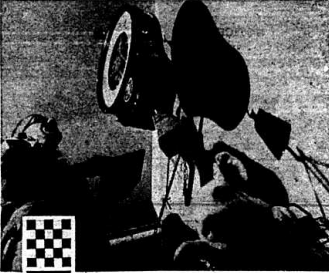

## Lake Barge Traffic Discussed; Open Sewer Bids May 16

A series of discussions are in the offing that may eventually lead to the establishment of barge traffic through the entire length of Lake Cumberland and possibly including lakes formed by the proposed auxiliary dams.

The barges would transport "low cost" and "inferior" coal to the TVA electric generating steam plant at Burnside from Eastern Kentucky coal sources.

The discussion of barge traffic was topped up recently with the reported visit to the Somerset area of Tennessee people interested in the barge project.

Whether barge traffic would include lakes formed by the proposed Rockcastle River Dam or the Laurel River Dam is not certain; and when economic impact all this would have on the Rockcastle area if barge traffic were established is also not certain. But the discussions are classified important.

Many "ifs" connected with the Rockcastle Dam would have to be clarified before the economic impact of barge traffic on this area could be determined.

If it were feasible, Rockcastle County has considerable "low cost" coal that is usable at the Burnside steam plant, and it could be mined at a profit, then the impact on the county would be considerable.

County people for years have said there are thousands of acres of low grade coal adjacent to the Rockcastle River in Rockcastle, Laurel and Pulaski counties—coal that is not in great demand as household fuel, but usable for many industries.

To date, most of this coal has remained in the ground, because of the low price it brings on the market and the high cost of transportation. If the cost of transportation could be reduced then this coal could be mined. Barges would solve the transportation cost problem.

Just where all this coal is in Rockcastle has never been pinpointed. If it were pinpointed, there might be another problem to solve. There are strip mining laws and these laws could make it unfeasible to mine the coal. Most pro-

ponents say not to worry about strip mining laws until the other problems are solved and other questions answered.

Since the first discussions of Lake Cumberland years ago, many Tennessee people and TVA promoters have been extremely interested in barge traffic that would carry all kinds of products from the headwaters of the Cumberland and Tennessee Rivers to the points where the rivers empty into the Mississippi River.

Initiating continuous barge traffic for coal the length of these rivers could be costly. Coal barges would have to be lifted over the various dams. Usually this is done by locks, and locks on all the dams now in existence, or proposed, would be economically prohibitive. But, say proponents, there is another way. Locks would be unnecessary if the coal could be changed from barge to barge at each dam.

They propose to crush the coal at its source, bring it by barge to the dam, then with large pipes, or conveyors, transfer it from one barge above the dam to another below the dam. The coal then could continue on its way by barge to the stern plant.

Officials connected with the Army Corps of Engineers say no locks are planned at this time for the smaller auxiliary dams. However, the Corps says it will listen to discussions of this project, as it would listen to any discussion of any project that might improve the economy of Eastern Kentucky.

Paul Hughes, Somerset businessman and one of those interested in the development of Lake Cumberland, says everything will be done by Somerset people to improve the economic life of all areas bordering on Lake Cumberland.

If locks, or other transportation methods, would greatly improve the areas bordering on Lake Cumberland, then every effort will be made to explore the feasibility of the method, Mr. Hughes said.

How Mr. Hughes does not see how, at this time, locks could be planned or constructed on all the auxiliary dams.

As early as September 1961, barge traffic was under consideration for Lake Cumberland. Hugh Spurlock, manager of the Eastern Kentucky Rural Cooperative Corp., at Winchester, was concerned with getting an ample supply of coal to the co-op's Burnside plant. He noted the following:

"The possible availability of 200 Kilowatts of hydro power at Laurel and about the same amount at proposed Rockcastle has sort of pushed forward in our thinking the idea. (Continued on Page 4)

### Ask Corps To Open Channels

The Kentucky General Assembly has petitioned the U. S. Corps of Engineers to open navigable channels in the Cumberland River to provide transportation through a wide area of South-central Kentucky and North-central Tennessee.

The decision to seek navigation on the river was made in a resolution adopted by the Kentucky Senate during the 1963 Special Session. The measure was introduced by Senator Richard L. Garnett, Glasgow Democrat, and co-sponsored by Senators W. C. Mann, Maryrowbone Republican, and George D. Conley, Ashland Democrat.

The legislature in a resolution asked the Engineers to "dredge and open necessary navigable channels in the Cumberland River sufficient to permit navigation, complete the Cordell Hull Dam, construct locks thereat, construct the dam and necessary locks at Colina, Tenn., and provide a conveyor over Wolf Creek, to the end that navigation will be available to or above Colina."

The resolution said that a major part of the areas which would be served have no railroad lines or connections, produce large amounts of timber and farm products and are now developing numerous small industries and processing plants.

These parts of Kentucky and Tennessee are "in grave need of transportation facilities" in order to develop natural resources and "cease to be a depressed area," the resolution said.

He was taken to the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital for treatment. He was reported "getting along all right" after Charles H. Reynolds.

### Trout Placed In Crooked Creek

About 1,000 rainbow trout from the State Department of Fish and Wildlife will be put into Crooked Creek next week for fishermen to catch.

The trout are from six inches to 10 inches long, and fishermen are welcome to catch them . . . if they can.

If trout are caught, fishermen are asked to report the catch to Estil McBee, president of the Fish and Game Club, at Mt. Vernon.

The department wishes to know if trout will live in Rockcastle streams. The department is reasonably sure the fish won't multiply, but if they survive any length of time in the warm water trout will be made available to county fishermen.

Some fishermen caught trout last year, but were afraid it was unlawful to catch them and failed to report the catch.

"These fish are put into Rockcastle streams to catch. All we ask is that fishermen tell us when they catch them," Mr. McBee said.

Last year the state put about 1,000 trout into Roundstone Creek.

Mullins, nurse. The vaccine (Type III) will be given on sugar lumps as were the other types. The clinics will be held April 22 through 28.

### Health Department Readies Polio Clinics

Parents of all children, as well as the parents themselves, are urged to take the last series of oral Sabin polio vaccine when the clinic is held April 22 through 28.

According to Dr. M. A. Shepherd, health officer, "Your help is needed to make the county safer from polio, so don't let your community down. Everyone—children and adults alike, should take Type III oral polio vaccine. It will be given on sugar cubes as were the other two types."

Dr. Shepherd said Type III has been given to many millions of people. Over 3 million doses have been given in Kentucky with absolute safety and freedom from reactions.

"Even if you have not taken the other types, you should take Type II now while it is available and watch for an opportunity to get the type or types you missed. It does not matter whether they are taken in order, but there must be a month between doses and all three types must be taken for complete and permanent protection against polio," Dr. Shepherd said.

The Health Department and the teachers are depending on all parents to sign registration form for the records, since all children will be required to present a certificate showing they have had the vaccine before they can legally be enrolled in school next fall.

Again, the Rockcastle County Farm Bureau is requesting all who can afford to contribute a quarter to cover the cost of the vaccine.

### CONSTRUCTION DRAWS NEAR

Bids for construction work on Mt. Vernon's proposed \$419,000 sewer system will be opened by the city council May 16.

Bids will be advertised for by the council May 2. The bids will be opened and read public at a meeting of the council. The council could award the bids to the lowest bidder at the meeting or delay the awarding until the council can study the bids more closely.

Bids will be received on all phases of work on the system, including such items as lines, manholes, treatment plant and lift station.

of future expansion. Even with the first 100,000 kilowatts of steam power in prospect, we had the idea of encouraging the creation of a small Lake Cumberland barge line to move coal from East Kentucky suppliers 80 miles down Lake Cumberland to Burnside.

"If we should get power from Laurel and Rockcastle dams," Sparlock continued, "we would need an additional steam capacity at Burnside to firm up this hydro, and we would, as a result, be more deeply interested in the barge movement of coal to our plant. If such a service were established, both the mine operators and the barge line operators would be interested in additional business. It is not without the realm of possibility that the crusher that crushes the coal for our Burnside steam unit also could crush coal for a further barge trip down to Wolf Creek Dam."

Since Mr. Sparlock's statement, the Laurel dam is well along toward construction and a survey is being taken on the Rockcastle Dam, including core drilling at the Narrows area of the River.

Because of this increased interest in the economic development of Lake Cumberland and the areas around auxiliary dams, the barge line and transportation facilities have once again come into the lake area picture. As far as it is possible to ascertain, the discussions are not official, and any plans for barge transportation would not be decided until all the necessary surveys (industrial, economic, engineering) are completed and the dams constructed. The Corps of Engineers says the Rockcastle Dam is still five years away.

But economic planning for any area, it is pointed out, must be projected to 15 years or longer in order to accomplish a pattern of development. Persons interested, say barge traffic and its economic value is just another part of the overall Lake Cumberland plan. But 10 years from now it could be an extremely important part for Rockcastle, Laurel and Pulaski counties.

**Wool Support Pay Deadline Nearing**  
Tuesday, April 30, is the last day for filing applications for payments for the 1962 marketing year under the wool payment program. Shellie Mullins, chairman, Rockcastle Agricultural Station, and Conservation County Committee, reminded growers today.

The payments to be made this summer will cover shorn wool and unshorn lambs marketed during the 12-month period, April 1, 1962, through March 31 of this year. Later marketing will be eligible for payments for the 1963 marketing year, which began April 1, 1963.

The Chairman stressed the fact that the program payments on wool and lambs will not be made unless the grower files an application which is supported with all the necessary sales records. These sales records will be the basis for calculating the national average price received by farmers for wool during the entire 1962 marketing year, so it is to the grower's advantage to file his application early.

When the average price can be determined, the payment rates for shorn wool and unshorn lambs sold during the 1962 marketing year will be announced.

Mr. Mullins also reminded growers that the 1963 marketing year will cover a 9-month period—extending from April 1 of this year through December 31, 1963. After 1963, the marketing year will be on a 12-month calendar-year basis.

in line with recommendations by producers. Payments for 1963 and later marketing years, therefore, will be made beginning in April following the close of the "calendar" year rather than beginning in July, as for 1962 and previous years.

Because of this future changeover, Chairman Mullins said, there may be some confusion about just when applications for payment should be filed. He emphasized that applications are to be filed no later than April 30, 1963, for payments on marketings during the 1962 marketing year just ended. This includes sales made during January, February, and March, 1963.

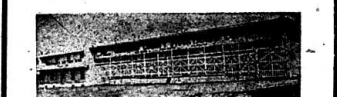
