

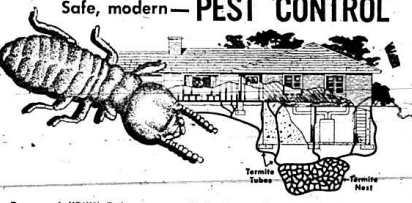

No Decision Yet On I-75 Routing

The State Department of Highways has had no official notice from the United States Bureau of Public Roads of approval of a route for Interstate 75 between Richmond and Williamsburg, Ferry White, administrative assistant to Kentucky Highway Commissioner Henry Ward, reported Wednesday.

"We have received no word whatsoever from the Bureau of Roads," Mr. White said.

The announcement apparently squelched a rumor that the Bureau had approved the section between Richmond and the Rockcastle River, but had not approved the section between the Rockcastle River and Williamsburg.

For days the rumor had been persistent of the "no approval" of the Rockcastle River-Williamsburg stretch. Of this, Mr. White said:

"We have received no word rejecting an alignment closer to London and Corbin. The Bureau did ask for additional documentation of justification for this line and this has either been submitted or is in the process of being submitted."

Mr. White said the only contract bidding soon on I-75 would be on Feb. 17 and that would be for a small section of US 25 north of Richmond to tie in with newly built I-75 and a similar stretch in Whitley County. However, both sections are not included in the I-75 section now waiting for approval at the Bureau of Public Roads.

Public Road Commissioner Ward reported only one route from Richmond to the Rockcastle River has been submitted to the Bureau for approval. No alternate route for this section was submitted.

At the Rockcastle River, the State submitted two routes connecting Williamsburg. One has I-75 a route one mile west of London and Corbin. On this stretch, the Bureau asked for the additional documentation. The other route runs in an almost straight northerly direction to Williamsburg and misses London and Corbin by about 10 miles.

The Richmond-Rockcastle River stretch enters Rockcastle County about half-mile, or less, west of the present route. It passes close to Renfro Valley, by-passes Mt. Vernon to the west, then to Burr, and then heads south to the Rockcastle River in the area of Trap Springs, southwest of Fort Sequoyia Indian Village. The state has said there is no question on this routing.

No Plans For Class Change

The Rockcastle County School system is not planning to hold Saturday classes in the Rockcastle River district unless more days are lost due to weather.

Such was indicated this week by school officials following an announcement that from 35 to 40 Kentucky school districts have asked permission to hold Saturday classes this spring to make up time lost because of cold, snowy weather.

It was reported the Rockcastle school calendar has not yet been revised, and whether there will be Saturday classes later will remain uncertain. It is expected there will be more bad weather during February and March.

Don Balle, head of the Bureau of Instruction for the State Department of Education, said some of the state's instructional classes are held on Saturdays as long as 10 days. Rockcastle has lost nine days.

"We do not advise Saturday teaching," Balle said. "But if they have to do it, we give them special permission." The state requires a minimum of 175 days of teaching each year. Some districts schedule more than the minimum to take care of emergencies.

Not all of the lost days will have to be made up on Saturdays. Vacations and extension of the normal term for a few days also can be used.

Core Drilling For Dam Underway

Investigative core drilling is underway this week under the auspices of the Army Corps of Engineers at the Narrows of the Rockcastle River.

The drilling is for the purpose of discovering if sub-surface rock strata will support a dam at that point on the river.

Doing the drilling is Motte Co. Drilling Co., of Huntington, W. Va.

According to Corps of Engineers officials the drilling will take about 60 days to complete and is part of a survey of the river authorized by Congress. Congress added another \$7,000 authorization about two weeks ago.

Corps officials also reported the general survey is progressing satisfactorily, but no definite date has been pinpointed for completion of the survey. Usually, it takes a minimum of a year to complete a preliminary survey, the purpose of which is to establish engineering and general feasibility for a dam.

Because of rough terrain, it was reported the Corps was having trouble finding a company that was able to get its equipment into the proposed dam site area. The two holes that are being drilled are to be approximately 350 feet deep.

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Feed Grain Program For Year Discussed

Producers who take part in the 1963 feed grain program will receive payments for diverting acreage from the production of corn, grain sorghum, and barley, Mr. R. O. Wilson, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, said today.

Part of the estimated payment to be earned for such diversion may be paid in advance when the producer signs up to participate. The rest of the diversion payment and all of the price-support payment will be made each summer.

The Chairman said that this program provision should be of substantial benefit to growers who can use some extra ready cash during the spring planting season. Sign-up for the program runs from Feb. 1 through March 22.

Besides the payment for diversion of eligible cropland to approved conserving uses, the feed grain program for 1963 offers program participants a price-support payment by the normal production of the acreage planted to feed grains in 1963. They will also qualify for price-support loans or purchase agreements on their entire production from the feed

grain acreage. The minimum diversion for participation is 20 percent of the farm's 1963 feed grain base. The acreage of corn, grain sorghum, and barley (1959-1960) average acreage, as adjusted will be combined into one total feed base for each farm, and a farmer may divert one or more of the feed grains in the total base. His payment will be made at the per-acre support rate for the grain diverted. Barrows who planted their 1963 barley crop last fall will be able to participate.

in the 1963 program by being during the base acreage planted to the three feed grains by at least the minimum amount.

Payment on the first 20 percent of acreage diversion will be made at the minimum of the county support rate on the normal production of the diverted acreage. On diversion above the minimum amount, payment will be at 50 percent of the county support rate. The diversion payment plus the price-support payment will give farm-
