Assistance Totals \$42,272 In November

Rockcastle County's public assistance recipients received \$42,272 in aid last month through the State Department of Economic Security, Commissioner Mark V. Powell has announced.

The needy aged received a total of \$22,544 in November, families receiving aid to dependent children \$13,761, the needy blind \$735, and the permanently and totally disabled \$5,542.

Statewide payments in November total nearly \$5.6 million and went to more than 144,000 needy Kentuckians, Powell said.

Average payments in three of the four categories declined slightly in November after nearly all recipients received substantial increases in October.

The decreases ranged from 15 cents in the aid to dependent children category to three cents in old age assistance. Average payments to the needy blind increased 16 cents.

Federal Loans For Elderly

New legislation provides for making loans to elderly persons who are 62 or over who will reside on farms or in rural areas of 3,500 population or less, according to Robert C. Wynn, county supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration in Garard County.

The loans are made for moderate cost housing on terms up to 25 years and at 4 percent on unpaid principal.

A new provision will give those 62 or over three special advantages not available under the earlier program. First, they can buy previously occupied homes as well as build or improve their homes. Second, they can finance the cost of the building site as well as the dwelling with the loan proceeds. Third, cosigners may be used by elderly applicants who are lacking in repayment ability. To be eligible the applicant must be unable to obtain credit suitable to his needs from other sources.

Loans are still available for young citizens under previous authority and on the

same terms, but these loans cannot include the purchase of an existing dwelling or purchase of a building site. Also, no provision is made for a cosigner on the note. Further information on rural housing loans can be obtained by contacting the local office of the Farmers Home Administration serving Rockcastle.

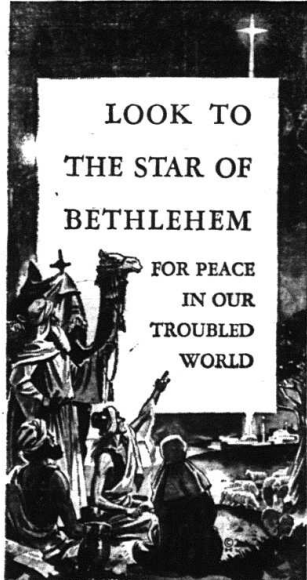

L&N Tax Increase Expected Forward Bids On Culverts

The Signal learned Wednesday the Louisville & Nashville Railroad tax bill may be "considerably" lower this year than last.

The county to date has not received notification from the state as to the amount of the railroad assessment in the county this year, or the amount of the railroad tax bill, but a source close to both the railroad and the state indicated the assessment has been certified by the state and that it will be "considerably" lower than last year.

For the past seven or eight years the railroad assessment has been decreasing in what has been termed "little by little" each year.

Last year the L & N paid the county \$40,963.52. This year the county tax on a county railroad property assessment of \$2,312,855. The railroad also paid Broadhead, Livingston and Mt. Vernon an undetermined amount of city taxes.

A "considerably" lower tax assessment would spell trouble for the county, it is doubtful, however, that the assessment would be lowered enough to jeopardize the county school budget this year or next year.

Piecing together all available information, it appears the L&N has generally proposed its assessments to the state. It is doubtful, however, that the L&N has specifically indicated that it is being diminished. It is also doubtful that the railroad has called-

ed for a reassessment of property in Rockcastle—yet. The general "discrimination" that the L&N has for years believed it has been paying considerably higher taxes in Kentucky than in the general county assessment, since each year it reportedly asks the state to re-examine its assessment.

It may be that the L&N has received assurances from the state that the state will speed up its overall reassessment program on the basis of "discrimination" in taxes against the railroad becomes greater year by year. If no reassessment is made, it should ever come in the time when the state would call for a reassessment, in all probability a team of assessors would come into the county from another area to do the entire reassessment.

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A construction project for building four culverts and a bridge in Rockcastle County was awarded by the Highway Department on Dec. 19, Commissioner of Highways Henry Ward announced today.

The project will include two culverts on the Wald-Jones Creek-Sand Springs Road; a bridge on the Negro Creek Road; and two culverts on the Hammond School Road.

J. C. Codell, C. Winchester, submitted the low bid of \$25,919.04.

This highway improvement is being financed through the state's Rural Secondary program, which is operated with two cents of the gasoline tax.

Courthouse May Be Doomed

Whatever happened to all the money?

This was the question frequently asked at a public hearing on Rockcastle County's proposed \$400,000 courthouse-jail project, Friday night.

Rockcastle County, expecting to get a 75 per cent grant under the Public Work Acceleration Act, was surprised when the Federal Housing and Home Administration in Atlanta, Ga., announced the county was eligible for only a 58 per cent grant.

The county applied for a loan for a courthouse-jail soon after the public works act went into effect two months ago, hired a Lexington architectural firm and a fiscal agent and plans were submitted to the Atlanta agency with the expectation of receiving approximately \$300,000 under the act.

Instead, Rockcastle was figured with the Madison County Labor Market area and the percentage figure dropped from 75 per cent to 58 per cent.

The county will now have to come up with \$168,000, which according to County Judge C. C. Carter, is an almost insurmountable task without a bond issue—a kind of "you've got to have money to make money."

Judge Carter told the group Friday that Rockcastle Co. is lumped with Jackson, Pettit and Madison counties in the labor market area and the figures show what he called an amazing calculation.

Estill County, with a median family yearly income of \$2,489 is eligible for 58 per cent in grants. Jackson County with a median family yearly income of \$1,651 is eligible for 66 per cent. Madison County, with a median family yearly income of \$3,318, is eligible for 58 per cent. Rockcastle, with a median family yearly income of \$1,898 is also eligible for 58 per cent.

Of the total of the annual "unemployment rate" for Rockcastle County for four years shows Rockcastle eligible for 66 per cent in three of the four years. In 1929 the unemployment rate was 10. The county must be below the necessary amount to receive a 66 per cent grant.

But the speaker told those present it looks as if the courthouse-jail project will have to be abandoned. Because of the 1933 government deadline, the county could not even get a bond issue on the ballot.

D. B. Saylor, Mt. Vernon merchant, and others suggested that the county get the opinion of voters through a referendum before losing the \$232,000 "which it may never have an opportunity to get again."

It is suggested the county question voters as to whether they would be willing to (Continued on page 4)

REAPPORTIONMENT (Continued from page 1) than 20 percent. Today, 45 of every 100 Kentuckians live in towns and cities, 29 of these in urbanized areas.

It was pointed out that within four years the bonds against the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital will be paid. Taxpayers now pay 20 cents per \$100 property evaluation for the hospital bonds.

Results of this population shift are this: 93 counties (each with fewer than 25,000 people) have 37.5 percent of the state's population, yet they now elect 53 of the 100 House members and 17 of the 38 State senators.

Enough affirmative replies are received, the county then would make an effort to go on with the project based on the faith of the voters, Judge Carter said.

The other 27 counties, which would continue at 15 cents, or five cents less than the taxpayer is now paying.

(See adjoining voting blank to be returned to county officials.) He noted that the public Works Acceleration Act is for counties that have no money and a high unemployment rate, and reminded the group that out of an approximate 12,000 county population from 3,500 to 4,000 are receiving government commodities.

A senator in the state's largest district represents six times as many people as his counterpart in the smallest. In the House, this ratio is 17 to 1.

At that rate we should be eligible for 100 percent in grants, he said.

It is estimated that one vote in Rockcastle County, for example, is worth as many as five votes in Kenton and Fayette counties.

The judge reported he had asked the federal agency at Atlanta if it would reconsider the one percent, but was told it would have to be changed by the Department of Economic Security at Frankfort.

He then read a letter from R. W. MacDonald, statistician for the Research and Statistics Services of the Department of Economic Security, which stated:

WE realize the unemployment rates in Rockcastle County are much higher than the unemployment rates for the entire area, but the Department of Labor in Washington will not allow us to break this county out of the nation's market area for purposes of this act."

Judge Carter set Jan. 17 at the county's 72 year old courthouse for a second meeting and urged all persons interested to attend.

COORN SUPPORT (Continued from page 1) diversion payments (based on the support prices) will project farm income and discourage excessive livestock expansion, particularly hogs and poultry.

The national average support prices for grain sorghum for 1963 feed grain crops now are: Corn, \$1.07 (loan), 18 cents (payments), total support, \$1.25; barley, \$2 cents (loan), 14 cents (payments), total support, 96 cents; grain sorghum, \$1.71 (loan), 29 cents (payments), total support, \$1.99.

As announced earlier, participants in the 1963 feed grain program will receive price support through loans and purchase agreements and partly through a price-support payment. The increase just announced will be accomplished through higher loan and purchase agreement rates, with no change in the price support payments.

The national average support prices per bushel (hundredweight) for grain sorghum for 1963 feed grain crops now are: Corn, \$1.07 (loan), 18 cents (payments), total support, \$1.25; barley, \$2 cents (loan), 14 cents (payments), total support, 96 cents; grain sorghum, \$1.71 (loan), 29 cents (payments), total support, \$1.99.

These total average supports compare with the previously announced supports of \$1.20 per bushel for corn.

will receive a price support payment of 18 cents per bushel for corn, 16 cents per bushel (24 cents per cent) for grain sorghum, and 14 cents per bushel for barley on the normal production of their 1963 feed grain acreage. These are unchanged from the previously announced payments.

As required in the law authorizing the feed grain program, price support in 1963 is contingent upon performance of the acreage diversion agreed to, with an allowance of a small tolerance for error, to be announced later.

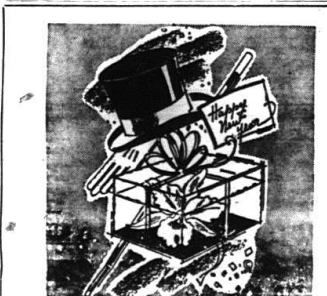
