Two Men Killed In Auto Crashes

SEVERAL HURT FROM COUNTY

Auto accidents took a heavy toll in an injury in Rockcastle County Friday and Monday.

Five accidents occurred on the two days and nights. Auto racing may have been involved in an accident Monday night that claimed the life of Charles Rainey, 19, of Clinton, Tenn.

The accident occurred on a curve at Mrs. Lou Payne's home on US 150 at Brodhead. The driver of the auto in which Rainey died, Donald D. Sherman, and two other passengers, Leonard Powell, 19, and James R. Powell, 21, all of Clinton, Tenn., were treated and released at the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital.

Police are investigating a report that auto racing may have been involved in some way with the accident. The accident occurred at the end of a mile-long straight stretch of highway that has been a favorite night-time race course for hot-rodders.

Albert L. Sallee, 49, of Lexington, was killed during Friday night's storm when his auto collided with a tractor-trailer at the bottom of Burr Hill on US 25.

State Trooper Darrell Stieglitz and Sallee, who was alone in his auto, was driving south when his car was struck in the side by a truck which had jackknifed.

The driver of the truck, Joseph Mattingly, of Anchorage, was not injured. A passenger (Continued on Back Page)

Boys and girls who wish to play on the Little League, Pony League, Pee Wee League, and girls' softball league will be placed on teams in the next two weeks.

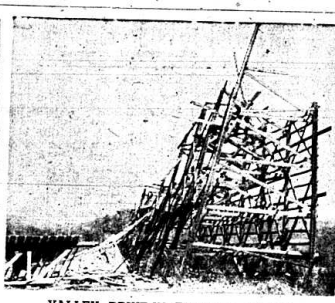
According to the directors, Brodhead and Livingston people have asked for a well-rounded program to give them all ages. "We intend to give them that type of program (Continued on Page 4)

The severe part of the storm followed a path about three mile wide across the county from southwest to northeast. Most damage occurred in the area of Blue Springs, Level Green, Mt. Vernon and Renfro Valley.

By far, barns bore the blunt end of the winds. A check with Bradley Saylor at the Farm Bureau, and Dr. John D. Henderson, of the Henderson & Cox Insurance Agency, was made in an effort to determine as closely as possible persons who lost barns in the storm. The list, which is probably incomplete, is below:

Howard Bullock, Blue Springs, barn destroyed; Earl Cromer, Blue Springs, two barns destroyed; Joe McClure, Blue Springs, one barn destroyed; Swain Bullock, Blue Springs, one barn destroyed; Bradley Saylor, Level Green, one barn destroyed, a second barn damaged.

Ed. Anderson, who lives in Pulaski County, just over the Rockcastle County line, lost a new milk truck when his barn collapsed on it in the wind.

ALL TESTIMONY TO BE WRITTEN

A suit protesting an increase in the Mt. Vernon water rate was continued by Judge R. C. Tartar in Rockcastle Circuit Court Wednesday.

Judge Tartar said proof should be submitted by the city and plaintiffs by May 4. The proof will be in the form of written depositions rather than verbal testimony.

The case was continued on a motion made by Atty. Fritz Krueger, of Somerset, attorney for the plaintiffs in the case, that he was not ready for trial.

The case was continued at the plaintiff's costs. The plaintiffs in the water rate suit are asking that the court set aside a \$1.30 water rate increase voted by the Mt. Vernon City Council that became effective in October 1962.

The plaintiffs ask that all collections made since that time be refunded and costs borne by the city.

Although at no time has Mt. Vernon's proposed sewer system come into the legal manufacturing, a roll-back of water rates probably would affect the repayment of a government loan.

The loan of \$380,000 has been approved by the Housing and Home Finance Agency and is ready for use by the city to construct the sewer system.

Attorneys for the city, Allen & Clontz, told the court Wednesday the city was ready for trial of the case and objected to the continuance by the court.

Attorney Clontz asked the court to dismiss the complaint on the grounds it failed to state a cause of action by the plaintiff.

The motion was over-ruled by Judge Tartar.

The city also filed a motion for summary judgment which will be heard April 30. Since Judge Tartar expressed a desire to have the step-stones to study, it is doubtful he will grant the summary judgement and the suit on the case.

Through the manufacturing came thick and fast in the court; the city council itself has not responded noticeably to the suit. There is an appearance it is ignoring the court proceedings. This show-up last week when the council called for bids for sewer construction to be opened May 16.

Through the sewer system could be well under way before a final decision is made, whether by the circuit court of the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

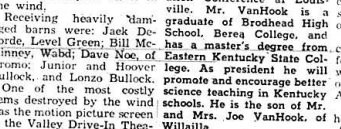

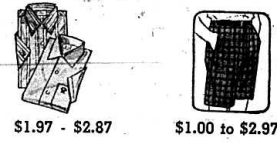
