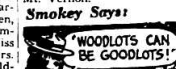

personnel to hold training lessons this year. We will have two lessons on health and home nursing. The training for which will be given at the medical center of the university, and U of K specialists will come here to give us four lessons in home furnishing. All of these lessons were requested by the women of our county.

It is hoped that more and more women will realize that these help to them are their just due, since their taxes are supporting the college which provides them, and that they will attend any of the Homemakers' clubs in the county. There are six clubs being regularly; two at Mt. Vernon, one each at Broadhead, Quail, Wildie and Conway, and membership is open to everyone.

We feel that the men of Rockcastle should realize that the women have a vote which should not be ignored, and that in the future, any candidate for office in the Fiscal Court should be prepared to answer questions as to how he feels about extension work here in the county.

Why am I writing this letter? I am the Wilderness District Director of the Kentucky Federation of Homemakers. There are nine counties in this District, and would be a poor director if I were not interested in seeing that Rockcastle County women have the advantages that all the others have. There is a new law which was passed this year to help counties who feel they cannot spare the money for extension work—perhaps the Court would be willing to check into the possibilities of this for next year.

are trying to do a good job, as we desire that they continue. The cities in this state might as well face the issue and treat sewage by sanitary or other means," he said. This was the first indication from a state official at Mt. Vernon's sewage problems have had the eye of the State Health Department and the Pollution Control Commission, though it is common knowledge that the Health Department had visited the area and discussed sewage with various residents. Last week Harlan and I were told by the commission to build sewer treatment plants. It has already been indicated that the ekestrake drainage pattern eventually takes water into the Cumberland and Herington Lake via Roundstone Creek, the Rockcastle River, and Dix River, thereby using concern to state and federal officials. Recently the federal government told the states, that stream pollution was becoming an increasing problem and must be stopped; and if it is by the states, the federal government would take the necessary action. Mr. Pickard also indicated

ed in his interview that the statement "We can't afford a sewer system" will not cut much ice with the Pollution Commission.

"It will be up to Mt. Vernon to show why they can't afford a sewer system, and that takes a lot of doing. We stand ready to give grants. There is also the possibility that Mt. Vernon could qualify for extra money through the Area Redevelopment Administration through tourism, and through industrial development. So to prove you can't afford a sewer system, you must deal in facts, not fancy. You must answer the question: Why can't you afford a sewer system?" the official stated.

He declared many cities in the state are far worse off than Mt. Vernon. "Mt. Vernon has, at most, an indebtedness of \$8,000 on its \$150,000 to \$200,000 water system. This is very good. The water system is in excellent financial condition as far as indebtedness is concerned, so it's going to take a lot of doing to show the city can't afford a sewer system," Mr. Pickard reasoned.

The director did state he felt that Mt. Vernon has a low water rate and one that is "not realistic." He also indicated sewer plans might

have to be re-arranged to take in more territory.

"I think before you go very far you'll have to raise your water rates again. You have a 50 percent sewer charge. That's 50 percent below the average. In many towns the sewer rate is 100 percent of the water bill, and in some towns it has been found that 150 percent is even more realistic," he noted.

Mr. Pickard said the Water Pollution Control Commission has "little choice but to pressure towns" to install sewer systems and treatment plants.

"But if we don't do it, the federal government will come in and do it for us. We feel Kentucky can solve its sewage and pollution problems itself. It is, after all, our obligation as we should assume it," he said.

In other action this week, the Housing and Home Administration of the federal government announced it had accepted Joseph R. Rubin, Louisville attorney, as municipal bond attorney to handle the sewer bond affairs of Mt. Vernon. Mr. Rubin received from the situation at Mt. Vernon and is expected shortly to begin drawing up ordinances affecting the sewer system.

## 1962 Wool Payments 44 Percent Of Dollar

Shorn wool payments for the 1961 marketing year will amount to 44.5 percent of the dollar returns each producer received from the sale of shorn wool during the year, the Department of Agriculture has announced.

R. O. Wilson, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, explains that this is the percentage necessary to bring the average wool price of 42.0 cents per pound up to the previously announced incentive level of 42 cents per pound under the national wool program.

Because producers thus will receive an incentive payment of \$44.50 for every \$100 received from the sale of shorn wool during the wool marketing year ended March 31, 1962. The payment for the previous year was \$47.60 per \$100 of marketing.

The payment rate on sales of lambs that have never been shorn to compensate for the wool on them will be 76 cents per hundredweight of live animals sold. This rate is based on the shorn wool payment and is designed to discourage unusual shearing of lambs before marketing. Because the average mohair price of 85.8 cents per pound received by producers was above the mohair support price of 73 cents per pound, no payments will be made on mohair sold during the 1961 marketing year.

Chairman Wilson mentioned that the ABCS County Offices will begin making payments within a few days. Applications for payment had to be filed not later than April 30, 1962. The payments will be made on shorn wool and unshorn lambs marketed from April 1, 1961, and through March 31, 1962.

For the current 1962 marketing year—including marketing from April 1, 1963, the incentive level for shorn wool is 42 cents per pound, the same for each of the preceding years of the program to date. Program regulations for the current marketing year also continue the same as for previous years.

## Too Much Nitrogen Tobacco Problem

Too much nitrogen may be causing problems in some Kentucky tobacco fields, according to W. D. Valteau, UK Ag Experiment Station plant pathologist. Just why the tobacco plants grow slowly and developed yellow lower leaves is not yet certain; but UK tobacco researchers believe that root damage due to excessive nitrates may be the cause.

During the past week, we have received numerous specimens of burley tobacco with the same symptoms. The growers report that the plants have grown slowly and recently appear to be getting smaller. The lower leaves are yellowing and some of them are developing dead spots similar to wilting. The dead spots are caused by unbalanced nutrition," Valteau pointed out.

An examination of the root systems of these plants show that nearly all of the roots are dead—but many of the plants are beginning to put out new roots.

"While the cause of this trouble is not entirely clear, tissue tests show that the plants are loaded with nutrients, particularly nitrates. It is well known that nitrates put in water will damage roots and that too much nitrogen in the soil is toxic to roots. Farmers are applying excessive quantities of nitrogen this year, so much so that root damage could be due to an overdose of ammonium nitrate," Valteau explains.

Some farmers who have this problem in their tobacco fields feel that side dressing with ammonium nitrate will "cure" the plants. This will NOT help, Valteau emphasized. Applying more ammonium nitrate can only make the condition worse.

spraying with fungicides is not the answer, either; since this damage is not caused by fungi, he points out.

Perhaps, as the damaged plants develop new roots on the buried stalk, they will start to grow, Valteau concludes. But adding more fertilizer or spraying with fungicide will not help.

## Dove Hunting Season Set In Kentucky

Seventy half-days of hunting for Kentucky dove hunters has been granted for this season by the Fish and Wildlife Resources Commission and the U. S. Department of Interior. Minor Clark, commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, has announced.

The season follows the same general pattern as for last year, with the first part of the split season being Sept. 1 through Oct. 31, and the second portion opening Dec. 1 and continuing through Dec. 9. The bag and possession limits remain the same as for last year, with 12 being permitted a day or 24 after two or more days of hunting. The two or more days possession limit applies to transporting or freezing and does not permit 24 in possession in a field. The hunting hours are from noon until sunset.

Woodcock may be shot from Nov. 15 through Dec. 24 with the bag limit being four and the possession limit eight. Shooting hours are from sunrise until sunset. The Wilson snipe season opens Nov. 15 and continues through Dec. 14, with shooting hours from sunrise to sunset. The bag and possession limit is eight.

## Voter Registration

Secretary of State Henry Carter today urged registered Kentuckians to register before Sept. 9 to vote in the Nov. 6 general election. State law provides that voters register in county clerk's offices or in temporary branch offices. Eligible Rockcastle Countians who are not sure where to register should check with the county clerk in the courthouse at Mt. Vernon.

Carter, chairman of the State Registration and Publication Board, said registration books in county courthouses will be closed Sept. 9 through Nov. 31. State law

requires the books be closed 50 days prior to and five days after an election.

The State Constitution provides that every citizen of the United States of the age of 18 years who has resided in the state one year, and in the county six months, and in the precinct in which he offers to vote 60 days next preceding the election, shall be a voter in said precinct and not elsewhere.
