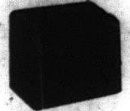

Broadhead Board Gives OK To \$150,000 Sewer Plans

Initial planning for a sewer-water project costing about \$150,000 was begun by the Broadhead Board of Trustees at a meeting Monday night.

The board entered into a contract with Crawford & Crawford, engineers, of Reno Valley, and instructed him to apply for a grant under the newly approved federal public works program and to begin a preliminary survey which could eventually terminate in a sewer system-disposal plant, and probable expansion of water services in the town.

The decision of the Board to go ahead with the sewer-water project came as no surprise now that 50 percent, and in some cases 75 percent, of the cost of sewer and other projects is available under the government program. About a year ago, the Board voted a preliminary survey, but the survey was not made and no survey contract was signed.

At the meeting, the Board, as well as several civic and business people expressed the belief the city would "miss a good thing" if an application for a grant were not made.

The Board generally felt that since there was no little indebtedness in the city water works, and with the sewerage problem in the city becoming a major concern now would be a good time to begin to solve the sewage problem.

The Board, and Engineer Crawford, did not go into any details on the proposed system, such as sewer line locations, rates, and other charges. These items would be unknown until the survey is completed and discussed by the Board.

The survey contract entered into between Mr. Crawford and the city will not cost the city money if the financing of the project cannot be arranged. A survey must be presented by some general plan, before the government would grant the city the money.

The Board, nor Mr. Crawford, does not know the exact amount of the proposed system at this time. That will also have to await the findings of the survey as to the feasibility of the system. The \$150,000 figure is a general figure. The project could cost more or less.

The financing of the city's sewerage project would likely be done with revenues bonds, similar to those to be used in Mt. Vernon's proposed system. The bonds would call for an interest rate of three and three-eighths percent.

made their decent. The plane was not damaged.

The pilot, who lives across KY 461 from the field, heard the plane land and went to be of assistance. He brought the two young men to Mt. Vernon where they stayed the night in a motel.

Came the dawn, they were up, and with several local citizens, they went to make the decision. How do we get out here?

The answer proved more simple than expected. A first try failed because of heavy fog. The second try was successful. The sun dried the grass and the two young men got out of the plane and on their way to New Hampshire without mishap.

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Police Clinic Planned Here

A county-wide oral polio immunization program is being planned for Rockcastle County.

The first series of clinics, for both children and adults, will be held October 22 through 28, Dr. M. A. Shepherd, Health Officer, announced.

Type II of the oral polio vaccine will be offered at that time. (Types I and III will be given later in the year, or early in 1953.)

All members of the family—adults as well as children—are urged by Dr. Shepherd to participate in this mass immunization program aimed at eradicating polio from Rockcastle County.

In addition to all who start the immunizations during the week of October 22, those pre-school children about 64 in all—who received the Type I vaccine in July should come in for Type II in October. The vaccine will be given, as before, on a lump of sugar—to be taken by mouth.

In order to accommodate everyone in the county, individual clinics will be located over the county at schools or near post offices in the various communities. The dates and location will be announced soon. Parents should watch for the announcement of the time and place of the community clinic nearest their residence.

\$400,000 Courthouse-Jail Planning Contract Awarded

WHY A NEW COURTHOUSE AND JAIL?

A contract to begin preliminary architectural design work on new courthouse and jail for Rockcastle County was approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a meeting Tuesday.

The court entered into a contract with Bayless, Clotfelter & Johnson, Lexington architect firm, to draw up preliminary designs and plans for the new structure that is expected to cost about \$400,000.

The court also instructed county officials to prepare an application for a grant from the federal government under the newly enacted public works program through which the government grants depressed areas 50 percent, and in some cases 75 percent, of certain public projects.

Should a courthouse-jail cost \$400,000, it is likely, if approved, the federal government would grant \$200,000. The county would have to finance \$200,000.

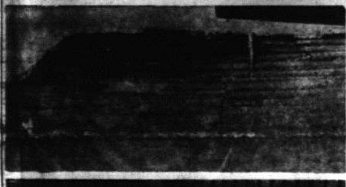
The \$400,000 figure is a general figure. The building could cost less. The cost will depend on what the court wants to include in the building.

Financing the county's share of the new courthouse-jail would probably be done through revenue bonds, similar to those to be used to finance sewer projects at Mt. Vernon and Brodhead. Money to pay off the loan and the three and three-eighths percent interest rate on the bonds would come from rent from the many county, state, and federal offices scattered over the town and other items.

It was pointed out at the meeting that the present courthouse and jail are in need of extensive remodeling and repair. This remodeling will eventually be a necessity and could easily cost \$100,000. However, at this date if extensive remodeling and repairs have to be done by the county alone on the 80-year-old building, the money would have to come from other sources such as an increased tax rate, general obligation bonds, property assessment, or other means.

The court apparently felt large grants are available at this time it would be easier on property owners if the grants could be exchanged and revenue bonds issued on new and expanded facilities.

Representatives of the architectural firm told the court the firm was willing to do the preliminary work at no cost. If the financing could not be arranged, there would be no charge to the county. The court must have (Continued on page 4)

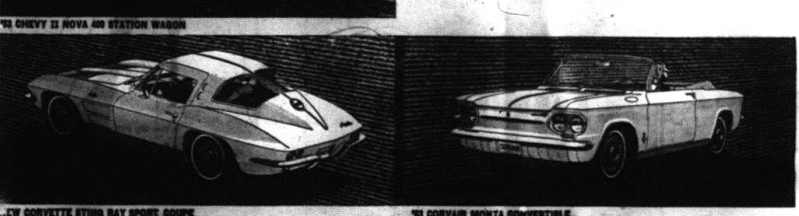
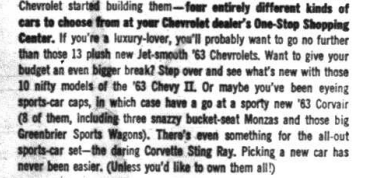
