## Lemons Grow In County

If Florida citrus growers only knew, Mrs. Eugene Owens, of near Trace Branch, would probably be the envy of them all. In this winter of killing Florida cold, Mrs. Owens has her own lemon tree with four ripening lemons, two of which are about 12 inches around. The lemon tree, growing in a bucket, is about three feet tall and has, as noted, two lemons as large as an average-sized grapefruit and shaped like a pear. Mrs. Owens, who lives two miles down the Rockcastle River from Fort Sequoyah Indian Village, ordered the dwarf lemon tree from an Iowa nursery three years ago. It grew fast, bloomed twice a year with sweet-smelling blossoms, but produced no lemons. Last summer, Mrs. Owens decided to leave the tree in the bucket and not re-set it in the yard for the summer. Result: Four lemons. Mrs. Owens says she does not give the tree extra special care. She gives it a small amount of water each

day, but less water in winter than in summer. She also makes sure it does not get too cold in winter and that it is in partial shade in the summer. The lemons, because of their unusual size, cause many questions to be asked by visitors. The question most frequently asked is: "Are they real lemons?" followed by a close inspection. Mrs. Owens assures every-

one the lemons are lemons. Close investigation discloses they smell like lemons and have an oily lemon-like peel. How do they taste? The answer to this question remains to be determined when the lemons are completely ripe, and Mrs. Owens waits impatiently. Her friends also wait impatiently to hear her question: "Anyone for lemons?"

## FISCAL AGENCY'S PROJECT

On the basis of a vote-poll and the outcome of two public hearings, County Judge C. C. Carter Wednesday instructed the county's fiscal agent to inform the Housing and Home Finance Agency at Atlanta, Ga., the county will take \$232,000 in grants toward the construction of a courthouse and jail for Rockcastle County.

His fiscal agent, Dupree & Son, of Harlan, came to Mt. Vernon Wednesday to draw up the necessary papers that will give the "green light" to the federal agency to process the project. Mr. Dupree informed the county he would approve a revenue bond plan to obtain the grant for the county, and indicated the federal agency will also approve the plan.

A vote-poll return showed 320 of the 400 voters and 16 opposed. At both public hearings, the last attended by about 125 persons, there were two votes disapproving the project.

The processing of the project through federal channels is not expected to be delayed, since the agency has already approved the plans and specifications and tentatively approved the county's application for funds.

If there are no hitches, work on the project would get underway as soon as weather permitted.

The county will have to furnish \$168,000 to get the \$232,000, or 58 percent of the approximate \$400,000 project, which could bring in 11 governmental offices spread around the county into one central location.

To get the \$168,000, the county will tell the federal agency it will float revenue bonds. Then at the November election a bond issue will be put on the ballot. If the issue passes, the county will then drop the revenue bonds and replace them with voted bonds.
