Army Engineers Ask Bids On Dam Work At Rockcastle Narrows

A definite site for a dam on the Rockcastle River still remains to be decided. The Signal was told today by an official of the Army Corps of Engineers at Nashville, Tenn.

Because bids are being asked for subsurface investigations of a site at the Narrows of the Rockcastle River does not mean a final decision has been made on the site, the official said.

Arrangements will be made by the Nashville district office to have a representative meet interested bidders at the Corbin City Hall on Dec. 5, to conduct a guided tour to the site.

The Corps has had the Narrows in mind for years and this site was "a beginning" the Signal was told. The official reported the Corps will also investigate other sites. A site near Livingston is being mapped and pictures taken from the air.

They believe the Livingston site is best for the county on the basis of the recreation facilities it would offer the area, as well as providing more adequate flood control.

The announcement of the subsurface investigations at the Narrows site was made this week by James B. Newman III, district engineer for the Nashville District.

Advance notices have been mailed to prospective bidders for the drilling at the Narrows of the Rockcastle River at a point where the river flows into Lake Cumberland.

State Will Re-Work Two County Roads

The Signal asked this week and got assurances that the State Highway Department will repair, renovate, or resurface whichever is necessary—two Rockcastle County roads recently blacktopped.

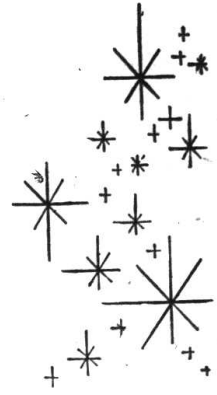

to \$64.70 compared with last year's opening. Sales there totaled \$762,264 pounds for \$493,136.14.
At Paris, the average dropped \$4.88 from last year's opening to a level of \$63.13. It sold 609,312 pounds for \$384,655.37.
Mount Sterling turned in an average of \$62.70, a drop of \$4.79. Sales were a heavy 705,320 pounds for \$442,227.12.
The Harrodsburg average of \$63.98 was down only \$1.80 from its opening last season. A big sale of 623,148 pounds paid growers \$390,660.37.

Richmond's average fell \$4.99 to \$62.07 on a huge sale of \$727,300 pounds for \$451,445.94.
A drop of \$5.70 cut Horse Cave's average to \$59.38, but sales were a heavy 1,004,892 pounds. Growers received \$596,718.79.
A similar drop, \$5.32, cut the average at nearby Glasgow to \$61.32. Sale of a heavy 1,021,382 pounds paid growers \$626,273.78.
Springfield average dropped \$5.29 from the 1951 opening to a level of \$61.62. There sales totaled 618,002 pounds for \$380,821.64.
A few miles away, Lebanon turned in an average of

\$64.35, down \$3.22 from its first 1961 sale. It auctioned \$97,154 pounds for \$380,723.74.
