AFTER 6 YEARS OF OPERATION -

Hospital Proves Worth To County

Through six years of operation, the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital has had its "ups and downs," its "ins and outs," but it has managed to serve the needs of 7,039 injured and infirm persons who have sought its services.

This was pointedly illustrated this week when the Signal was allowed access to facts and figures that have been recorded over the past six years.

Looking at these facts and figures, it is readily apparent the hospital has been a "light in the darkness" for Rockcastle County, even though it has been plagued with two problems that, at times, have seemed unsurmountable. Despite these two problems, the hospital has managed above average service.

Before taking a look at the detailed figures, readers should bear in mind the hospital is a non-profit organization, and to break even, or slightly above is considered a triumph for the hospital.

It is also pertinent that the reader look at the two problems that have persisted since the hospital opened on Sept. 2, 1956.

The first problem, and probably the most important, is what Administrator Bobby Hayes, and Preston Nunneley, chairman of the Executive Board, call "patient census," or "patient load."

This boils down to the number of people who use the hospital.

Mr. Nunneley explains the problem in this way: "One of the major problems the hospital is faced with today is the patient census which averaged 9.6 patients per day in 1962, or a 40 percent occupancy. Estimates obtained from other hospitals indicate in order for a hospital to operate in the red the occupancy must be at 80 percent which in our hospital of 24 beds, would be approximately 20 patients per day."

In this statement lies a great problem—a problem that will not be easy for the hospital to solve. Many residents use hospitals in other towns, and in some of these cases the illness could have been as easily remedied, and less expensively, at the Rockcastle hospital as in another hospital. Take from the current usage figures the number of persons who are hospitalized from injuries, who live in other locales and states, and the local patronage becomes even less.

Obviously, the low use rate is caused by many and diverse reasons, but in almost every case the reasons why local people do not use the hospital are more of a personal nature than a shortcoming of the hospital facilities and personnel.

The second problem is even more complex, more demanding, and basically a matter of dollars and cents.

In order for any hospital, or business, to operate successfully it is necessary for the patients to pay their bills—in short, collections.

Mr. Nunneley discusses the problem in this way: "Not only does a hospital have to have 80 percent occupancy, a hospital must also collect 80 percent of its earned income. For the past five years of operation, our hospital averaged less than 50 percent occupancy and collected only 50 to 60 percent of its earned income from patients. Only during the past year, 1962, has the collection

reached the 80 percent mark. During the five years of low occupancy and low percent of collections, the hospital compiled an indebtedness of close to \$10,000, and only during the past year has the hospital been able to reduce this indebtedness to approximately \$2,500.

To show how collections have become an acute problem for the hospital, it is necessary to check Mr. Hayes' report for 1962.

In 1962, the hospital had total earnings of \$92,428.29, but actually collected \$80,985.69 in cash, leaving \$11,442.60 in debts to be collected.

Total expenditures for the actual year reached \$114,442.60. This amount subtracted from the actual income resulted in a loss of \$30,885.69 leaves the hospital \$61.95 in profit.

Is this all the hospital cleared in 1962?

No. (Here again we point to Mr. Nunneley's statement) since in the total expenditures no distinction is made between current and old debts. At the beginning of 1962, the hospital owed \$10,000. Today the debt has been reduced to \$2,500.

Other than money collected from services rendered by the hospital, the hospital does not have a big bank account to go to in time of need, as for example, a Catholic operated hospital which has an international fund. The local hospital has two sources of income other than from patients, and both these sources only help as best they can help.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court pays some on the bills of the county's indigent patients. In 1962, the court paid \$350. The traditional Mother's Day offering by the county's Baptist churches in 1962 resulted in \$563.90. Churches responding were Brookhead, Fairview, Mt. Vernon, Ottawa and Poplar Grove. It will be remembered the hospital started operations in 1956 on about \$20,000 in contributions from all churches and individuals of the county.

Obviously then, a mounting problem for the hospital is collections that have accumulated over the years. After six years of operations, the hospital has the amazing amount of \$69,837.71 in uncollected accounts on its books. (Continued on page 4)

Contract documents for a sewer treatment plant and sewage collection system for the City of Mt. Vernon have been forwarded to three governmental agencies for approval, and will be presented to the city council at its next meeting.

Contract documents include plans and specifications in final form; bid forms; contract forms; advertisements instructions; general and supplemental instructions; performance bond and other proposals.

Approval of the documents will mean the city is about ready to call for bids on the \$419,000 sewer system.

Generally, it takes about a month for approval unless one of the agencies call for further information.

Agencies receiving, or that will receive, the documents are the state Water Pollution Control Commission, Housing and Home Finance Agency, and Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

A loan of \$380,000 to finance the sewer system, plus \$39,000 in grants, have been approved by the federal agencies. As soon as documents are approved the funds for construction will be made available to the city.

Staking of collection lines has been underway at Mt. Vernon for several weeks.

Obviously, with these accounts paid, the hospital would be in equally amazing and excellent financial condition.

Again, it is amazing that with the patient load and collections problems the hospital still offers extensive services, even though it remains in the "small hospital" category, and is a non-profit organization.

At the end of 1962, with a \$61.97 profit, plus a decreased debt, it would appear the hospital is finally "out of the woods" financially. However, this is not quite the case. Mr. Nunneley discusses it this way:

"It would appear that the hospital will be in fine financial shape if the present trend is continued. However, seven years, and the initial equipment, such as furniture, has deteriorated and will eventually have to be replaced. Also, at any time equipment such as x-ray machines, operating room equipment, and other heavily used machines, might have to be replaced, any of which run into thousands of dollars. Even though the hospital manages to keep its head above water, it could be faced with a financial problem at any time. The answer to this is: Support your hospital!"

It might be noted that in 1961 two electric water heaters were installed at a total cost of \$333.17 to save the use of the furnaces during the summer. One water softening unit was installed at a total cost of \$614.75 to retard deterioration of the heating system.

Just where does the hospital spend its money?
Expenditures were \$80,923.72 in 1962. A check of other hospitals indicates the local hospital does well in spending its money — if not better than most hospitals of comparable size.

Over the six years expenses have been held reasonably in line. In 1962, the hospital spent \$2,291.80 more from Sept. 1, 1957 to Aug. 31, 1958 (first full year of operation) the hospital spent \$78,140.04. It has varied very little in the intervening years. In an era of continuously rising costs, holding the line on expenses is no less than remarkable. Let us look at its expenditures.

In 1962, the hospital spent \$46,397.82 for salaries for 17 employees. The employees and their titles are: Bobby Hayes, administrator; Bennett H. Hatt, bookkeeper who is a member of the American Association of Hospital Accountants; Faye Saylor, clerk-typist; Alonzo Hamm, maintenance; Joyce Whitaker, head nurse; Nimra Lyons, nurse; Joyce Lasswell, Jennie Harris, Ramona Hitt and Carol Deborde, all licensed practical nurses; Margaret Parrett, central supply supervisor; Linda Martin, Dorothy Payne and Lyla Pees, all nurses; Fieda Franks, housekeeper and relief cook; Mattie Crocker and Mamie Cummins, dietary.

In the area of administrative, the hospital spent \$794.83 for office supplies; \$2,033.40 for fees and refunds; \$3,118.43 for insurance and FICA tax, for a total of \$5,946.38.

It spent \$4,948.54 on food
On maintenance and operations, it spent \$2,291.80 on supplies; \$2,527.16 on laundry; \$2,676.39 on water and electricity; \$613.51 for telephone; \$3,314.00 on fuel, and \$518.85 on insurance and miscellaneous items, for a total of \$11,931.71.

In the area of nursing service, it spent \$3,129.60 for supplies; \$4,655.62 for drugs; and \$1,186.90 for oxygen, for a total of \$8,972.12.

In laboratory and x-ray, it spent \$1,479.90 for supplies, and \$1,243.25 for services of technicians in other clinics where services were needed and not offered at the hospital. These expenditures totalled \$2,723.15.

room, operating room, clinical laboratory, electrocardiography, and x-ray diagnosis.

Two doctors are available on call: Dr. George Griffith and Dr. Jack Lewis. Several doctors from other areas also use the hospital facilities.

Total admissions through March 11, 1963 were 7,059. Babies born totalled 1,023. Patients seen in the emergency room in 1962 totalled 1,850.

Three types of rooms are available: A semi-private room at \$12.50 per day; a private room for \$14 a day; a private room with air condition and bath, \$16.50. The price of rooms increased generally \$2 in 1958.

During the six years of operations, two organizations have proved their worth in helping county doctors and employees of the hospital. They are the Ladies' Auxiliary and the Gray Ladies.

The Ladies' Auxiliary has approximately 130 members composed of ladies from various churches in the county. They assist in the care of the patients and infant's clothes, and making new drapes, mending bed linens, and gowns. They serve in any capacity necessary to assist the hospital. Their chief duty is furnishing New Testaments for all babies born at the hospital, and maintaining a library with tracts, magazines, and books, to provide reading for the patients. Mrs. Rissie Wright is president of the Auxiliary, Mrs. R. H. Hamm is vice president, and Mrs. Earl Bullock is secretary-treasurer. The members come from each Baptist church.

The other organization is the Gray Ladies. Its duties are to show visitors to patients, give out magazines, write letters, serve food and water, and arrange flowers, among other duties. Like the Auxiliary, the Gray Ladies have served since the hospital opened. The group reported its active members are: Louise Bailey, Irene Baker, Joyce Baker, Carrie Baker, Wanda Franklin, Mary Craig, Audrey Hamm, Lola Roberts, Bernice Hancock, Ruby Stewart, Ann Mullins, Carolyn Gregory, Hazel Owens, Virginia Ponder, Virginia S. Bray, Rissie Wright, Bessie St. Clair and Juanita Meece.

Visiting hours at the hospital are: 10:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m.; 2 p. m. to 4 p. m., and 6 p. m. to 9:30 p. m. As time goes by, and as costs of labor and operations continue to rise, the hospital more and more will be pressed to make "ends meet."

But Administrator Hayes, who has served for one year, shows through his past year of conscientious service, he will be working hard to keep the hospital an important and vital organization in the community.
