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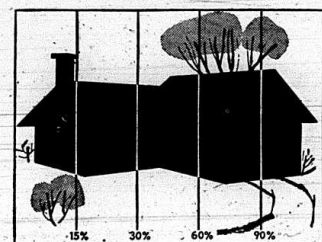

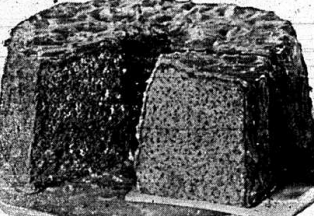

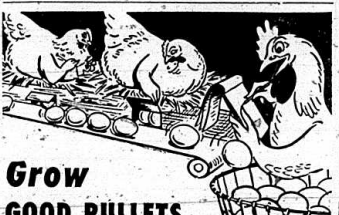

Measles Case Record Set; Asian Flu Expected Next

This is a measles year, according to a check of records at the Rockcastle County Health Department.

Since Jan. 1, a total of 110 cases of measles have been reported during the entire year. There were no measles reported in Rockcastle County last year between Jan. 1, and March 1.

In 1961, a total of 188 cases of measles were reported during the entire year. In 1962, there were only four cases all year.

The figures reflect only those cases treated by doctors. In fringe areas of the county children are sometimes treated in towns outside the county and are not reported to county authorities.

The Asian Flu epidemic that has spread into several Kentucky counties closing schools and causing the

postponement of public gatherings, has not reached the Rockcastle County. One patient at the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital is listed as a suspected case.

The Health Department warns that Asian Flu and its after effects can be extremely dangerous. Residents are advised to consult their doctor immediately if they become ill with flu-like symptoms. The elderly and pregnant women are especially susceptible.

Lester Clark Found Dead In Ice-Clogged Indiana River

The frozen body of a former Rockcastle County man was found Saturday night at Richmond, Ind., half buried under a bridge in the ice-covered Winterset River.

Lester Clark, 70, formerly of the Livingston area of the county, was found by friends on their way to a movie.

When police arrived, they found the frozen body lying across three or four weirs of the river. Police said he appeared Mr. Clark had been in the water about two hours. They had to chop part of the river ice away so that the body could be recovered.

Officials believe Clark became ill and fell into the water, unable to free himself. He suffered a stroke and died three or four weeks ago. It was first believed Mr. Clark fell from the bridge, but Wayne County Coroner Dr. Ralph Dreyer said he died from exposure and a stroke.

Mr. Clark, a native of Rockcastle County, had lived at Richmond since 1954, but was a frequent visitor with friends and relatives in the county.

The increase was from \$2 for 2,000 gallons to \$3.30 for 2,000 gallons.

Plaintiffs in the complaint are Grant Hantz, Robert Simon, Nancy Helton, Hatt Mink, Charles Childress, Squire Abbey, J. C. Michael, Leonard Langford, S. F. Bowman, Charlie Hines, G. H. Griffin, W. R. Griffin, Ruth Lambert, and J. H. Wolf.

The City has 20 days in which to answer the complaint. After 15 days, Circuit Judge R. C. Tartar, of Somerset, will decide whether, through an injunction, halt the further collection of the increased rate until a full hearing, or otherwise.

In its answer to the complaint, the city will show the costs of operation of the water works, costs of needed extensions, lines and new equipment, salaries and interest on loans, as well as other items that cost the water works. For example, several weeks ago former Water Superintendent Henry Cox presented the council with a list of needed line extensions and replacements totaling \$80,000.

The council had to replace a chlorinator costing \$905.

During an August meeting of the city council, Fritz Krueger, of Somerset, warned the council it could expect a suit if it increased the water rate. Despite the warning, the council passed a water rate ordinance and the water rate was increased since October.

Although the complaint made no mention of Mt. Vernon's proposed \$419,000 sewer system and the approved Housing and Home Finance Agency loan, the move set off a council attack against the proposed system. If water rates are moved up, the council's rate, it is doubtful the council could accept the loan for the sewer system. Report 1963 Burley Quota About Same

Burley tobacco allotments for most farms in 1963 will be the same as for the 1962 crop, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, has announced.

The Kentucky allotment for 1963 crop burley tobacco is 225,864 acres, which represents the State's share of the national allotment of 348,890 acres.

As in the past, officials explained, a small acreage has been reserved for re-establishing allotments for farms having no burley tobacco acreage history during

the past 5 years, for correcting errors, and for adjusting inequities. Allotments for some farms on which the burley acreage history in recent years was less than 75 percent of the farm's allotment will be reduced in 1963.

Priests for the 1963 crop of burley tobacco will be supported at an average of 58.3 cents per pound. (The 1962 crop prices were supported at an average of 57.8 cents per pound.) However, the committee said, all decisions have not been made with respect to quality factors

which affect actual support levels for individual grades.

It was reported that the record of public hearing on quality factors in burley tobacco, which was held in Lexington the middle of January, is now being considered, and an early announcement can be expected as to the Agriculture Department's decision on actions designed to improve burley quality. Meantime, burley growers are urged to follow cultural practices in 1963 which will produce tobacco acceptable to domestic and foreign users.



BUILDING work got underway last week on a new self-service supermarket, owned and managed by Mr. and Mrs. Kermit Bailey, at the corner of West Main Street and Williams Street at Mt. Vernon. The building and equipment is expected to cost about \$40,000 and completed sometime in May. It will be constructed of concrete block, brick. Glass will be used freely. 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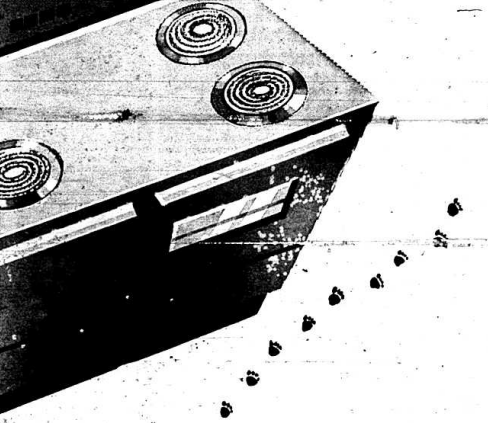

WE LIKE THE COURTHOUSE PLANS

A Dayton, Ohio, reader observes by letter: "I have noted with interest the architect drawing for the proposed Rockcastle courthouse and jail. That is some building! I am glad Rockcastle will have such a showpiece. My only question is: Will you people take care of it and keep it in good repair?"

In a sense this paragraph could be termed "loaded." Nevertheless, it is certainly worth investigating. The proposed building is indeed "some building." Designed by Bayless, Clotfelter & Johnson, of Lexington, its architecture is modern, but not extreme, and we believe it often times a committee fails to agree and the discussions end in dissention. People seldom see a design in its full perspective and with full objectivity.

On the one side, for example, there are those who praise the conversion of design of the Laurel County Courthouse with its columns and belltower of the Colonial period. But this type of architecture, though pleasing to some, can be extremely costly. At London, the new city hall is a case in point. A few miscellaneous items, totalling somewhere around \$30,000, an amount Rockcastle County could hardly afford.

All that aside, one of the important things to take into consideration in choosing a design for a building is: How does it fit into the local pattern of architecture of recent years? Consideration of this question is basic to community planning. In the case of Rockcastle, we have chosen a conventional design which would have been completely "out of pattern." All buildings in the county of any permanency in the last few years have been of modern design. To name a few: Hamilton School, the Bank of Mt. Vernon, the Citizens Bank, the Commercial Products Credit Association Building, the Mt. Vernon Post Office, all buildings in the Kentucky Telephone Company, and most of our schools. The future central high school will also be of modern design. In fact, there are few examples in the state which are as much modern design buildings as the new ones in this county. It is, therefore, a matter of one kind or another, that the new building will present to the general public.

The question is: How can we get our readers to get people take care of it and keep it in good repair? We believe the county will do everything to maintain the beauty and repair of the courthouse. It would be unthinkable to let it fall into disrepair. We also feel sure those of us who feel the urge to get it will find a more appropriate place than the courthouse floor. It will be easily accessible to all. The same method would probably serve well in other places.

The new and modern courthouse will give the county a new look. It will also be a reminder of the vision of all who have dreamed of a better future for the county. The money will bring it into being and we shall all have a part in its construction.

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Farm Credit Needs:

It's generally agreed that an understanding of credit as a production farm tool is just as important as today's farming operations as is a knowledge of machinery, fertilizers or insecticides. Only a few farmers - those fortunate enough to inherit, or marry, considerable wealth - are able to farm efficiently without the use of borrowed money. The ownership of farm land in itself is not sufficient to supply capital needs. Land represents only a small fraction of the required assets. Livestock, buildings, fencing, basic lime and fertilizer treatment and equipment will often amount to much more than the investment in land. That's where the need for credit comes in.

Farmers vary greatly in their skill to handle livestock, crops and machinery. Where one farmer succeeds another fails. The same differences exist in their skills to handle money and credit. During the winter a good machinery man will spend considerable time cleaning and lubricating his equipment; replacing worn and broken parts; sharpening blades; and catter bars. He will not until the machinery is needed in the field to look after these details. Likewise, the good farm manager will look after his credit needs before the actual time to use the money arrives. Sometimes the important tool of credit may also need repair, lubrication and sharpening, so to speak. Winter is also the best season of the year for this. Probably the most important detail in keeping the credit tool in good condition is a frank and confidential talk with the local banker about financial and credit problems. The banker is an expert in these fields, and unlike many others, there are no charges for his advice on money matters.

CREDIT RATING: A good credit rating with a bank is one of the greatest assets a person can have. It denotes that the individual has proven by his experience and character that he knows how to handle other people's money wisely and profitably; that he has established a good reputation with his creditors for honesty, promptness and frankness. It is often said that the mark of a good farmer is his ability to do the right thing at the right time. This also is the mark of a good borrower - the ability to handle his debts promptly and efficiently.

It is often disheartening to see how careless some farmers can be with their possessions. For example, you've never noticed what a bad impression you get a farmer when you see expensive machinery left out to rust and rot and a tractor, miler, repairs on home and buildings left unattended to junk, weeds and rubbish left scattered around the farmstead? Then imagine the impression of the lender who is staking that kind of farmer with hard-earned cash.

There is an old rule that a person's credit rating is based upon three C's - Character, Capacity and Collateral. Maybe in these days, we should add two other C's - Care and Cooperation - care in protecting life and property, and cooperation of the wife and family in developing and in maintaining a good credit rating.
