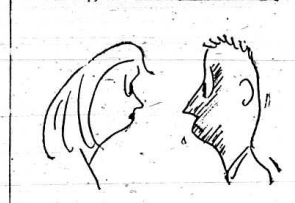

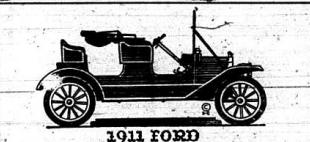

**Have Walnut Logs? They Sell Good**  
 Anyone in Rockcastle have good walnut logs? If so, they're worth quite a bit of money.  
 Good walnut logs are commanding "unheard of prices" due mainly to export demand, according to a report on timber prices released by the University of Kentucky and the Kentucky Forestry Division.  
 Prices range up to \$1,000 a thousand board feet for prime-grade walnut logs 24 or more inches in diameter. In a semiannual report on timber prices, the two agencies noted that the market for mine props in Eastern Kentucky is uncertain because of labor troubles. It quoted mixed species of mine props, usually dense hardwoods, at from 2 to five cents a lineal foot.  
 The report said there is some demand for basket-veneer wood in the western sector of the state where pulp-wood markets also are active. Chipwood likewise was reportedly being shipped from northeastern and southeastern areas. Coapeage items s h o w

some price increases, the report noted, and the recent market remains consistent. The hardwood market also is steady but there has been some activity for hardwood poles and piling. Sawmills are operating in the cedar areas and the demand for cedar is good.  
 Charcoal wood has an unlimited market in several locations in Northeastern and Southeastern Kentucky and dogwood and persimmon bolts and logs continue in demand.  
 Prices for good furniture and lumber logs are high, the report continued, with beach, soft maple, and sycamores in demand. Almost any kind of cherry log is in demand for furniture.  
 Basket veneer (cottonwood, elm, and sycamores) range from \$25 to \$80 a thousand board feet. White oak coapeage is bringing from \$30 to \$85 a thousand feet on stumps and 60 cents to \$1.50 for Nos. 1, 2, and 3 grade stave bolts (about 10 board feet each) at the mill.  
 Cedar and locust fence posts range from 25 cents to \$1 each while ash, and hick-

ory stock handles are bringing from 30 cents to 75 cents a thousand board feet at the mill. Cherry and walnut furniture logs are worth It pays to advertise.

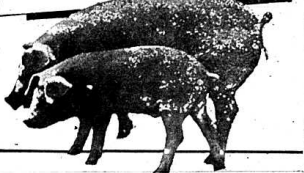

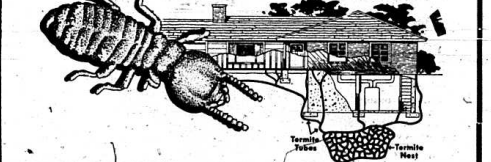

## Record Cold Grips County Courthouse Plans In Final Review

### Causing Fires, Dead Autos

Numbing cold and snow spread over Rockcastle County and Kentucky during the last eight days, sending temperatures to record lows and causing damage directly connected to the extreme weather.

Bill Cox, reported the US Weather Bureau thermometer at Mt. Vernon recorded an official 18 below zero on Jan. 24 and 16 below zero Monday morning, both records for the area.

Although Mt. Vernon had 18 and 16 below zero, other areas of the county reported colder temperatures. A chart varied from place to place. For example, Jan. 24 Jack Crawford of Renfro Valley, reported 25 below. It was also 25 below at one home in the area of Livingston. Monday morning, Clay Colson reported 30 below on two thermometers at his home on Crawford road at Renfro Valley the same morning.

To add to the discomfort, five inches of snow fell on Jan. 23, followed by 1.5 inches Sunday.

The low temperatures played havoc with fuel, water pipes, autos and travel. Several fires were reported throughout the county. (See other story)

At the home of Charles Alfred Mullins, storm windows cracked due to the extreme temperature. At the home of Mrs. M. Vernon, meters generally came a work with little damage. The Mt. Vernon telephone works reported only about four meters were frozen. But frozen water pipes were reported in almost every area of the county.

Autos took a beating from the cold. Service stations reported as many as 15 and 20 calls on the two cold mornings for help in starting autos. Battery sales increased markedly.

The Signal, along with the other county residents, had its problems related to the bad weather this week.

First, the furnace at the Signal burned out.

Secondly, all water pipes froze.

When cold weather kept residents in-doors and at the schools, the freezing mark on the last few days calling tripled, causing no dial tone and falling out of rings.

For the first time in eight days, temperatures rose above the freezing mark on Tuesday. Ice began clearing from highways and streets and the Signal is a "hurried" edition this week in order to "clean its eyes up."

### 2 Homes Burn; 4 Damaged

Two Rockcastle County homes were destroyed by fire during the last few days, and four other homes suffered damage but the fires were extinguished.

The home of Noah Poynter, of Level Green, burned to the ground this week. It was reported the fire started in a blue. The Poynters were unable to save their belongings. A fire in a stove then went outside to start his car. The home caught fire while he was outside.

The Broadhead Fire Department extinguished a fire at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Archie French and Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Barnett. Both fires were in the area of flood. A fire in a fire damaged the home of L. D. Bond, of Livingston, last week.

The home of Luther Hurley, of Lamer, was heavily damaged by fire early Wednesday. The fire reportedly started in a blue and burned a ceiling and a section of the roof. Members of the family extinguished the fire by forming a bucket brigade between the house and Trace Branch which runs in front of the house.

The club has 38 members who carried 49 projects and all projects were completed. One of the 49 members, 27 were in 4-H for their first time. The members took part in all 4-H activities. In the dress review, they received 27 ribbons, one of which was championship.

Six members attended rally day and gave speeches, demonstrations, and entered other projects. They received 12 ribbons in these events. Twenty members took part in the show.

At County Achievement Day, members of this club received 49 ribbons, 3 of which were championships. At District Achievement Day, they received 3 ribbons, 1 of which was first place in the county and in the district.

The club held 12 monthly meetings, 52 project meetings, 6 social meetings, and took a trip to Farm and Home Week in Lexington. They had a pie supper which earned them \$70, and sponsored a banquet to earn \$140 for a total of \$210 earned for the club.

Linville replaces J. S. Swinford, who died recently. The new magistrate will serve until a new magistrate is elected at the November general election.

State Trooper Willis Martin, of Mt. Vernon, has been promoted to sergeant and transferred to the Mayfield Post where he will be assistant post commander effective Feb. 1.

### State Legislature To Reapportion

A special session of the State Legislature began hearings this week on a plan for reapportioning the state's electoral districts.

Several plans will be offered, but no decision will be made until a later date. Into which district Rockcastle will be put is not known at this time. It will depend on the reapportionment plan accepted by the Legislature.

The Legislature may make an effort to reapportion and then fall to agree. The reapportionment then would go to the courts for a decision.

The Broadhead fifth and sixth grade 4-H Club met January 10. The meeting was presided by president Howell Hunt, with the American pledge and 4-H pledge.

### White House Replies To Story

In a letter to the Signal this week, Pierre Salinger, press secretary to Pres. John F. Kennedy, told The Signal he had read a recent Signal article entitled "Rockcastle Courthouse Plans and Specifications Doomed."

The story written by Ray McClure, editor of The Signal, appeared in the Dec. 20 issue of the Signal and disclosed that because of one paragraph in one year (1958) in the national unemployment average the new Rockcastle Courthouse and jail project might be doomed.

Mr. Salinger wrote, in part: "I appreciate having the benefits of your thoughts. The observations you offer have been made available to appropriate government officials."

The article stated the War Department in Washington should reevaluate the 58 percent allowed in the contract for the courthouse-jail project.

### Burley Quota

Kentucky farmers will be allowed to grow a little more burley tobacco under federal guarantees next year.

Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman announced Friday that Kentucky's burley quota for 1963 will be 236,081 acres, an increase of 21,000 acres over the 1962 crop.

The announcement was accompanied by an Agriculture Department report stating the income of tobacco farmers this year.

Growers, said the Department, should take pains to "follow cultural practices in 1963 which will produce tobacco acceptable to domestic and foreign users."

The report was a warning against the continued use of MH-30, a chemical sprayed on tobacco plants to control growth of undesirable leaves called "curets."

Because of the use of MH-30, partly because of improper fertilizing practices, and partly because of the leaves' chemical composition, the burley crop dropped sharply under the 1961 level.

year Kentucky has been granted more tobacco acreage. The state's acreage quota was increased 6 percent in 1961 and a further increase of 6 percent was granted last year.

Kentucky grows about two thirds of the burley tobacco produced in the United States. The slight acreage increase for this state this year came at the expense of other states whose quotas, in most cases, were reduced negligibly.

Nationally, the burley quota for the 1963 crop will be 346,890 acres—up 109 acres over the 1962 quota. Tobacco quotas are determined by a formula in the federal agriculture laws that is designed to bring about a balance between supply and demand.

The Department previously had announced that a support price for this year's burley will average 53.3 cents a pound, compared with 58.9 cents last year.

The Department said that all decisions have not been made yet with respect to quality factors which will affect actual support levels for individual grades.

### December Assistance Announced By State

Public Assistance recipients in Kentucky received \$5,323,669 during December, Commissioner Earle V. Powell of the Department of Economic Service has reported.

The figure was a slight increase (\$1,254) over the sum distributed in November 1962 but nearly \$187,000 more than December 1961.

The needy aged received \$2,926,000, an average payment of \$84.65; families in the aid to dependent children category received checks averaging \$37.97; for a state-

wide total of \$1,867,063; needy blind recipients got \$152,433, an average of \$64.48; the permanently and totally disabled received \$578,113, an average of \$85.19.

More than 143,000 needy Kentuckians received welfare checks during the month, Powell said.

The grunts and groans of push-ups, sit-ups and other physical conditioning exercises are heard in the halls of the National Guard's fitness centers. These centers are the result of a pilot program for the entire National Guard.

It is set for the President, Mr. Ted Roosevelt, Special Assistant to the President in Charge of General Claude T. Bowers, Adjutant General of North Carolina. "The President is gratified by the program you have initiated. It should assure the physical fitness and readiness of each unit of the North Carolina National Guard as well as serve a great personal benefit to the Guardsmen involved. It may well set an example for other units to follow."

It did set the example. Guard Fitness Project Officers, Adjutant General Claude T. Bowers, and Adjutant General Claude T. Bowers, Adjutant General of North Carolina, and Sals Lake City, Utah to see the National Guard Bureau of fitness program in the States as a pilot program for the entire National Guard.

Just how rugged was this training? "Too rugged for me," said the Adjutant General, "but I was with the Baltimore Colts, after they were returned to the United States and the Army National Guard unit."

Most of the Guardsmen, members of Alabama's 28th Special Forces Group, joined the 19th Special Forces Group of the United States Army National Guard last summer. Those who were not with the unit were at various training schools, such as the U.S. Naval Amphibious Base, San Diego, California, and the Special Forces training in amphibious techniques and advanced communications and demolition.
