## Library Ideas Are Changing These Days

To many people, the term "librarian" denotes a prim, book-ridden individual who frowns a lot about books.

In a field given over largely to a woman, the ideal is "Marian, the Librarian," before she is exposed to the rascally "Music Man" in the Broadway show of that name.

Hardly tied to their desks and hardly the stay-at-homes are Kentucky's 10 regional librarians, each having shelf space stretching into three or more counties.

The regional library is a State-administered, multi-county headquarters staffed by a regional librarian, and an assistant in some cases, plus clerical workers provided by the Department of Libraries. This headquarters library receives library materials from the division books, records, films, periodicals framed pictures—and distributes them to member-libraries of the region.

The regional library contains a large book collection, and more reference materials and periodicals, all of which are circulated among the other libraries as needs arise.

A regional library board, usually composed of one member from each county library board, and one regional librarian act as a liaison between member counties and the Department in Frankfort.

Key members of the Kentucky Department of Libraries Region include regional program, these librarians—seven women and three men do a constant selling and circulating job in the 51 counties they serve. All are professionally qualified people, but there is little of the book-circulating routine connected with their jobs.

The Valley of Parks Library Region includes Pulaski, Rockcastle, Laurel, Clay, Bell and Whitley counties. Regional librarian Miss Clo Era Sewell has her headquarters at London.

County officials are taking no chances that a prisoner in the Rockcastle County jail, who was involved in a gun fight at Renfro Valley on Aug. 23, will find a way to escape from jail a second time.

Mt. Vernon's \$419,000 sewer project got a boost this week when the State Health Department increased its grant to the city by about \$36,000.

The \$36,000 increase is automatic and came about through additional money allocated by Congress under the newly approved \$90 million dollar public works program.

The additional money brings the total amount granted by the State Health Department to Mt. Vernon to \$75,000. The money comes to the state through the federal Stream Pollution Commission in Washington. The grant does not have to be repaid by the city.

All towns in Kentucky now involved in sewer projects will get increases through State Health Department grants.

The additional money will not affect the status of Mt. Vernon's new water-sewer rate, or reduce the amount of the city's approved loan of the city's approved loan of the city's approved loan.

The grant will mean that some areas in the city limits where it was considered unfeasible to build sewer lines may now have sewer service.

The money must be spent on the sewer contract. This will leave more money in the city's general fund to do future water line work, city officials pointed out.

City officials also pointed out that with the additional money some property owners adjoining the city who want sewer service could now have this service by coming into the city limits. One particular area mentioned was West Main Street. However, residents must indicate their willingness to be a part of the city.

Plans and specification for the new sewer system are now being drawn up by City Engineer Jack Crawford. The plans are expected to be completed by December.

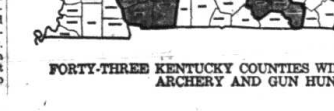
## Siler Writes On Local Dam

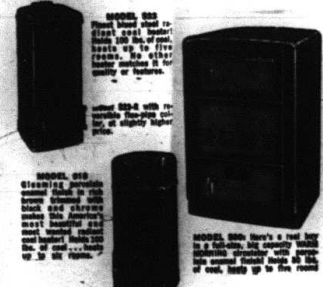

### Guill Train Visit Set For London

The Guill Train, sometimes called the Kentucky Crafts Train, will be in London on September 26-29. This exhibit, the first of its kind in the nation, is a two-car train designed to show and demonstrate the Arts and Crafts program in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.
