

 ly decided to go ahead "full steam" through its decision to increase the water rate. In essence, the increase is an invitation to the protesting water customers to file suit—a put-up or shut-up situation.

The city fathers obviously believe they are on safe ground if a suit is filed. They look back to a 1961 Kentucky Court of Appeals ruling for their opinion. On March 24, 1961, Carl McClellan appeared to the Kentucky Court of Appeals as a Jefferson County Circuit Court ruling to have water rate increases imposed by the City of Louisville Water Company on users who file the city limits declared void.

The appeal followed Circuit Judge S. E. Lampe's ruling for the Louisville Water Company that the company could change its rates without a hearing before the Public Service Commission.

The Court of Appeals held that "the increases in rates are not illegal and void on the ground set forth in the complaint. The court noted 'While we recognize that this decision deprives non-resident utility customers of the protection of the Public Service Commission against excessive rates or inadequate service, nevertheless matters of this character are of legislative rather than judicial concern.'

In short, the remedy as seen by the court was in the State Legislature. No remedy came from the Legislature at its last session, leaving the 1961 ruling in effect.

On the ground of this decision, the Mt. Vernon City Council sticks out its chin and asks the protestants to take a swing.

Any suit filed would be filed in Rockcastle Circuit Court. From that point there could be a flurry of suits before the matter was finally settled. There could be a suit in circuit court, an appeal, a possible second appeal, a counter-suit by the

city; a counter-suit by the state Water Pollution Control Commission; a counter-suit by the federal Water Pollution Control Commission, with several accompanying appeals. During these suits the city could ask for a bond from the protestants, anywhere from \$10,000 to \$100,000.

All these problems, and others, occupied the council at its meeting. But one thing was obvious through the whole proceedings: The council does not have the slightest idea of abandoning the sewer system at this point, come lawsuits or high water.
