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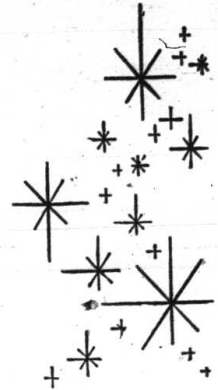
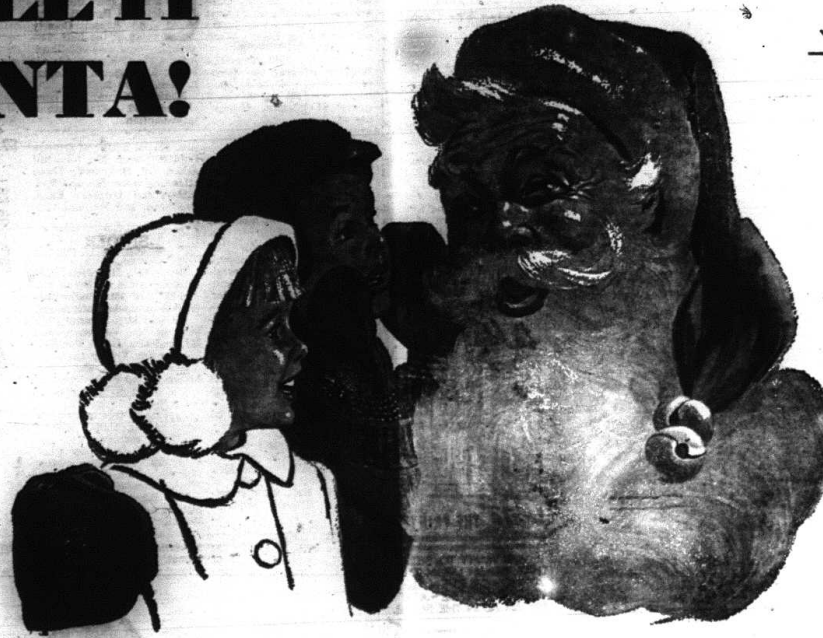

How far the suit will go to halt the sewer system remains to be seen. The State Health Department is the unknown quantity in the whole affair. The State Health Department has indicated it will come into court as soon as a suit is filed. As a last measure, the State Health Department could conceivably declare the town's sewage problems a menace to health and continue with the system as proposed, appointing its own engineers and setting its own rates. This method is seldom done. Usually a heavy fine is imposed on a city which fails to comply with Health Department orders.
Attorney Krueger said the suit will protest the increased rate both inside and outside the city limits. Some water customers are not inside the city limits.
Attorney Krueger did not say when he would file the injunction to halt the collection. Most observers believe it will be near the end of the current session.

The observers point out if the suit is filed late in the term, then Judge Tartar will necessarily continue it to another term of court. With all the delays ordinarily associated with litigation, the suit could well take two years to settle. This delay could go on until another Mt. Vernon council is elected.
The delay, city observers say, would delay bill collection, but would not halt construction of the sewer system because of continued federal and state pressure. In the final analysis, the city water users could find themselves with a large water bill that had been mounting from month to month. The delay could, in the end, also cost the city twice as much for the sewer program as it would at the present time, making necessary the curtailment of many city services.

Vital Statistics Reported For County

Vital statistics in Kentucky—in the truest sense of an old cliché—are a matter of life and death.
Back in 1852 Kentucky began to keep a record of births and deaths. It was the first state west of the Alleghenies to undertake the giant task of such a register.
After 10 years, however, the upheavals of the Civil War led to the repeal of the registration law. It was revived in 1911 in the form of a statewide system of birth and death registration which is still law today.
But the over-all file has been expanded. Marriages, divorces, annulments and adoptions are now a part of the central registration files. In 1958 Kentucky became the 39th state to maintain these central records.
All records are sent to Frankfort by Registrars in county health departments. The Vital Statistics office of the State Health Department in Frankfort keeps these records at its fingertips in fire-proof vaults.
Recorded there are the 267 births and 119 deaths in Rockcastle County for 1961.
