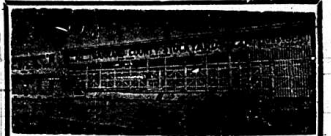

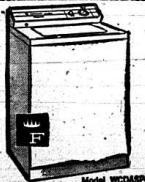

First Rockcastle Board Says New High School 'Still In Mill'

All Depends On Federal Aid Bill

It remains "wait and see" as far as a new centrally-located senior high school for Rockcastle County is concerned.

This was brought out this week in an interview with Mrs. Nevel Miracle, superintendent of Rockcastle County Schools, and the Rockcastle County Board of Education.

Faced with an ever increasing school population, the county school system, like others in the state, has had a senior-high school "in the mill" for many years. And over the years, the State Department of Education, which furnishes more than half the annual county school budget, has suggested plans be formulated for such a high school.

But to date, nothing very concrete has been initiated, mostly because of a new state attitude and, as usual, the question: Where is the money coming from?

It is estimated a new senior high school would cost in the neighborhood of a million dollars, perhaps as much as a million-and-a-half dollars in money coming from the state.

According to Mrs. Miracle, and the Board, the new high school is very much in their minds. Nothing would please the school administration more than to have a new high school in the county.

Not only would a high school solve the increasing school population problem, but it could mean more money for the system through state grants. In fact, the broadened academic program would most likely mean considerably more money for the county schools.

The "wait and see" attitude taken by the state and local board in recent months stems from the hope that eventually Congress will pass some kind of federal aid to education. Matching fund money for school construction which would be allocated to state schools under such a program would greatly benefit all state schools, and closer home, county schools. With federal aid Rockcastle could go ahead and build a new senior high school, the Board and Mrs. Miracle agree.

To date, Congress has not passed a federal aid to education bill because of a question on aid to parochial schools. A bill will be before Congress again this session, but its passage "can seem unlikely. But as long as it appears the bill is not losing ground steadily, the state wants Rockcastle to hold up its plan for a new high school.

"What if the bill does not pass? If the bill should fail, it appears it will be bottled up in committee indefinitely, when the county administration will be unable to wait. Voters will then be asked to approve a bond issue to build the high school.

Should a school bond issue be necessary, voters will be faced with approving the bonds, or faced with the gradual loss of state appropriations. As the school population increases, additions and changes must be made in the school curriculum to come up to state standards in order to qualify for funds. Maintaining the status quo in Rockcastle would not likely meet the approval of the State Department of Education.

How much the county gets from the state is shown below in the past three school years. In the 1959-60 school year the state allotment was \$472,994. In 1960-61, the allotment was \$57,557. In 1961-62, the allotment was \$74,164—a steady increase. This year's allotment will be even larger. The largest single increase in the state's general allotment shows up in instructional salaries. In 1960-61 instructional salaries amounted to \$322,450. In 1961-62 instructional salaries were \$489,253. It is fairly obvious from all these figures that the loss of this money, or even part of it, would deal a severe blow to the county schools.

What would the financial situation be on the matter of a new high school should federal aid be approved?

In all probability federal matching funds would be a two to one basis. The county would put up one dollar and the state two dollars. At the present time, the county system has over \$300,000 in "bonded leeway" should the matching funds become available. On the basis of \$300,000 plus \$600,000 from the state, the county then would have available nearly a million dollars for a senior high school. By Kentucky State county schools can issue bonds without a vote of the people up to six percent of the county's property evaluation, or the amount capital outlay would actually exceed ever is smaller. It is not actual money in the bank until bonds are issued, but the term "bonded leeway" has been applied to this available source of funds.

After the problem of money has been solved, the next decisions are directly connected with the construction of the high school.

At this point, a team of education experts from the State Department of Education will move into the county for several surveys, all pointing to a location of the high school. The teams would survey pupil transportation advantages, center of school population, terrain, accessibility, and other phases directly connected with establishing the school.

Courthouse Plan Goes To Agency

Rockcastle County officials are now awaiting approval of financing of the Rockcastle County Courthouse through the Housing and Home Finance Agency, Atlanta, Ga.

Final letters have been forwarded to the Agency by Dupree & Son, of Harlan, the fiscal agent for the Rockcastle Fiscal Court.

The fiscal agent has advised the federal agency the project is feasible on revenue bonds basis, and that Dupree & Son will bid on the bonds.

Since plans and specifications are complete and filed with the agency and the application generally approved, about all that remains for the agency is the announcement of the awarding of the grants totalling about \$323,000, based on 58 percent of \$400,000 loan.

Voters will be asked to approve a general obligation bond issue of 15 cents on the \$100 property evaluation at the November general election. When the issue is voted in November, courthouse construction is expected to be at least one-fourth completed.

A loan of \$421,000 for new telephone line construction has been awarded the Kentucky Telephone Co., London, which also serves Rockcastle County.

The approval of the loan was announced this week by the Rural Electrification Administration in Washington, D. C.

The money is to be used to finance facilities for 485 new subscribers in Carlisle, Hickman, Livingston and Marshall counties. There will be an expansion of existing facilities to cover service previously authorized. There will be about 115 miles of new line.

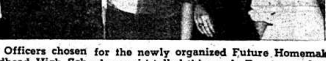

school plant. Once the surveys are complete and evaluated, a general location for the school will be decided, followed by a specific location and acquisition of the land.

The Board has stressed, all decisions on location will be based strictly on State Department survey recommendations. Failure of the Board to adhere to state recommendations could mean the state would not feel obligated to offer aid and assistance to the future school program.

There will also have to be decisions made on the existing plant. The three present high schools will in all probability become elementary-junior high schools (such as Roundstone School), or strictly elementary centers. This decision will also be dependent on the surveys taken by the state.

With so many decisions still to be made and so many uncertainties, Mrs. Miracle and the Board continue to abide by the "wait and see" attitude suggested by the state in the last few months.

"Until we can ascertain very nearly what will happen to the federal aid to education bill we will continue for a reasonable time to add a room here and there, make a change here and there, and endeavor to meet our needs with what we have," Mrs. Miracle said.

She reported 17 one-room schools are still in use in the county, but these are being discontinued as quickly as possible. The last to be sold was Negro Creek School. The Board accepted a high bid of \$1,125 for the school from James Neal.
