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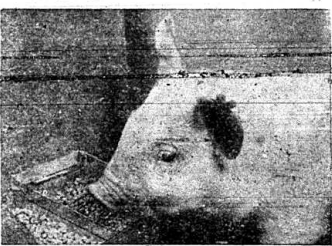

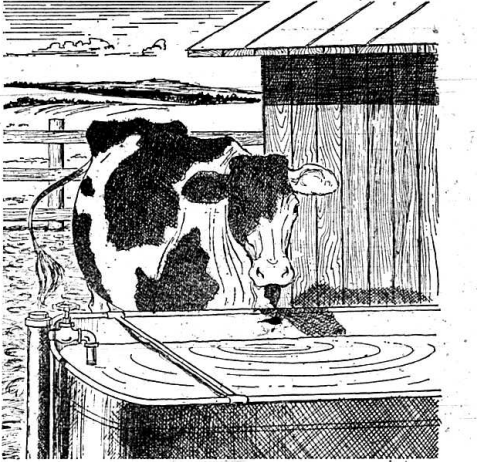

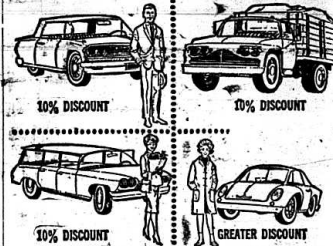

## We Approve Sewer System

Within the past year, the Mt. Vernon City Council has struggled over the many plans and specifications for a \$419,000 sewer system for the city.

After long discussions and countless meetings, the council finally decided to construct a sewer system for several reasons:

(1) The sewage problem in the city had become intolerable. Raw sewage was flowing from septic tanks into open ditches and fields—all a continuing breeding place for disease and odor.

(2) That in order to attract industry, a sewer system is one of the first requirements. Though the council felt, and said, it did not believe a sewer system would cause companies to come beating on Mt. Vernon's door, it did feel a sewer system would be another step toward making the town more attractive to industry.

(3) The State Health Department told the council the City has an acute sewage problem that will have to be solved, if not through friendly persuasion, then through legal means. In the case of some cities, the Health Department took the legal means.

With all this in mind, the council tackled the sewage problem. It hired an engineer, made a preliminary survey; decided to finance the system through a \$380,000 loan from the Community Facilities Administration, plus Health Department grants; and to repay the loan through revenue bonds. The entire project was studied by the federal government and approved.

A short time later, the council increased the base water rate from \$2 per 2,000 gallons to \$3.30 per 2,000 gallons with a graduated scale based on the amount of water used. It set a sewer bill at half the total water bill.

Following closely on the heels of the council's approval, Henry Cox, water superintendent at the time, presented the council with a \$28,000 itemized report of necessary repairs and replacements to existing water lines both inside and outside the city limits, thereby adding to the council's problems.

During all the discussions of the sewer system at regular council meetings, and special meetings, residents were invited to attend and express their feelings on the project. Up until the night of final passage, no one appeared personally to protest. On that night, some 15 persons attended and four expressed disapproval, including an attorney.

Then last month, some 14 residents inside and outside the city limits filed a complaint in Rockcastle Circuit Court

against the water rate increase. The group said the \$1.30 increase was too much, and asked that the water rate be rolled back to the old rate prior to October. However, since filing the complaint, five of the 14 have withdrawn their names from the complaint. A court decision remains in the hands of Circuit Judge R. C. Tartar.

During all the discussions, and after each meeting, the Signal reported in detail all that was voted and all that was talked about concerning the sewer system. We repeat some of those reports below.

We reported the council discussed financing in detail through sewer rate.

We reported the council discussed the problem of future water service and the necessary steps it would have to take to improve that service.

We reported the council studied rates in adjoining towns and found Mt. Vernon and London were lowest. They are still lowest with the increased rate.

We reported the council discussed the economy of the area and were aware of the possibility of hardship on some water users. But the council did not feel it should penalize the entire population of Mt. Vernon because of the hardship that would be visited on a few residents. Taking this into account, the council decided if the sewer system did not reach some residents, these residents would not be charged for sewer service. But the council felt that repairs to the water system were needed and the increase in the water bill was necessary and justified. Some areas where water lines are needed are not in the city limits.

Looking at the entire matter, it becomes readily apparent that the water system and the sewer system are necessarily one and the same. It is doubtful were it not for the increased water bill, sewer system planning would have to be discontinued and the three-and-three-eighths percent interest loan lost to the city.

We do not believe the large majority of people in Mt. Vernon want this to happen. We think solving the sewage problems will be well worth the cost, as the cost is now calculated by the engineers. However, we feel the city has stopped short of solving all the problems concerning water and sewage, and has stopped short of making the city attractive to industry.

For that reason we suggest the following:

- (1) That engineers and attorneys for the city accelerate their planning to construct the sewer system and disposal plant.
- (2) That an additional loan of about \$150,000 based on revenue bonds, be applied for through the Public Works Acceleration Act to renovate the water works, including a sizeable increase in the height of the dam, or an additional dam, as well as the digging of a clear water well, along with all the necessary equipment.
- (3) That a re-examination be made of sewer and water rates to see if the present rate will cover all these expenditures, and if not, to inform water users as soon as practical, of the possible future rate.
- (4) That the council, as soon as practical, ask architects to submit plans and specifications for a swimming pool for the city; based on swimming fees (revenue bonds), and that the project be turned over to one of the city's clubs for promotion.

All these water projects have been made easy for the

city because of the federal government and its interest in health and water resources. We believe Mt. Vernon should, like many other Kentucky cities, take advantage of all the "low cost" money it can before the money goes to some other town and we are forgotten.

We feel sure the council will continue to work for the betterment of the town with courage, foresight and determination.
