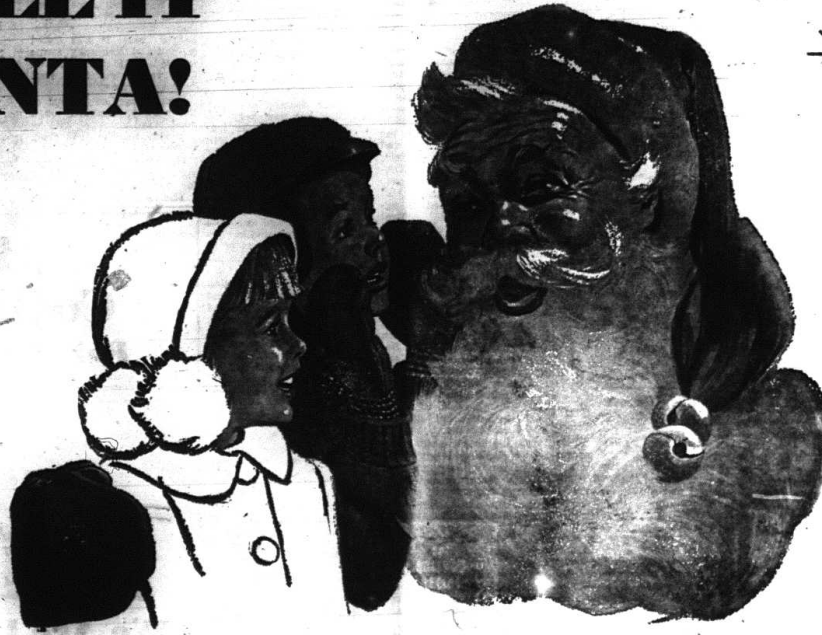

reach the lake and the main fishing areas? (2) Name one lake in the nation where the area below a dam has been built up and promoted successfully for recreation or any other purpose.

Corps of Engineers officials and state officials, in answer to the question, say it is very likely. To the statement, they say it has considerable accuracy.

Everyone agrees these things should be studied closely before opposition openly develops, especially in Rockcastle County.

If a dam at the Narrows backs water only to Route 80 then it would obviously be of no value to Rockcastle, since it would not border on the county. If it backs water 300 feet under the bridge at Fort Sequoyia, and to lesser depths above, then perhaps the county would have a lake of more value than it now realized.

But again, in the final analysis, the site for the dam will be decided by the Corps of Engineers, and their decision will, of course, be final and based on the millions already spent on the development of public power on Lake Cumberland.

We hope in this final analysis a dam most profitable to Rockcastle County will be constructed. We also hope the opposition that might develop in Rockcastle will be of a friendly and compromising nature.

Wildlife Report Made By State

If findings of nine wildlife regional directors are correct, the Kentucky animals are having one of the best quail and grouse seasons in modern times, the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources reported today.

The small game season opened on November 15 and continues through January 13, while for grouse the season opened December 1 and that season ends on January 29.

Regional directors from throughout the state with the exception of two, reported an improved crop of quail,

and those two from the First and Second regions in western Kentucky, found the population unchanged from last season, when excellent shooting was had in those areas.

The reports of the directors, by regions, is as follows: Ninth, in south-eastern Kentucky, quail improved, a slightly greater number of rabbits in two regions, the Seventh and Ninth in eastern Kentucky, and those directors reported excellent populations of these fast flying, wary birds.

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The limits this season have been unchanged with the daily limits for quail and rabbits being 10 and eight per day respectively with a possession limit of double these numbers after two or more days of hunting. The daily and possession limit for grouse is four, while six squirrels may be harvested per day with a possession limit of 12 after two or more days of hunting. The dove limit is 12 per day or a possession limit of 24.

season. This season will continue through January 13. The duck season statewide, opened on December 8 and continues through December 30. After the opening day ducks may be hunted from sunrise to sunset. The grouse season on the Ballard County Wildlife Mgt. Area opened December 8 while duck shooting on that area will begin at sunrise on Dec. 7. The Ballard Area seasons end on Dec. 30. Other seasons: woodcock, Nov. 15 - Dec. 24; Wilson snipe, Nov. 15 - Dec. 14 and rails and gallinules, Nov. 15 - Jan. 3.

Insurance Change Made In Kentucky

Comprehensive insurance coverage made available to Kentucky farmowners only last May has now been extended to cover farm tenants. The new coverage was approved by the Kentucky Department of Insurance early this month.

Insurance Commissioner L. D. Cassidy said the extension provides tenants with the same coverage available in a number of smaller policies, and at a savings of 10 to 25 per cent over the old aggregate rates.

The Kentucky Inspection Bureau, representing most insurance companies licensed to do business in the state, submitted the new plan to the Department of Insurance. Under the basic policy, the liability limit is \$25,000 per occurrence, compared with a limit of \$10,000 approved last May. Medical payments have been increased from \$250 to \$500 per person. The basic policy provides insurance against fire, lightning, windstorm,

hail, explosion, aircraft, vehicles, smoke and other extended coverages, plus theft and comprehensive personal liability.

The policy is available from most local insurance agents.

New Burley Variety Released By U of K

The U. K. Ag Experiment Station has released KY 12, a new burley variety, for the 1963 crop.

G. W. Stokes, plant breeder, said the variety has been under development a number of years. It was tested on selected Kentucky farms in 1960, 1961 and 1962 and last year a certified seed crop was grown.

Ample supplies of seed of the variety, described as a good stand-up type, will be available for the 1963 crop, Stokes said.

He noted the manufacturing trade has accepted KY 12 for smoking qualities. The new variety has high

resistance to black root rot, mosaic, wildfire and fumigium wilt, Stokes said. It has no resistance to black shank. KY 12 is particularly recommended now for land infested with the fumigium wilt organism; it should be grown on such land in preference to KY 35. KY 12 is more resistant to black rot than KY 9 and KY 10 and Burley 21. It has the same wildfire resistance capability as Burley 21. The new variety is a good stand-up type and does not blow down easily, Stokes noted.

It does not have extremely large leaves, as for instance KY 10, Stokes noted. It is also from 7 to 10 days later maturing than Burley 21.
