Sleepy was an early Renfro Valley performer before branching out on his many radio, television and contest appearances.

Featured at some of the shows staged at various times during the Fair, will be the famous "Coo-Coo Creek Girls." All these girls have married and gone their separate ways. They are reuniting for Lair's reunion.

During the course of the Fair, from Friday, September 7, through Saturday, September 15, scores of Renfro Valley Folks will "pick and strum" the songs that made a barn in Renfro Valley, Kentucky, the Country Music Capital of the World.

Renfro Comic Slim Miller Dies After Long Illness

"Slim" Miller, 64, nationally-known comedian, "old-time fiddler" of the Renfro Valley Barn Dance, died Monday at Veteran's Hospital, Lexington, after a long illness.

He was a victim of cancer, and had been seriously ill for more than two years.

"Slim" as he was known to his thousands of fans, was one of the few remaining vaudeville-type comics. He parodied over-sized overalls, a banana, and an old-time fiddle into national fame.

He had been a star of the Renfro Valley Barn Dance since John Lair brought the show to Renfro Valley in 1929.

Slim's ability to make an audience laugh was unquestioned. His bouncing baggy pants, the crouching and uncrashing of his long legs, the loss of a banana he had just peeled, and his steady stare at the audience, became trademarks of his career that spread over more than 40 years. It was his name on the marquee, so to speak, that helped bring thousands of tourists to Renfro Valley, and back again.

A Music Corporation of America vice president once commented that Slim's "timing" on his jokes and actions was the best in show business, a fine tribute to any performer.

Most of his contemporaries fretted their throats for his dedication to the stage and radio, as well as his off-stage antics. He often left an autographed copy of his favorite picture (above) on the tables in the restaurants in which he ate. The picture shows him in a life serious moment in his life

were during the last year of his painful illness.

Slim was born Homer Edgar Miller in Linton, Ind., near Indianapolis. From an early age he became interested in both comedy and music, finally settling on the violin. His interest, however, did not lie in serious music, and he turned to "fiddling" with a combination of comedy.

His first work on the stage was around Indianapolis, and this work was continued for several years, with the exception of an undetermined time spent in the Army in World War I.

Cox Bonds Total \$4,000

Bonds totaling \$4,000 have been set for William Burch Cox, 24, of Woodbine, who shot it out with police last week at Renfro Valley.

County Judge Charles C. Carter set a \$3,000 bond on a charge of "shooting at without wounding with intent to kill" and \$1,000 on a "grand larceny" charge.

To date Cox has not filled the bonds and remains in the county jail.

Cox and State Police troopers exchanged shots last week after State Trooper Darrell Steele attempted to stop Cox on a speeding charge. Trooper Steele reported Cox shot at him after Cox wrecked his car at Renfro Valley and fled on foot.

Cox was apprehended about an hour later at state and county police when he emptied his pistol at the officers.

Lillard Renner Funeral Conducted

Lillard Renner, 53, of Lockland, Ohio, and former resident of Sand Springs, died Aug. 21 at Lockland, Ohio.

Mr. Renner was a native of Rockcastle County.

Besides his wife, Mrs. Betty Renner, of Lockland, he is survived by nine children: Billy Renner, of Mason, Ohio; Benton Renner, of Reading, Ohio; Mrs. Martha Stacy of Cincinnati, Ohio; Mrs. Marcella Stacy, of Maud, Ohio; Elzie, Sue, Dorsetta, Marylyn and Corliss Renner, all at home.

Two sisters survive: Mrs. Rosie Burke of Stanford, and Mrs. Pearl Dalley, of Mt. Vernon; one half-sister, Mrs. Edie Renner, three half-brothers: Walter, Leonard and Wilson Renner, all of Mt. Vernon, and his step-mother, Mrs. Oley Kelsey.

County, State Sign Road Agreements

Agreements for hauling rock for county primary and secondary roads have been made between state and county officials, according to an announcement by County Judge C. C. Carter.

County trucks are to replace trucks used in the past by road contracting firms. For the use of county trucks, the county will receive about \$29,400 from the state representing about 4,000 truck loads of rock, Judge Carter reported.

The agreements are in three contracts. One contract is for 17,000 tons of creek gravel at a hauling allowance of 60 cents per yard. The creek gravel will be used on roads where needed. One example would be the Hummel Road beginning at Renfro Valley.

A second contract is for 9,000 tons of creek gravel at a hauling allowance of one dollar a yard to be used on new roads such as the Cooper Creek Road.

A third contract is for 18,000 tons of crushed stone for hauling allowance of 60 cents per ton. The crushed stone will be spread on primary roads where needed.

Judge Carter said the state determines where gravel and rock is spread. He said state road officials and magistrates have gone over county roads to establish a public works magistrate will receive about 800 loads of gravel for each district.

"We'll have more rock on county roads than we have ever had before, by far," Judge Carter said.

He also reported county roads are in fairly good shape now. He noted there were two or three roads where sections are not in good shape, mostly in the Fifth District where floods in the past have hit. He said some government help may be forthcoming on these roads.

Judge Carter also announced the purchase of two 1933 Ford 2-ton dump trucks for use by the county which the model is available, as well as a new Massey Ferguson gravel loader to replace an older loader.

Both the Bank of Mt. Vernon and the Citizens Bank at Broadhead will be closed on Labor Day.

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Wrecks Injure Five Motorists

Five persons were injured in two separate automobile accidents that occurred a mile apart on U. S. 26 with one case-half hours Sunday.

Clawson, Irene Stoney, 21, Williamsburg, and Charles W. Henson, 37, Paint Lick, were hospitalized at the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital. She suffered cuts and bruises on the face and body. Henson received head and back injuries.

Mr. Clawson was hurt in an accident about four miles north of here State Trooper Darrell Steele said Clarence Toomey, 18, Indianapolis, Ind., lost control of his north-bound car on wet pavement and it went into the south-bound lane and struck the auto driven by Gillis Clawson, 49, husband of the injured woman.

Clawson suffered cuts and bruises and a laceration and Toomey received head cuts. Neither was hospitalized. Trooper Steele said Toomey was cited for driving on the wrong side of the highway.

State Trooper William Martin said a car driven by Clyde Marshall Rickels stopped about 1:30 p. m., three miles north of here and the auto driven by Henson struck the rear of Rickels' vehicle.

The legislation authorized the president to order work started on federal, state and local construction projects ranging from big dams to small swimming pools -- in localities plagued with chronic high unemployment.

LET'S NOT DRAG OUR FEET

Wednesday the House of Representatives passed President John Kennedy's public works bill providing 900 million dollars to be spent within a year in areas of chronic unemployment for which Rockcastle would qualify.

A previous bill had been passed by the Senate, but the House made some revisions, increased the money, and sent it back to the Senate to approve the changes. The chances are, the Senate will ok the measure in a few days.

If the bill is approved, the government will pay 50 percent, and in some cases 75 percent, of the cost of all kinds of building projects.

Here is a list of projects that will be included in the bill: Dams, courthouses, jails, libraries, swimming pools, parks, sewer systems, and water works.

Say, for example, a courthouse would cost \$250,000. The county could get one for \$125,000, or possibly \$65,000. A swimming pool valued at \$50,000 could be built for \$25,000, or possibly \$15,000. A \$400,000 sewer system could be built for \$200,000, or possibly \$100,000.

In anyone's book this is a tremendous offer of assistance. For possibly the only time in this century will such an offer be open to the citizens of Rockcastle County. With virtually no county and city indebtedness, it would not work a great hardship to repay some of these 50 percent, and 25 percent loans for building, and services that would so greatly improve the county, and that will eventually be needed.

We believe county and city officials should investigate with all speed this golden opportunity that lies before them. It is their duty to see that the needs of the people of Rockcastle County are met at the lowest possible cost.

The time to act is NOW! Let's not drag our feet!




