



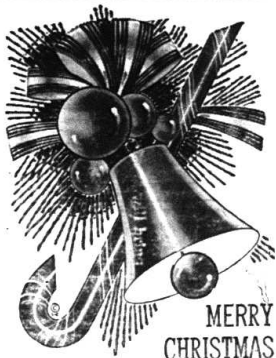

Courthouse-Jail Project Wanes As Government Lowers Grant Percentage

Rockcastle's chances of getting a new courthouse-jail under the Public Works Acceleration Act waned this week because of one percentage point.

The unexpected setback came when the Federal Government and the state reported Rockcastle County eligible under the act for a 58 percent grant for the \$400,000 courthouse-jail.

Under this percentage, Rockcastle would have to come up with \$108,000, an almost innumerable task because of its ever tightening budget.

estimates for this area and better estimate we can make at this time.

We realize the unemployment rates in Rockcastle County are much higher than the unemployment rates for the entire area, but the Department of Labor in Washington will not allow us to break this county out of the labor market area for purposes of this Act.

The percentage came as a shock to the county in that earlier the program had been billed on a county basis rather than on a Labor Market Area. In a letter from Sen. head's proposed \$100,000 sewer system will also have to be refigured in the light of a 50 percent grant base instead of the expected 60 percent.

The 58 percent is based on percentages of unemployment in a Labor Market Area. Rockcastle is in the Madison-Estill-Jackson area. The only county in the group eligible for 60 percent in grants is Jackson County. Had the 1959 annual average unemployment rate been one percent higher, Rockcastle could have qualified for the 60 percent. As it is, it is eligible for the same amount as Madison County.

The following figures show an amazing calculation. Estill County's figures were based on a median family income yearly of \$2,489 which made it eligible for 58 percent. Jackson has an annual median family income of \$1,651 and is eligible for 65 percent. Madison County has a median family income of \$3,281 and is eligible for 58 percent.

According to a communication from Robert MacDonald, of the Research and Statistics Service at Frankfort.

Construct Fertilizer Plant

A new plant for blending fertilizer is now under construction at Mt. Vernon with completion expected the first week of January.

The plant, estimated to cost about \$40,000 is owned by Wayne and Kenneth Stewart, and will be called Stewart Fertilizer Service Inc.

The plant will be located on land in the old railroad yard at Mt. Vernon under lease from the Louisville & Nashville Railroad. It will be 84 feet, one story, with Aluminex siding and roof to withstand corrosion. There will be no dust or odor. The plant will employ five people.

According to Wayne Stewart, the building will contain a fertilizer blender to mix and grade of fertilizer. Ingredients will come from New Mexico, Alabama and Florida by bulk. If a filler is used it will be locally ground limestone.

"There will be bag delivery of fertilizer," Stewart said.



Comment On Killing During Civil War

One hundred years ago this week the Louisville Journal, strongly pro-Union newspaper edited by outspoken George D. Prentice, impartially denounced both sides for executing a total of 25 men in southeastern Kentucky early in November.

Sixteen men, charged with being bushwhackers (civilians illegally firing upon troops), had been hanged by Confederate soldiers of Lt. Gen. Edmund Kirby Smith's re-creating army in the vicinity of Cumberland Gap.

In retaliation, Union men had hanged nine Confederate soldiers, described by the Louisville newspaper as sick or wounded men left behind by the Southern troops as they withdrew from the state. This hanging occurred at Hackney's Corners in Rockcastle County.

While the first sixteen had been hanged on charges that they had themselves been guilty of crimes, Prentice pointed out that there had not been even a pretense that the nine disabled Confederates had done anything for which they should be punished; they had been executed purely in retaliation for the first hanging. His conclusion was that both sides had been guilty of murder.

Prentice's protest was to go unheeded. Throughout the rest of the Civil War there would be hasty hangings and retaliatory executions, the latter sometimes in the ratio of four to one. It was a barbarous practice of what other

erwise was in many ways a chivalrous sort of warfare, and it particularly afflicted Kentucky.

Prentice had exerted all the influence of Kentucky's largest newspaper to keep the Commonwealth in the Union at a time when many leading citizens favored seceding and going with the Confederacy. He argued that it would be to the advantage of slave-holders to keep the state in the Union, since they could rely upon President Lincoln's statement in his inaugural address that he had "no purpose directly or indirectly to interfere with the institution of slavery in the states where it exists."

But if Kentucky seceded and the Confederacy became a separate nation, Prentice said, runaway Kentucky slaves who got across the Ohio River would not be returned to their owners.

Prentice was bitter about the Emancipation Proclamation which, as President Lincoln had announced in September, would go into effect January 1, 1863, but he remained loyal to the Union.

Another Kentuckian who was bitter about the same thing was Lt. U. S. Johnson of the 17th Kentucky (Union) Infantry. He resigned his commission in protest. Arrested and sent in irons to a military prison at Louisville, he later was released and ordered back to his regiment because no formal charge had been filed. He again resigned. That time he was charged with "mutinous language and subordinate action" and was dismissed

from the service. During the week under review, in the presence of the whole regiment at Bowling Green, Johnson was stripped of his rank and expelled. He had a brother, Col. Adam Johnson, in the Confederate States Army.

government runs between 60 percent and 78 percent and the exact percentage is based on the average unemployment rate of family income for your county compared to the national average.

Officials are surprised in the difference in the two terms, "your county" and "Labor Market Area." Most officials contacted believe the Labor Market Area does not reflect a true picture of income in Rockcastle, since the county is averaged with Madison. The figures do not reflect, for example, all the small hillside farms which the state has classified the owner or tenant employed. Half of them are on the commodity lists.

What can the county do? The matter will probably be decided within the next few days. In all probability, the county will go ahead with its preliminary planning in

work in the Rockcastle project are without foundation. "Since action on each of these projects is accomplished independently, there is no basis for the assumption that work on one project would jeopardize work on another. Past activities in the Cumberland River Basin would refute such opinions. In the early 1940's, construction was accomplished concurrently on the multi-purpose Wolf Creek, Dale Hollow and Center Hill projects, and suspension of work on these two projects was only necessitated by War Production Board requirements during World War II. In the mid-1950's construction was also accomplished concurrently on Old Hickory and Chesham Projects in relative close proximity to each other. During the current fiscal year, initial construction funds have been made available for both the J. Percy Priest Project and the Cordell Hull Project within the same area," he said.


