Livingston Out Of Summer Program

COUNCIL ACCEPTS TOWN'S REQUEST

Livingston members of the Rockcastle Recreation Council served notice this week they have withdrawn from participation in the summer recreation program. The withdrawal apparently stemmed from a meeting last week at which time controversy arose over the location of night softball games. In withdrawing from the council, Bob Wade, chairman of the Livingston delegation, said that his withdrawal was made because of continuous discussion between certain council members. "We want to have teams in the family, and the best way appears to be to get out of the program," Mr. Wade said. (A formal statement by Mr. Wade is in another column on this page.)

The controversy broke into the open last week at a meeting of the council at Livingston. At that meeting the council members voted to hold games on alternating nights at Mt. Vernon and Livingston. This decision was a newly lighted field.

Ten of the 21 members of the council were present. Two from Broadhead, and four from Mt. Vernon. The motion for alternating nights passed 7 to 3 with one Mt. Vernon councilwoman abstaining.

Two of the Mt. Vernon councilwomen protested the motion as unfair. Mrs. Joyce Henderson and Mrs. Sue Bardette pointed out that most of the money to finance the program has come from

ROBERT WADDE WRITES SIGNAL

(A statement of Livingston's views on the summer recreation program was made to the Signal this week by Robert Wadde, chairman of the Livingston delegation to the Rockcastle Recreation Council. Wadde's statement is in its entirety.)

"On July 14, Livingston delegates to the Rockcastle Recreation Council voted unanimously to go independently. Council members have expressed regrets that this action had to become necessary. This being the second year of Livingston's participation in what we thought was a county-wide program, we were well aware we were not pulling our weight financially in the council, and the charge of being 'subsidized' had a telling effect.

To counteract this charge we would like to point out the following facts: Since January, 1981, the people of this community have donated \$1,038.82 toward material, and over \$1,100 in labor. This does not include 1,437 feet of water line and two high-lift pumps which is estimated at \$380. The total of \$4,297.82 spent on a local playground is less than two years.

Two Rockcastle men received sentences to the penitentiary during first sessions in Rockcastle Circuit Court which opened Monday at Mt. Vernon.

John Darnell, of Boone, was sentenced by jury to three years on a child desertion charge. Darnell has five children.

Marion Morris, of Covington, and formerly of Rockcastle, was sentenced by a jury to two years on a charge of child desertion.

In another case, Ed Logsdon, of Mt. Vernon, was sentenced by a jury on a charge of malicious shooting.

Besides several nieces and nephews, Mrs. Clouse is survived by two brothers: Cecil Turner and Roy (Sis) Turner, both of London.

Funeral services were conducted July 15 at the Sand Hill Baptist Church with Bro. Ballard Rader and Bill Jones officiating. She was buried in Foyner Cemetery at Sand Hill. Cox Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

They reported slight damage to their furniture, but the flash flood, caused by some three inches of rain, caused an estimated half-million dollars damage to the area.

The Kentucky Water Pollution Control Commission dispensed an order today condemning the Mt. Vernon, Broadhead and Lexington sewage disposal plants. The commission said that it still is a matter of conjecture whether the plants are causing damage to the Rockcastle River. The commission said that it will continue its investigation of the plants.

The commission also approved about \$1,000,000 of sewer construction and a \$1 million contract for a West Virginia about installing Kentucky streams.

ing to build."
Fish and Wildlife Resources Commissioner Minor Clark said, "The Cumberland River is in a holy mess." Both Harlan and Louisville are located on the Cumberland River in Harlan County.

The commission directed its attorney, Dave Sebree, to contact Harlan and Louisville officials and set up a hearing. If it is shown that cities are polluting the river, they can be forced to build a sewage treatment plant.

Sebree also was directed to meet with Cumberland, Benham, and Pineville authorities "to stir up interest toward providing adequate sewage treatment."

Sebree, reporting on coal washers in Kentucky, said very little pollution streams is taking place now. The commission has threatened to crack down on coal firms dumping waste into streams.

Pickard said waste from coal washers in Virginia and West Virginia have been dumped into the Big Fork Creek and is polluting the stream. He said commission members will meet with commission members from Virginia and West Virginia. The three states will try to solve the problem by interstate compact, he said.

State Nursing Homes Under Care Program

Nursing homes will be included in Kentucky's Medical Care Program under plans agreed upon and to be administered jointly by the State Department of Economic Security and Health.

A target date of October 1, 1963, at the meeting this month of the Advisory Council on the Medical Assistance Program, benefits will be determined by a joint committee of the departments.

Medical care benefits include hospitalization, physician services, dental care and pharmacy benefits.

Initially there will be a limit of 120 days in any calendar year with emphasis given to emergency and intensive services, rather than just housing eligible persons. Quality instead of quantity was urged at the meeting.

vin dust injuries tobacco has not yet been determined. Until this is found and corrected, Sevin dust is not considered safe for use on tobacco. Thurston warns. However, formulations of Sevin other than dust still are among the recommended materials for tobacco insect control, he points out.

"No damage from the use of Sevin dust on tobacco has been noted before this year," he says. "Tests are being every effort will be made to place only those actually needing skilled nursing care in the homes at least eligible for the program. Elderly persons not requiring such care should be in homes for the aged, he added, buying a. Eligibility is available for aged individuals not making more than \$1,200 a year, and for couples not making more than \$1,800 a year."

Some Are Exempt From Egg License

Amendments now in effect to the State Egg Law exempt retailers of not more than five cases of Kentucky-produced eggs a week from classifying eggs but do exempt those buying a State license, according to the Division of Markets in the State Agriculture Department.

Under the amendments, effective June 14, these small-volume retailers are also exempt from buying an inspection stamp for each 15- dozen lot of eggs.

Retailers of more than five cases a week still must classify all the eggs they sell by U. S. standards of grade and size and must pay the inspection fees as well as obtain a State license.

Obtaining any portion of eggs to be sold from an out-of-state producer or from any other dealer disqualifies the small volume retailers from the license exemptions, the Division said.

The classification exemption does not relieve retailers of five cases or less a week from the requirement that dealers candle all eggs and remove inedible ones from sale, the Department said.

All egg retailers, handlers, dealers and wholesalers, except farmers who produce their own eggs, hatcheries, hotels, restaurants, bakeries, confectioneries, ice cream manufacturers, and consumers, must have a State egg handler's license.

The retailer's license, renewable April 1, is \$5 a year. Other license cost range from \$5 to \$50 depending upon the average weekly volume of eggs handled.

The law was passed to keep inferior eggs of Kentucky markets. Previous to the legislation, the state had become a dumping ground for eggs of bad quality from other states, the Marketing Division said.

Warning Issued On Sevin Dust

Injury to tobacco buds and leaves from the use of Sevin dust has been reported recently, according to Richard Thurston, UK Agricultural Experiment Station entomologist. However, no damage from the use of Sevin formulations has been reported to the Experiment Station.
