Feed-Grain Program Has Many Advantages

Growers who participate in the 1963 feed grain program will have four definite advantages over growers who elect not to participate, according to R. O. Wilson, chairman, Agricultural Station, Kentucky Valley and Conservation State Committee. These advantages he described as: (1) Price support will be available for the participation grower's 1963 production of corn, grain sorghum, and barley. (2) A substantial income from the acres diverted is assured. (3) The price-support payment of the planted acreage is also assured. (4) An advance payment of part of the diversion payment, at the participant's request, will be made at the time of signing up or as soon as possible after that time. A grower participating in the feed grain program, the Chairman explained, reduces his acreage of corn, grain sorghum, and barley by at least 20 percent of his farm's feed grain base acreage, and devotes this diverted acreage to a conserving use. The first step necessary to take part in the program, however, is signing an intention-to-participate form at the ASCS County Office. The sign-up period extends through March 22.

State Reports Road Work; Group Visits At Frankfort

Bids will be announced Friday on a section of US 25 between Main Street and US 150 at Mt. Vernon.

It will be the third time the State Highway Department has taken bids on the Richmond Street section, which has been a continual bother and repair job for the local Highway Department.

Twice before there were no bids to concrete the stretch because of the smallness of the job. But it is believed a contractor now working in the county will bid on the project.

In another area of the county, blacktopping work will begin between now and May 1 on a stretch of US 150 between Franktown and the property west of Mareburg and the Lincoln County line.

Bids on the stretch were awarded on the stretch last year to the Cardinal Construction Co., but the contractor was unable to do the work.

Work is also planned on a highway slip on US 25 near Fort Sequoyah Indian Village. Work will be done until the short section is remedied.

The Signal also learned in a conversation with Perry White, administrative assistant to Highway Commissioner Henry Ward, that bids will be taken shortly for blacktopping of an eight-mile stretch of US 25 between Estill Street at Berea and the junction of US 421 at Blue Grass Ordnance Depot.

Group Visits

Several residents of Rockcastle visited State Highway Commissioner Henry Ward today to ask the state and federal government to consider an entrance-exit from proposed Interstate 75 near the Rockcastle River.

The group asked the commissioner to request the "service" entrance-exit to serve State Highway Department vehicles, and to allow access to tourist attractions between Livingston and London, including Fort Sequoyah Indian Village, Dog Patch, Castle Rock, Lettered Rock, Saltpetre Cave.

Report 2 Area Forest Fires

As of Wednesday, Rockcastle County had escaped large forest fires similar to those which have been plaguing Eastern Kentucky during the past few days.

Only two fires of any consequence have been reported in Rockcastle by C. G. Stewart, fire warden.

One fire burned over approximately 100 acres in the Bowling Ridge section near Brodhead. Timber on property belonging to George Jones was destroyed.

A fire on Brush Creek Ridge burned about 160 acres. Some of the property owners affected included Dan Gray, Ed Burnett, Jack Allen and Mose Mullins, Mr. Stewart said.

No buildings were reported destroyed by the fires.

Mr. Stewart asked residents to be especially careful when setting fires to clear land or burn rubbish. In high wind, the fires can quickly get out of hand as long as the weather remains dry.

He said fires are especially destructive this time of year when the sap is rising in trees. The trees are ordinarily killed.

Many hundreds of acres of forest land have burned in Eastern Kentucky in the past few days. One large fire was reported just across the Rockcastle County line in Laurel, near Fort Sequoyah.

The Weather Bureau reported Wednesday a cold front bringing rain is expected to arrive in Eastern Kentucky about Thursday.

MONEY NEEDED FOR BOOKMOBILE

A third special tax is expected to join the courthouse bond issue and Rockcastle County Health Department health district tax on the November ballot.

The Rockcastle County Library Board will ask voters to approve a special library tax of five cents on the \$100 property assessment to continue the Bookmobile and library in Rockcastle County.

Also on the ballot this November is a tax to finance a new courthouse-jail of about 15 cents on the \$100 property assessment, and the health district tax set at 10 cents on the \$100.

In short, if voters approve all three tax measures, their tax bill will increase 30 cents on the \$100 property assessment. If a property owners property is assessed \$1,000, this bill will be increased \$3 a year.

All tax measures are subject to a vote of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court before going on the ballot. Last year, the health district tax failed to get on the ballot at a Fiscal Court meeting when the motion failed from lack of a second.

Until last year, the local library was able to use state funds to pay the bookmobile drivers salaries. This expense must now be borne through local support. The state funds must be used to actually improve the library services available, such as purchasing new books.

To keep the library open, officials say, so that people will have the opportunity to use their library, the Board is using its reserve fund.

which a grower may obtain after signing up in the 1963 feed grain program is in the part of the "diversion" payment of the R. G. Wilson, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee. He emphasized that it does not include the special price-support payment.

To correct some misunderstanding about just what the advance payment will include, the Chairman explained that, at the time a producer files his intention-to-participate form, he may also make a request for an advance payment not to exceed one-half of his estimated total diversion payment for participation in the program.

If he takes an advance payment, he will receive the balance of his diversion payment probably about September 1, after performance on the farm has been established. The price-support payment will also be made at the time the final diversion payment is made.

The price-support payment is a new feature of the 1963 feed grain program. It will be made on the normal production of the acreage planted to one or more of the three feed grains—corn, grain sorghum, or barley, and it will be figured according to the crop acreage diverted from production into a conservation use. The payments amount to 18 cents per bushel for corn, 16 cents per bushel for grain sorghum, and 14 cents per bushel for

barley. At least 20 percent of the farm's feed grain base acreage is diverted in order for the farm to qualify as "participating" in the program.

Growers of corn, grain sorghum, and barley also qualify for the regular price-support loans and purchase agreements by taking part in the 1963 feed grain program.

Chairman Wilson reminds growers that the sign-up period for taking part in the feed grain program, extends through March 22.

If all probability, the state would approve the project if the Bureau of Roads would approve. But the Bureau has not been inclined to make interstate routes too accessible in the past. The state said earlier the access could be engineered into the superhighway plan at a later date since it did not involve the construction of a major interchange.

(Continued from Page 1) which has been held to be used in the event of a major breakdown on the Bookmobile truck. The bulk of this fund will be exhausted this year.

Bookmobile officials say the library tax will be on sound financial footing. It will allow the county library to be open more hours and the Bookmobile to operate more days each month.

With the special tax, the state support of the Bookmobile will automatically increase \$1700. A new Bookmobile carrying twice as many books as the old Bookmobile will be supplied the

county by the state. The truck is expected to arrive in the county during April. It will be in use here until the November vote and will be kept here if there is a successful vote. Since the Bookmobile Library started in 1954, it has lived from year to year on a hand to mouth operation. Increased local funds must now be made available for it to continue in operation. By voting a tax for the library, the people are assured of these services continuing and growing as Rockcastle County grows, the officials reported.

Last year the Bookmobile and the County Library circulated 46,670 juvenile books and 15,406 adult books, totaling 62,076.

Monday night the Rockcastle Board of Health voted to put the health tax on the November ballot. It also voted to keep the Health Department open another year with the same budget as last year.


