

The Department's Division of Livestock Sanitation expects cattle brucellosis to be under control in all 150 counties during 1951. Each county is now in some phase of the program in which the division gives free tests and pays farmers for infected animals which are destroyed.

8 From County Get Mental Help

A record-breaking 1,776 mentally and physically handicapped Kentuckians were rehabilitated during the past fiscal year by the Bureau of Rehabilitation

Services of the Kentucky Department of Education. In Rockcastle County eight persons were rehabilitated and 24 cases served by the Bureau of Rehabilitation. Segitia.

Ben F. Coffman, director of the bureau, said this figure is a 29 percent increase over the 1,475 persons rehabilitated in 1960-61.

The bureau does not classify a person as rehabilitated until he is fully employed. Coffman said many of those rehabilitated had previously been receiving relief payments.

In a year-end report submitted to Superintendent of Public Instruction Wendell P. Butler, Coffman said the rehabilitation bureau spent \$1,110,523 providing services to 4,370 people in all of the state's 120 counties. People were rehabilitated to employment in every county, he said.

In addition to rehabilitation services, Coffman said training services were provided for 1,191 people and 535 others were enrolled in college.

Property Owners Get State Funds

Rockcastle County property owners have received a \$128.20 share of the \$37,218.80 reimbursement that has been made to Kentucky property owners for losses due to dogs. Agriculture Commissioner Emerson Besuchamp announced here today.

Payments were for losses occurring between July 1, 1961, and June 30, 1962. Besuchamp declared that

payments have been made on the basis of the full, current market value of the animals destroyed or injured.

In order for a claim to be valid, Besuchamp said, three conditions must be met: 1. The ownership of the dog or dogs causing the damage must be unknown. 2. The county where the loss occurs must be in compliance with the dog law through the sale of licenses and the operation of a dog pound. 3. The owner sustaining the loss must not own or

harbor any unlicensed dogs. State Dog Law Administrator, Karl W. Vick, reports that indemnity checks have

been mailed out to 692 claimants in 87 counties. Rockcastle County property owners receiving indemnities and the amounts of the payments follow: Clyde Linville, Route 1, Mt. Vernon, \$112.20; Allen Rankin, Route 1, Brodhead, \$16.80.

Cox Resignation Accepted

As expected, Henry Cox, superintendent of the Mt. Vernon Water Works, resigned as superintendent at a meeting of the council Thursday night.

His letter stated he resigned without malice or animosity, but that he felt he could no longer serve the Water Works in its best interests.

The council accepted his resignation in a unanimous vote.

After the vote, the council passed a resolution commending Mr. Cox for his 22 years of work with the city.

No replacement for the superintendent was mentioned at the meeting. The council agreed to advertise for a new superintendent. Finding a superintendent may not be easy since the State Highway Department must approve the applicant.

The council was told the State Highway Department got no bidders for concreting US 25 between Main Street and US 150 intersection in downtown Mt. Vernon. The

state will re-bid the project, but offered little hope that a contractor would be found because of the small amount of surplus involved in the bid.

The council voted to set up McFerron Street for blacktopping. The city will do the preliminary work such as ditching and the state will furnish the blacktop.

In final action, the council voted to write Congressman asking that preliminary work on a dam on the Rocky River be speeded up now that funds are available under the Area Re-Development program.

Charles R. Rader Buried At Brush Creek

Charles Robert Rader, 74, of Orlando, died in a Hamilton, Ohio, hospital Sept. 10 of a heart condition. He had been ill about four days.

Mr. Rader, a retired railroader and a veteran of World War I, was born in Rockcastle County, son of George and Sara Powell Rader.

Besides his wife, Lela Mae Rader, he is survived by four daughters and two sons: Mrs. Viola Lawwell, Falmouth; Mrs. Sallie Evered, Hamilton, Ohio; Mrs. Christine Johnson, Irvine; Mrs. Beale Nail, Carlebas, N. C.; Charles Rader, Jr., and James E. Rader, both of Hamilton, Ohio. One sister, Mrs. Lou Williams, Mt. Vernon, survives, as well as 11 grandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted Sept. 13 at Sparks Funeral Home Chapel with Bro. Lester Arnold, and Charles Rader officiating. He was buried in Brush Field Cemetery at Brush Creek.

In its decision, the county's doctors said that this was a crucial year in the continued life of the Rockcastle Health Department, and that voters should be allowed to express themselves as to whether they want expanded services and facilities.

A writ of mandamus would, in effect, ask the Rockcastle Circuit Court to rule on the terminology of Kentucky Health Statute 212.730, and if found that the law is mandatory, to order the Rockcastle Fiscal Court to put the tax on the ballot.

A mandamus writ is basically an order compelling an officer of the government to act on a law.

At the last meeting of the Fiscal Court, Dr. M. A. Shepherd, county health officer, asked the court to put the health tax on the ballot. No motion was made by the court and the matter died. Since there was no action either way on the tax measure, a writ of mandamus would force the court to comply with the law, as ruled by Judge R. C. Tarrar.

In a letter to the local health department, John E. Godfrey, Jr., director of the Division of Legal Services of the State Health Department, Frankfort, wrote this week:

"Our Bureau of Local Health Services has informed me that since our department has arisen concerning whether it is 'mandatory' or 'discretionary' for the fiscal court to adopt a resolution submitting the public health tax question to the electorate of the county after it has received a certified copy of the resolution of the county board of health directing that the question be placed on the ballot at the next general election. KRS 212.720 reads in part as follows:

"Upon request of any county or city-county board of health except in counties containing a city of the first class, the fiscal court of the county shall adopt a resolution submitting to the qualified voters of the county, the question as to whether a public health taxing district (Continued on page 4)

Works Bill Becomes Law

The Senate has passed an anti-recession bill authorizing a \$90 million dollar expenditure on quick-action public works projects in depressed areas.

Rockcastle County is listed as a depressed area.

The bill will authorize \$90 million dollars to provide jobs in economically distressed areas during the next year. The emphasis will be on projects that could be started quickly.

Eligible projects would include airports, highways, hospitals, dams, water pollution control and community facilities.

The money could be spent in areas eligible for aid under the 1961 Depressed Areas Act and in communities having six percent or more unemployment in nine of the past 13 months.

The federal government would pay 50 percent of the cost of the projects in most cases and 75 percent in the case of communities which could not afford to pay half.

In Kentucky, plans are being made to disperse the funds. A three-man expedient committee to insure early action on the projects has been at work since early June. Arrangements have (Continued on page 4)

Schools Low In Drop-Outs

A six-year trend study just completed on the holding power and whereabouts of recent graduates of all Kentucky high schools shows Rockcastle county high schools ranked below the state average in terms of low average drop-out rate.

The study, made by the research division of the State Department of Education, shows that of 228 students who entered the ninth grade during the 1957 school year, 138 or 60.4 percent were graduated from high school in 1961.

The state average of students who entered the ninth grade of public high schools in 1957 and went on to be graduated in 1961 is 61.4 percent. The average for both public and non-public schools is 63 percent.

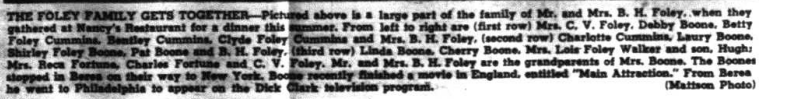
Figures for the 1961 graduating class are the latest available. The whereabouts of 1962 graduates will be included in an annual report also scheduled for publication by the Department of Education in October. This annual report is the primary source of data for the trend study.

The study also shows that county schools were below the state average in the percentage of 1961 graduates who entered college. Of the students who were graduated in 1961, 26.4 percent of the class entered college during the fall of 1961. The state average of 1961 graduates who entered college during 1961 was 26.7 percent.

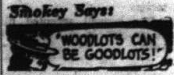

Our Courthouse Dream

Now that the depressed areas bill has passed congress and funds are to be made available for the construction of various community facilities in Kentucky counties, of which Rockcastle is one, at least one project in the county is within the reach of reality.

One such project could be a new courthouse and jail.

In the April 19, 1962 issue of the Signal, Judge C. C. Carter announced he had applied for a federal loan for the construction of a much needed county building to be constructed at the rear of the courthouse. The building was to have cost \$65,000 with the loan repaid at a three and three-eighths percent interest rate.

The county's share of the project would be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$32,000. The repayment of the cost of the building would have come from rent saved from various county offices, such as agriculture, health, and others, scattered over Mt. Vernon.

The Depressed Areas bill now passed by Congress, says the government will now furnish, in cases of extreme need, 75 percent of a project if the borrower can furnish 25 percent.

If the county takes the \$32,000 for the proposed building, this would mean approximately \$130,000 would be available for a courthouse and jail.

The day is fast approaching when both these buildings will become necessary. We do not believe there is a single man, woman, or child, in the county who would not be grateful for a pretty, modern courthouse and jail on the present courthouse site, and make some sacrifice to see it constructed.

The buildings would not have to be as elaborate and as large as say, London's new courthouse. A modernistic building, completely functional, and in the spirit of Roundstone School, could be built considerably cheaper and be a great asset to the county and town.

We do not advocate the county putting itself into a deep financial hole. But we do advocate a complete investigation, and quickly, of what money is available to the county. Perhaps a new courthouse and jail might not be a dream any longer.

couldn't get a motion by any one of the five magistrates, so naturally your resolution died.

Dr. Shepherd comes along and paints such a pretty picture of his program but doesn't state facts.

First, he quotes Public Health Statute 212.720 and says this will bring into the county an appropriation of \$4,364.

Dr. Shepherd, if you would have gone and examined the budget you would have found that this, the county's part, would amount to between \$8,000 and \$9,000 not \$4,364 as you stated. Then too, there is not one syllable in Section 212.720 that says we would receive \$36,257 or any other amount. Another thing about your program is, as you say in the Signal, two additional health nurses, a full-time sanitarian, a health educator, a nutritionist, will be added to the health staff.

Section 212.720 does not say that two additional nurses, a sanitarian, a health educator, a nutritionist, nor anyone else will be added to the health staff. It does say that we would have a taxing district.

I'm wondering if people want to pay more taxes, or if they think they pay enough as it is now.

I invite all the people to read Section 212.720 and see what it says.

The facts about matters of this sort are they always try to give you a sugar-coated pill, but when the sugar is licked off the pill has a turpentine center that you can't swallow.

The whole thing in a nutshell is you, Dr. Shepherd, went to promote a program and have taxpayers pay for

it. The purpose of the Fiscal Court is to look after the interest of all the people of the county and not two or three for selfish reasons.

This program would mean there would be a 10 cent levy on each \$100 of taxable property. The railroads and franchisees are the biggest taxpayers in the county and I would like for Dr. Shepherd, or anyone else, to show me how it would benefit them in any way doing.

What are you doing, Dr. Shepherd, trying to run our railroads and other taxpayers out of our country?

I hope this will enlighten the people and give them a clear picture of both sides of this question.

Now, I have no bones to pick with Dr. Shepherd, but will say, I had rather have a mild case of the seven-year itch, than to have to listen to him. I could scratch the itch and it would feel good, but he can't do anything to make me feel good while having to listen to him talk. I don't swallow pills until I examine them."

shall be established for the county.

"KRS 446.010 provides as follows: "As used in the statute laws of this state, (23) 'shall' is mandatory."

"In addition, the Court of Appeals has consistently ruled that the term 'shall' means that the act is mandatory and not discretionary.

"It is therefore, the opinion of this office that the fiscal court does not have any discretion within the matter as is compelled by the mandatory language of KRS 212.720 to adopt the resolution, submitting the health tax

issue to the voters of the county."

The health tax would cost taxpayers no more than 10 cents on the \$100 property assessment. It could be any amount under 10 cents.

For example, a taxpayer whose property is assessed at \$500 would pay, at most, 50 cents a year. On \$1,000 property assessment, the tax would be one dollar a year.

For the approximate \$4,364 the county assessment would realize, the State Health Department says the county will realize \$36,257. The county got \$16,767 this year.

The Health Department will have to hurry to get its measure on the ballot. A writ of mandamus acted quickly would assure the voters of the opportunity to vote on the measure in November, Dr. Shepherd said.
