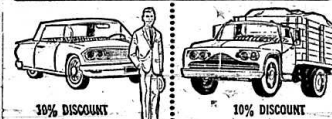

The Hysingers said their Dekalb 805 was easier to shuck and that it stood well. They planted the seed seven inches in the drill and fertilized with 1,000 pounds of 10-10-10 and 100 pounds of Androsulf ammonia per acre.

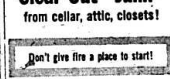

## Medal Of Honor Winner To Get Spot In Courthouse

A glass-enclosed wall case to hold a plaque, picture, and possibly the Congressional Medal of Honor awarded Pfc. David M. Smith of Livingston, for heroism in the Korean War will be placed in the new Rockcastle County Courthouse, according to County Judge C. C. Carter.

Pfc. Smith, 23, son of the late William D. Smith, of Livingston, is the only Rockcastle County veteran to receive the nation's highest honor.

Pfc. Smith, a gunner in an infantry mortar section, was killed Sept. 1, 1950 near Yongsan, Korea. He was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor posthumously in July 1951. Members of his family attended the ceremonies in Washington.

(The story of Pfc. Smith's last hour is recounted in an adjoining column.)

To date, Miss Mabel Smith, a niece at Elmwood Place, Ohio, has not been contacted to see if she will allow the Medal to be placed in the case in the courthouse. Members of the family say she may be reluctant to part with the Medal.

Pfc. Smith is also survived by another sister, Mrs. Nellie Morris, also of Ohio, and a brother, Eugene. One brother was killed in a truck accident several years ago, and another brother was killed at Livingston.

Pfc. Smith's father was buried the day the family received a War Department telegram telling of the soldier's death in action.

Judge Carter said this week he will be happy to have the case installed and the display erected in the new courthouse.

"This is the highest award our country can bestow, and the only time in history it has been bestowed on a man from Rockcastle County," said Carter. "It is fitting that a memorial to Pfc. Smith be in the county's most important building."

## Courage, Duty, Valor Marked Pfc. Smith's Last Moments

The Communist barrage had continued unceasingly all day and into the early evening.

Into the six infantrymen in the rocky enclosure near the top of the Korean ridge, the barrage seemed to become heavier as night came.

Pfc. David Monroe Smith rested a short distance from the noisy mortar and watched as the five men kept "the boss" busy lobbing shells into the night.

Pfc. Smith wondered if any of the shells found their mark, or if they exploded harmlessly somewhere on vacant Korean soil.

He considered his section's plight. The Communists had not taken Yongsan at his back. But from all reports, since noon the Communists had fought into a semi-circle around the Army positions under the bottom of the ridge.

Should the Communists break through the lines at the bottom of the hill, then he and his buddies would have two choices—retreat and live to fight again, or die in their tracks.

"One thing was sure, Pfc. Smith decided, it was better to be where he was than at the bottom of the hill, if there was something better in all this noise and confusion.

Smith hardly noticed as the sergeant came over. "Retreat enough yet?"

"I guess," Smith grunted.

"Take somebody's place as soon as you can," the sergeant said. He then sat down next to Smith first day of September. They're getting close, Smith's sergeant stretched himself. "Seems like the more Communies you kill the more there are."

"Yeah, you just get tired of shooting," Smith replied. "I'm getting tired of listening to 'the boss' but I'm sure glad she's here."

## Flu Epidemic Seems Over

The influenza epidemic that has been sweeping Rockcastle County for the past three weeks began to subside this week.

Most officials agree the epidemic here appears to be over.

The number of new cases in the last two days are less than in the previous several days.

The over-all number of cases reported this week in Rockcastle remain at near 500, about the same as the previous week. However, the number of new cases reflect the intensity of an epidemic.

Some cases are not reported. Many people in fringe areas of the county see doctors in other counties. These would not show up as county cases.

All schools reported a drop in attendance last week due to the flu, but attendance improved Monday and Tuesday.

The State Health Department, this week, said the sickness that has affected some 75,000 Kentuckians is Asian Flu.

## Water Plant Rated Doubtful

For the fifth straight year, the State Health Department has warned the City of Mt. Vernon that its water works plant leaves much to be desired.

In a Feb. 18 report to the city, R. W. Smith, sanitary engineer for the Health Department at Frankfort, labels the Mt. Vernon Water Works plant "doubtful" and says necessary improvements, or additions, need to be made to the existing facility.

The report—a four-page letter—criticizes in technical terminology what is wrong with the Mt. Vernon Water Works plant. The report delves into such areas as intake lines, the lake, the dam, flow of water, mix basin, sedimentation, clarifiers, filtration, a clear well, chlorination and other items.

The report found the physical condition of the water plant good. A new coat of paint has been applied to the walls and piping. It said concrete basins were also found to be excellent.

All totaled, the improvements the plant could run close to \$60,000, or more. The report did not include replacements of iron lines in various areas of the city estimated at \$28,000.

How the city is to make the improvements and additions is still a guess. One thing appeared obvious: This year's report was more strongly worded than previous reports.

The report on the water plant set out six recommendations.

It called for a "new flow controller for the raw water intake line."

The wooden baffles in the flocculation chamber should be reconditioned and the basin increased to provide a total detention time of approximately 40 minutes.

The addition of a quick mix basin should also greatly improve this phase of the treatment of raw water.

The size of the sedimentation basin should be increased to provide a four-hour detention period at 250 GPM.

A new 250 GPM pump should be installed to replace the existing 125 GPM pump.

"The Wallace and Tierman chlorinator should be completely reconditioned and placed in service to provide pre-chlorination of the raw water."

"For better operating conditions, it is advisable to construct a clear well to replace the present surge well. Facilities should be provided so that the water for backwashing to filters may be obtained from this well."

At the last meeting of the city council the council purchased a new chlorinator.

## Growing Tobacco Year Round Job

Growing tobacco is a year around job and no doubt a lot of farmers of Rockcastle County are now making plans for their tobacco crop for 1963, according to Paul Mills, county agent.

Plenty of heavy vigorous stocky plants should be ready for early transplanting if high quality tobacco is to be produced. Enough plant bed area should be prepared to provide at least two pullings.

It is desirable to prepare enough plant bed area to have a surplus of strong vigorous plants. Provide 100 feet of bed 9 feet wide, or 75 feet of bed 12 feet wide for each acre of burley tobacco to be set.

Sow 2 level teaspoons of cleaned and tested seed to each 100 feet of bed 9 feet wide, or 2 1/2 teaspoons (level)

of seed for each 100 feet of bed 12 feet wide. Seeding may be done as soon as weather permits which is usually by the last half of February or in March. Seeding should be completed by April 10. Personally I feel that a lot of plant beds are sown too early. When this is done we plants and also tobacco have a lot of cold injury of blooming out in the field before it is mature. Once the seed germinates, the plant has begun to grow and it sown too early it may stand there and growth will be very limited. The time that it is standing and not growing, the plant is ageing. When the plant becomes a certain age, it will bloom and still not be mature. The age factor does play a part in the early blooming of tobacco.

Fertilize beds which have been steamed or treated with methyl bromide, vapour, or allyl alcohol use a complete fertilizer such as 8-8-8 or 4-12-8 at the rate of 25 to 35 pounds for a bed 9 feet by 100 feet and rake in lightly. For a burned bed, use 25 to 30 pounds of a 20 percent

other variety. The variety that you should grow is the one that you like best and suits your situation. However, if you have had a disease problem of some kind, maybe you should change to a tobacco that is resistant to the disease you have had.

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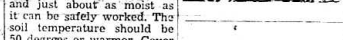

 Pfc. Smith suddenly saw the grenade hit the ground about five feet away. "Look out, a grenade!!!" Smith shouted to the unsuspecting men.  
 In the split seconds that followed, there was born in Pfc. David Monroe Smith, of Livingston, Kentucky, the valor, courage, self-sacrifice, and devotion to country that only a few men in our history ever achieved. He flung himself an 100 of the grenade, face down, as it exploded with a roar.  
 Pfc. Smith was evacuated and lived a few hours. But he did not speak again. Of course, he did not know that the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States would say, in granting him the Congressional Medal of Honor posthumously:  
 "Although mortally wounded in this display of valor, his intrepid act saved five men from death or serious injury. Private Smith's inspirational conduct and supreme sacrifice reflected lasting glory on himself and are inseparable with the noble traditions of the Infantry of the United States."

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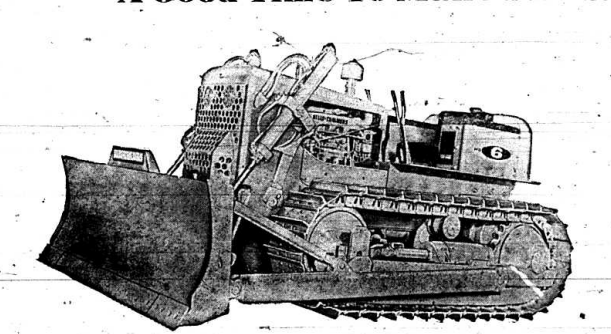
