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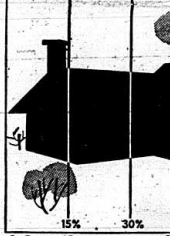

This map shows the number of traffic fatalities which occurred on Kentucky counties' streets and highways during 1961 (death number above county's name) and 1962 (below). Only one county, Lyon, had a perfect (deathless) record for both years while nine others had deathless records for one of the two years. The largest increase, by percentage, was Breckinridge with a 700 per cent increase, and the largest decrease in traffic fatalities was Martin County with a 300 per cent decrease. The average for all counties in 1962 was 6.6 deaths as compared to 6 for 1961. The toll for 1961 was 722. The official death toll for 1962 has been revised to 791 as of January 22. One marked contrast noted was that while Pike County showed 300 per cent increase over 1961, the county bordering it on the north, Martin County, showed the exact reverse. In actual number of fatalities, Hopkins County had 11 less than 1961, and Pike County had 15 more than in 1961, to lead both extremes.

Reports on Patients

For the 71st year in a row Children's Hospital in Louisville, again in 1962, has broken all previous records.

The hospital announced its patient statistics yesterday. They showed Rockcastle County compiled a total of 36 days. The total patient days from Rockcastle County is only a small percentage of the total help given to every county in the state.

Some 1962 statistics compared to the 1961 figures showed Children's Hospital cared for 30,116 patients in 1962 compared with 29,832 in 1961. The breakdown of this total showed 7,548 admitted. Patients from counties in Kentucky other than Jefferson County chocked up a grand total of 18,063 patients in the Louisville hospital.

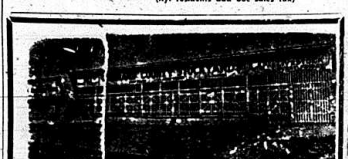

to the west. It passes close to Green Hill, then along the ridge to the west of US 25 at Scenic View. At Reno Valley, the interchange and road runs to the rear of Reno Valley. Lodge, crosses Reno Creek and passes close to Betty Acres Resturant. From that point, it begins its by-curve to the north and east, ending at the Burr interchange. From Burr it swings south to the Rockcastle River.

Survey units have been in Rockcastle for the past two weeks. Next step, as Mr. Ward noted, will be the engineering, followed by the purchase of right-of-way. This is expected to be underway during the early spring.

Government Reminds State Wool Growers

Wool growers were reminded today that the 1962 program payments, which were made this summer, will be made on wool and unshorn lambs which are marketed before March 31. After the closing date for the 1962 program, it will be filed before the end of April 1963.

He emphasized that the information on payment applications is to be supported by adequate records on the sales. For instance, producer sales records for shorn wool should show name and address of buyer, date of sale, name and address of producer, net weight of wool sold, and net proceeds to producer after normal marketing deductions.

Payments to producers for the 1962 marketing year will follow the same methods employed for previous years. Shorn wool payments will be equal to a percentage of each producer's cash returns from wool sales. The percentage to be announced later this year will be that required to raise the wool average price received by all producers for shorn wool during the marketing year up to the incentive price of 62 cents per pound.

Lamb payments will be made to each producer who sells lambs that have never been shorn. The payments will be at a rate per hundred-weight of live animal marketed to compensate for the wool on them on a basis comparable to the incentive payment per pound of shorn wool.

Mr. Wilson reminded growers that the marketing year will be a 9-month one—extending from April 1 of this year through Dec. 31, 1963. After 1963 the marketing year will be on a 12-month calendar-year basis, in line with recommendations by the Wool Marketing Board for 1963 and later

Identify Bridge To Be Constructed

A narrow, one-lane bridge over the Rockcastle River on Kentucky Highway 192 near Mt. Vernon will be replaced by the Federal Government. It was reported earlier the bridge was over KY 80.

The bridge was weakened last spring when it was eroded by flood waters for more than a week. At that time, persons living just across Rockcastle River in Laurel County could not get to Somerset except by driving almost to London and coming back across KY 80.

Senator Cooper said the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads had allocated \$385,000 to replace the bridge. The funds will come from the Accelerated Public Works Program, to provide work in areas of unemployment. A contract for construction of the bridge is scheduled to be let in March and it should be completed sometime this summer. Senator Cooper added.

The bridge is being built by the Federal Government as the highway is in Cumberland National Forest. The U. S. Forestry Department has developed the area around the bridge into a park and recreational area. On this side of the river are trails, camp sites and sanitary facilities. On the other side of the river at Berea the Forestry Department has constructed a boat-launching ramp and parking area.

Hiatt Takes Course
Dr. A. J. Hiatt, University of Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station plant physiologist, started a four-week course Monday in

radioisotope techniques at the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies, Oak Ridge, Tenn.

More Pay Planned In Grain Program

Growers who take part in the 1963 feed grain program will receive a price-support payment in addition to the diversion payment according to R. O. Wilson, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee.

Such growers will also qualify for regular price-support loans or purchase agreements on their 1963 corn, grain sorghum, and barley crops.

The price-support payment, the chairman explains, is a new feature of the feed grain program for 1963. A similar payment is also available for 1962.

Miss Valerie Constance Black, daughter of Mrs. Eva Black, Livingston, has earned Magna Cum Laude honors for superior academic work at Midway Junior College, Midway.

According to Mrs. O. B. Wilder, registrar, Miss Black earned a 3.5 standing (based on a possible 4 points) on all work taken during the Fall 1962 semester. Miss Black is a senior at Midway and will graduate in June with the A. A. degree.

Unlike last year's feed grain program, the regular loan or purchase agreement will be available to 1963 program participants on the acreage planted to the three feed grains in 1963. The same rates will apply throughout the country; they will not vary by counties as the regular loan rates do.

Rates for the price-support payment have been established at 18 cents per bushel for corn, 16 cents per bushel (39 cents per hundredweight) for grain sorghum, and 14 cents per bushel for barley. For each farm, the farm bases for all three grains will be combined into one feed grain base. And the rate used in determining the price-support payment will depend on the kind of feed grain taken out of production for a particular farm—like the diversion payment rate.

Mr. Wilson pointed out that the price-support payment really serves as income insurance; it will be made to growers who divert at least the minimum 20 percent of the farm's feed grain base into a conservation use. Even if the planted crop is destroyed by natural conditions, or even if part of the feed grain is fed to the animals on the farm, the price-support payment will be made just the same.
