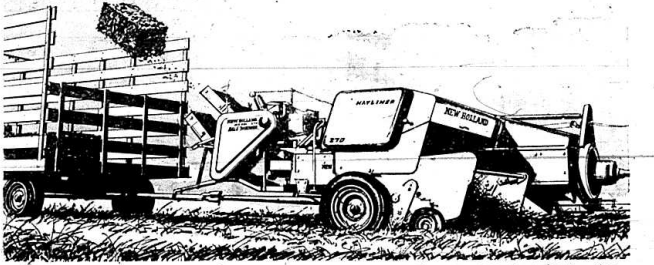
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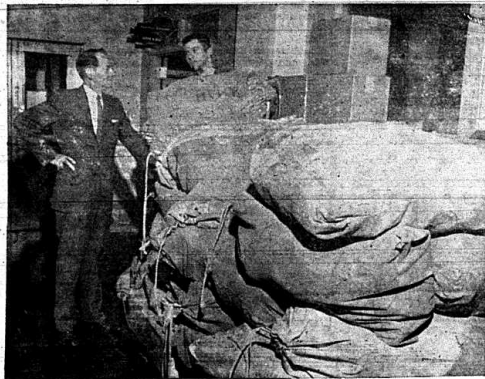

Famed County Artist, Bert Mullins, Is Dead

Bert Mullins, of Disputanta, nationally-known muralist, died in his sleep at the home of a sister, Mary Clyde Linnville, at Roundstone, Feb. 22. He was 62.

Mr. Mullins was a victim of a heart condition that had plagued him for several years, but his death was unexpected.

Mr. Mullins spent most of his life painting murals of Kentucky life. He started drawing and painting at a child, and early became known as an outstanding artist and woodcraftsman. He studied art at Berea College and Provincetown, Mass.

Among his works are murals in the post office at Campbellsville, Morgantown, Berea and Louisville; at the courthouse at Madisonville; at the University of Kentucky and Eastern Kentucky State College; the circuit courtroom at Madisonville, and the First Christian Church at Berea, and Mt. Vernon.

A mural of his life in the mountains of Kentucky is in Radio City Music Hall, New York City. His magnificent "History of Kentucky" is in Renfro Valley. He also did a portrait of Lincoln that hangs at Berea College and a portrait of John James Audubon that hangs at Audubon State Park, Henderson.

He also painted portraits of individuals, but they were mostly limited to close friends and acquaintances. His art technique was original and modern, but he did not belong to either the Impressionist or Surrealist schools of art. His colors, mostly in grays, blues, greens, and various pastels, were always blended and fused to the mass and subject matter of his works.

The casual observer, very likely would be struck by the entire picture rather than any one part of it.

Mr. Mullins and his wife, Eva, lived in a stone house named Wood Bekony they were building with their own hands at Disputanta. They began it in 1937 using fill stone from the hillside. It is about 95 feet in length and has 15 gables, with architecture reminiscent of a French chateau. It was almost complete.

Though he was an individualist, he was not the "eccentric" artist of the day. When to his death, he asked that funeral services be simple. He preferred a mahogany homemade casket,

and supervised its construction in the woodworking shop at Berea College.

Besides his wife, Eva, and sister, Mrs. Linnville, he is survived by another sister, Mrs. Kathryn Gilbert, of Scottsburg, Ind., and two brothers, Fred Mullins, of Burgin, and Edward Mullins, of Louisville.

Funeral services were conducted Sunday at Scaffold Lane Baptist Church with Bro. Floyd Long officiating. He was buried in the church cemetery. W. F. Y. Funeral Home, Berea, was in charge of arrangements.

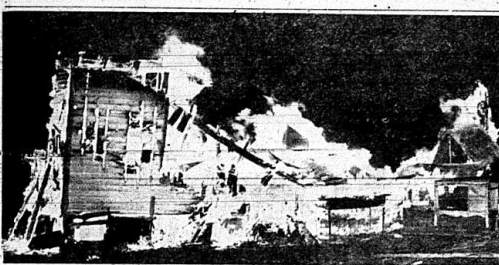

Three Plaintiffs Withdraw From City Water Rate Suit

Official opposition to a water rate increase for the city of Mt. Vernon dwindled this week when three plaintiffs withdrew from a suit filed against the city.

The Signal was unable to learn the definite reasons for the withdrawals since reasons were not spelled out in court records.

For proponents of the water rate increase, the withdrawal is considered a moral victory rather than a legal victory, but no official comment was forthcoming from the city or from the remaining plaintiffs.

The city announced this week attorneys have filed an answer to the complaint (suit) against the water rate increase.

The answer was short. It merely denied existing water rates are unreasonable and demanded the suit be dismissed and plaintiffs bear court costs.

When Circuit Judge R. C. Tarter will rule on the complaint, not known at this time. It could be immediately or several weeks.

The plaintiffs in the case are requesting the increase in the base water rates from \$2 to \$3.30 for 2,000 gallons which went into effect last October.

Though no mention has been made in the suit of the city's proposed \$419,000 system, a ruling for the plaintiffs in the water rate case could mean the end of the sewer system, since the sewer rate will be half of the water bill. The city would not be able to realize enough to pay for the sewer system. (Continued on Page 4)

State Takes First Steps Toward I-75 Construction

The Kentucky Highway Department went into action this week to get in motion steps necessary leading to construction of Interstate Highway 75 between Richmond and Williamsburg.

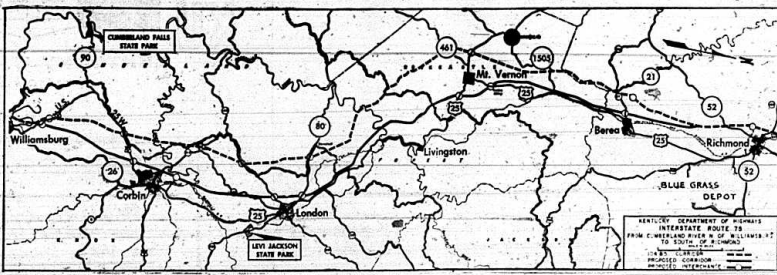
Commissioner Henry Ward asked the US Bureau of Public Roads' Kentucky office to review and modify the Department's contract with the Bureau for construction of the route a step necessary prior to start of preliminary engineering.

Ward's action came only hours after the Bureau notified Kentucky that it had approved a corridor location which will place the route segment close to Mt. Vernon, Berea, London and Corbin.

"Modification of the contract is a matter of paperwork and should take only a few days," Ward said. "Then we can proceed immediately with preliminary engineering."

The engineering probably will be consulting engineers in several sections so that this phase of the work may proceed along the entire corridor at the same time, according to the Commissioner.

"Although the approved route is very little shorter than the original corridor, we will save more than \$8 million alone in construction costs of the Interstate and connector roads," he said. "Under the original plan, connector roads would have cost more than \$9 million; and

on the proposed new location, as a result of a preliminary hearing on the route was held in May, 1962. Interstate 75 will extend from north to south through Kentucky. The Kentucky portion will extend from a new Old River bridge at Covington to the Tennessee-Kentucky state line. The route has been completed and opened to traffic from downtown Covington to Williams town, a distance of 34 miles; from the Kentucky River at Clay's Ferry to near Richmond, a distance of eight miles; and from Saxton in Whitley County to the Tennessee line, a distance of four miles. All the route from Williams town to near Lexington is under construction and bids have been opened on a three-mile section from Saxton north toward Pleasant View.

National plans call for all of the Interstate System to be under construction by 1969 and completed by 1972. "Kentucky is in an excellent position to meet this same construction schedule," Commissioner Ward said.

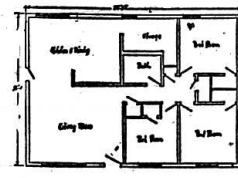
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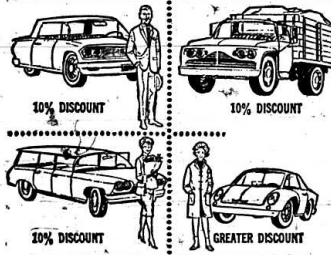

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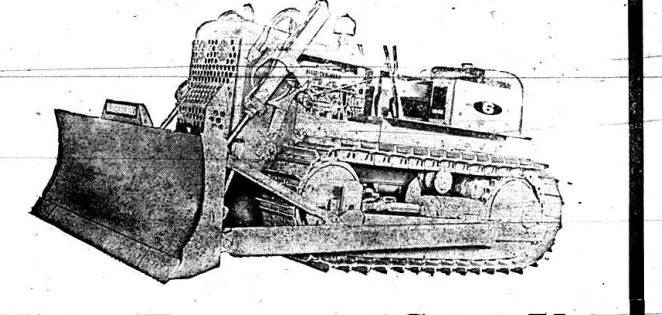

Last week the State Highway Department announced approval of the route Interstate 75 will follow through Rockcastle County.

This week the department says it will proceed in all haste to get the \$1 million dollar Richmond to Williamsburg section under construction.

To face facts, it is entirely possible this summer may be the last full summer in which some businesses at Mt. Vernon and Livingston can depend heavily on tourist dollars.

It is definite that some businesses will feel the pinch of this decrease in business with I-75 bypassing the towns, particularly service stations and motels.

What remedy to prescribe for these people will remain as much of an unanswered question here as it will in Berea, London and Corbin, all depending on US 25 to supply customers.

There is also a measure of consolation in the fact that US 150 will continue into Mt. Vernon and eventually be four-lane to Louisville.

The next two years are going to be difficult ones for Mt. Vernon residents. The courthouse will be torn down and replaced. Streets and yards will be torn up laying sewer lines and water lines.

Livingston will be another matter. The town will be left high and dry by the change of highway. For Livingston, it will be a matter, literally, of pulling themselves up by the boot straps.

At the intersection of two federal highways, Mt. Vernon has an untapped potential that may, in years to come, prove more of a boon than a bust.

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total feed grain base. For diverting more than the minimum acreage from feed grain production into a conserving use, the diversion payments will be figured at a higher rate.

Besides the diversion payments available through participation in the feed grain program, participating farmers also qualify for the feed-incentive program on the normal production of the acreage planted in feed grains, and they are also eligible to put their crop under the regular price-support loans or purchase agreements, if the farmer wishes, a part of the diversion payments may be made in advance.

Chairman Wilson points out that participation in the feed grain program not only saves the farmer the costs of planting and harvesting acreage of unneeded feed grains while guaranteeing a substantial income from his diverted acres, but it also increases the conservation of the Nation's cropland, cuts the reduction of government feed grain stocks, and saves dollars for taxpayers by reducing the costs of storage, shipping, and handling the government-owned grains.

(Continued from Page 1) money to repay the sewer loan from the old \$2 water rate.

The city this week also began preparation of facts and figures relating to the water rate increase that could be beneficial in court action, should the suit go that far.

The city is expected to compare the new Mt. Vernon water rate with water rates of surrounding towns. For record, some of those rates are as follows: Somerset - \$2.50 for the first 1,000 gallons, and 95 cents for each additional 1,000 gallons.

Stanford - \$3.20 for the first 2,000 gallons, \$1.05 for the next 3,000 gallons, and 95 cents for each additional 1,000 gallons for the next 4,000 gallons; 90 cents for the next 750 gallons, and 80 cents for each additional 750 gallons.

London - \$2.60 for the first 2,000 gallons; 80 cents per 1,000 gallons for the next 4,000 gallons, and 50 cents for each additional 1,000 gallons. London has the lowest rate.

Mt. Vernon - \$3.30 for the first 2,000 gallons; 90 cents for the next 3,000 gallons; next 90,000 gallons is 70 cents per 1,000 gallons, and all over 100,000 gallons is 50 cents per 1,000 gallons.

New Registration For Grain Program

The 1963 feed grain program is open to owners of several farms whether they sign up only one farm or all the farms they own, according to R. O. Wilson, chairman, Agricultural Statistics and Conservation State Committee.

"It is not necessary to sign up all farms in which feed grain crops are raised, but the farmer must sign up only one farm or all the farms they own, according to R. O. Wilson, chairman, Agricultural Statistics and Conservation State Committee.

Provisions of the regulation are: (1) No vessel shall operate, moor or be used (except in emergencies) within 500 feet above or below the wicket crest of the power dam at Kentucky Lake when one or more wickets are open.

(2) No vessel shall operate, moor or be used within 100 feet of the Kentucky Dam generator water exhausts chutes.

(3) No vessel shall under any circumstances enter a turbine exhaust chute of any power dam in this state except for such purposes as the operators of the dam shall prescribe.
