they stood on the question of alternating nights with Livingston.

Mrs. Burdette said: "It amounts to Livingston taking the playground program away from Mt. Vernon. I want no part of this action."

Mrs. Henderson said: "The council has killed the goose that laid the golden egg. This could easily mean the end of the county-wide program. Mt. Vernon people have carried the bulk of the program and literally subsidized the other two playgrounds. It is simply not fair. I'd rather resign than be a party to this action."

The Recreation Council has 21 votes. There are 10 from Mt. Vernon, six from Livingston, and five from Brodhead. The members are chosen from government, civic and religious groups "by interest." By interest means they are interested in the program and want to "do their bit" to help further the program.

Until this year, games were held nightly at Mt. Vernon and included one game circulated among the young men's league and one adult game, except on Saturday night when there is often two games. This year, games were scheduled at Mt. Vernon. Since the last meeting of the council, Livingston has installed lights on its field and the vote Tuesday night reflects its position.

# Threaten City With Suit To Halt Sewer System Work

## WORK NEEDED ON WATER LINES

Some city water mains are old and need to be replaced, and some lines are too small to furnish adequate water service.

Such was the essence of a report handed the Mt. Vernon City Council at a meeting Thursday night by Henry Cox, superintendent of the Water Works.

The council's Superintendent Cox for a report on the water system and Mr. Cox came up with figures showing some \$28,350 is needed to replace certain lines.

Mr. Cox told the council it was his opinion from past records of operations, that the replacements could be made within four years under "the present water rate, providing no main line work is done within that period for immediate construction."

This section of the report struck a blow to some residents in the city who have demanded water service frequently during past years.

A total of 400 feet of six-inch cast iron pipe, 100 feet of two-inch pipe on Hamlin Street, \$3,600; 700 feet of two-inch pipe on Quincy Street, \$2,100; 250 feet of two-inch pipe on Locust Street, \$1,500; 4,000 feet of two-inch pipe on Wods Avenue, \$5,400; 500 feet of two-inch pipe on Locust Street, \$1,500; 500 feet of two-inch pipe on Poplar Street, \$1,500; 4,000 feet of two-inch pipe on Locust and Fair streets, \$12,000.

Mr. Cox also offered advice to the council contemplating a sewer system for the town:

Further submit as Superintendent of the Water Works, for the best interest of the system, that if construction of the sewer system is considered that a very thorough study be made of water, sewer and storm drainage system can eliminate its sub-standard mains and services and extend adequate water service within a reasonable period of time."

## County Health Officer Tells Sewer Problems

Dr. M. A. Shepherd, Rockcastle County Health Officer, appeared at the Mt. Vernon City Council meeting Thursday night to discuss the sewer system. Dr. Shepherd told the council of the problems of sewage and answered questions. Below is a statement by Dr. Shepherd composed for the Signal.

"In the course of discussion at the Mt. Vernon City Council meeting Mayor Carl Brown called on me to state my views as to how the sewer system would serve the people, to which I replied: 'I cannot agree with the view that the sewer system here tonight which would be the prevention of the spread of disease in a community. In this respect, it possibly benefits the neighbor more than it benefits the person whose sewage is picked up, since we are dumping to the ground in our own sewage. It is because of this fact that I place as much or more value on the proper disposal of my neighbor's sewage in Summer than on my own.'

Most of our serious infectious diseases are spread only through human sewage. The chief source of such disease as polio, hepatitis, typhoid, cholera, other diarrhea and dysentery, and the diseases of animal sewage. These most frequently are spread by man's feces, the flies which hatch out in the sewage. All of the outbreaks of disease this type in my experience have been in the vicinity of serious sewage problems.

A secondary benefit from a community sewage system may be thought of as mostly economic. Here again, all everyone in the entire area who benefits. All property values go up markedly. No one in his right mind wants to buy property here or in a countryside where the sewage of strangers pollutes the ditches and natural drains. Industry will not locate there and the costs of dealing with disease run high.

Any town in America today which does not deal adequately with its sewage problems is going to be passed by and we don't want to see this happen here at Mt. Vernon."

100 ATTEND CITY MEETING

A suit which would halt the construction of a \$419,000 sewer system in Mt. Vernon is facing the Mt. Vernon City Council.

Some 100 persons, and Somerset Atty. Fritz Krueger, appeared before the council Thursday night, to protest the construction of the proposed sewer system if it means an increase in water rates.

Water Rates Krueger told the council he has two petitions in his possession containing a total of 249 names asking for abandonment of the project. He did not give the petitions to the council.

One petition, the attorney said, is signed by 103 water users who would have a \$1.30 per month increase in water bills and would not have sewer service.

The second petition, Attorney Krueger reported, is signed by 146 water users who would not have increased water bills.

Some of these 146 petitions are in the city limit and would not have sewer service because engineers say it is not feasible to serve them.

Attorney Krueger told the council "You'll have to get over a lawsuit if you proceed as you have planned with the sewer system. These people mean business. They're going to try to stop this sewer system."

Attorney Krueger said a number of residents are protesting the proposed sewer system. He said that some of the residents who have signed petitions are opposed to the sewer system because they would have to pay for it.

Mayor Carl Brown, apparently speaking on behalf of the council, told Attorney Krueger residents have ample time to appear before the council to officially protest, but that only one date has been set.

He said the sewer system has been discussed for nearly a year and reported in two newspapers and on the radio.

As planned, water users outside the city limits will have increased water bills but no sewer bill. Residents inside the city limits, who have signed petitions in front of their property, will have an increased water bill.
