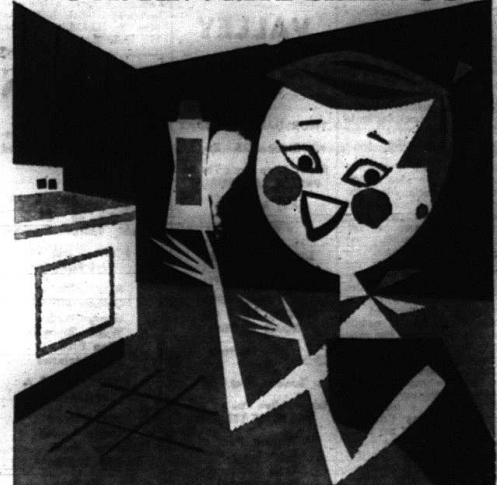

ONCE THE OLD SWIMMING HOLE...

Was Swimming Pool

Kids, Mt Papa and Mamma by chance wouldn't like the idea of a new swimming pool in Mt. Vernon, just remind them that they built a pool way back in their young days, and what's good enough for them should be good enough for you.

And indeed, Mt. Vernon did have a swimming pool, that everyone appreciated, but admittedly it didn't last long.

As a matter of fact, if you had looked in on Mt. Vernon in the summer of 1923, you possibly could have seen and heard your father, or mother, or grandfather, or grandmother, happily splashing and yelling in the Mt. Vernon swimming pool, incidentally, the only pool known in Eastern Kentucky at the time.

The story of this "unusually progressive" endeavor was told this week by Fred Baker.

One afternoon in August 1924, nine men from Mt. Vernon conferred, on what they believed to be a money-making adventure. They were: Fred Baker, Bentley Sparks, B. H. Parsons and the late R. A. Sparks, Fred Owens, R. H. Miller, F. E. Miller, F. L. Durham and R. L. Langford. The group formed the Mt. Vernon Amusement Company and purchased 5 shares each at \$20 a share. Later they contributed additional money.

A swimming pool apparently was a good idea at the time. Swimming and water fun had taken over. "Water."

Mr. Hayes told her to give him a pint of whisky or he would shoot. She said she gave him the whisky, he left, and she called police.

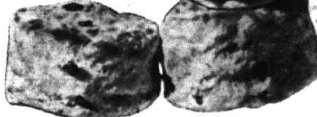

A Matter Of Staying Alive

After an "alert" signal and before a "Take Cover" signal, turn your radio to 640 or 1240; put emergency measures at home into effect; make preparations to evacuate your home.

Follow official directions and under no conditions do not panic. To panic could cost you your life and the lives of your loved one. If told to go to a shelter: Move dependent persons to the shelter; turn radio to 640 or 1240; move supplies and equipment to shelter or to vehicle which will move you to the shelter; cut off utility switches and valves; move family to shelter.

If told to evacuate the area: Turn car radio to 640 or 1240; move dependent persons; load supplies and equipment; cut off utility switches and valves; lock doors; proceed along evacuation route, or according to instructions. Do not try to pass vehicles in long lines. The resulting traffic jam could be fatal and many accidents could occur.

If you are in an auto when a "Take Cover" signal is given, pick up radio and take cover in the best available shelter.

After an attack or a signal is given that fallout is in the area, stay in the shelter until given official directions to leave.

It is estimated that fallout over Rockcastle could be a state remaining in a shelter for two weeks.

SHELTER CHECKLIST

Below is listed many of the items that will come in handy should you have to remain in a shelter for an extended period of time.

Food and Cooking Equipment—Water (2-week supply, a minimum of 7 gallons per person), preferably canned, 24 1/2 quart supply; eating utensils; paper plates, cups, and napkins; openers for cans and bottles; pocket knife, special food and medicines for babies and the sick.

Sanitation Supplies—Can for garbage; covered pail for toilet purposes; can for human wastes; toilet tissue, paper towels; sanitary napkins, disposable diapers, ordinary and waterless soap; grocery bags, newspapers for soil bags; household chemicals and DDT; waterproof gloves.

Shelter Equipment—Batteries, radio and spare batteries; portable X-ray radiation meters if available; flashlight, electric lanterns and batteries; plenty of warm clothing and covering bedding; first aid kit; writing material; reading material; screwdriver, pliers and other household tools; games and amusements for children; matches; personal use items.

And above all, if you are in a community shelter, be sure to abide by the law, have consideration for your fellowshelterers, and be ready to volunteer for any service that you might be called on to render.

Once Over Lightly

IF YOU'RE trying to raise some money for your favorite charity, I'd like to suggest a Poison Oak Festival for the children in your county. (Confidentially, I've made this suggestion many times before and never gotten anywhere with it but I still can't understand why.)

The Festival would be a contest open to all children in the county who have poison oak. This would be at least 75 per cent of them and their parents would be delighted to enter them because they are all convinced that their children can catch poison oak faster and have it worse than anybody else's children. You could charge a dollar a child entry fee and, even after awarding valuable prizes for the various events in the contest, have a big chunk left over for charity.

First prize would be for the worst over-all case of poison oak and then the rest of the prize money would be split up among the specialists—children who specialize in getting the stuff just in certain spots.

For example, there would be the Face Division prize for children who can walk through a patch of the stuff but, instead of getting it on their legs and ankles get it on their chests and around their eyes. Then their faces puff up like balloons and look like Winston Churchill with mosquito bites.

Then there would be the Seat Division prize for those who make a specialty of sitting in the stuff. The prize in this division should be of a higher value than the Face Division prize because a child can apply lotion to her face without any trouble. And in addition to events like these, you could have the Festival by holding a Will Power Contest. Line up all the children having poison oak and the one who can get the longest without scratching wins. The winning time should be around seven seconds.

Check School Before Taking Civil Service Course

Joseph A. Connor, regional director of the Chicago Region, US Civil Service Commission, announced today that complaints have been received from persons living in the vicinity of Rockcastle County regarding the activities of salesmen representing so-called 'civil - service schools'.

Some of these organizations make exaggerated claims about job opportunities and about the help they can give getting people jobs with the Federal Government. Some give the impression that they are connected with the Government when they are not. Their salesman may sometimes imply that if a person takes their particular course they will get a certain job in a certain Federal installation. Often there is no such job, or if there is one, it is a job which the Federal agency seldom, if ever, fills by recruiting someone from outside the service because they are usually filled by promotion from within.

Mr. Connor stated that no 'civil-service' course is required to take a civil service examination or to learn about job opportunities. No 'civil-service' course can guarantee that a person can pass the written tests often required for Federal jobs. For many jobs persons need specific training or experience in the particular field of work. For example, a carpenter must have carpentry experience, a nurse must have completed the proper nursing training, and so on. For some jobs a period of apprenticeship may be required. No 'civil-service' school course will qualify a person for any of these requirements.

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Former County Man Retires From Navy

They piped Sherman V. Arnold over the side in traditional Navy style and he went home a civilian for the first time in 25 years.

He is the son of Jim Arnold, Mt. Vernon.

Chief Aviation Ordnanceman Arnold went briskly through the colorful ceremonies in the Navy Recruiting Office on Vine Street, Cincinnati, Ohio, then slid into the back of a car for his last ride home, tears in his eyes.

A young veteran of 41 the old friendly Arnold said goodbye to the Navy which he joined when he bolted class and ran away from home. And he really saw the world.

"I've had some grand times and some terrifying times," he said, "but thank God, I never was wounded."

There were many troubled ones but there were peaceful ones.

During World War II he was assigned to various ships in the Pacific Task Force with such commanders as Adm. William F. Halsey and Adm. Chester Nimitz.

There were engagements at Guadalcanal, New Georgia, Iwo Jima, Dutch Harbor in Alaska, Midway, Coral Sea, the Marshall and Gilbert Islands, Rabaul and the East Indies where the fleet, joined by British forces, fired the great oil refineries of the Japanese.

He was aboard the USS Saratoga at Iwo Jima when she was hit by five suicide planes.

"We thought she was gone," he said. "She was helpless for five hours. They were really looking for us then, trying every way to sink us, but somehow we got away. It was hell for a few hours though."

He was aboard the USS Boxer when she caught fire during the Korean War, flames roared within tanks of high-voltage fuel in which gasoline for planes was stored. The Boxer managed to get away and limp to Japan for repairs.


In October 1960, he was assigned to the Cincinnati Recruiting Office on his last tour of active duty.

Chief Arnold, his wife and two daughters, Brenda and Terry, as well as his mother, Mrs. Mary Arnold, live in Cincinnati.
