To The State Senate

TO THE VOTERS OF ROCKCASTLE COUNTY AND THE 19th SENATORIAL DISTRICT:

During my term of Office at Frankfort, Ky., I have served as Chairman of the Committee on Education, the only Republican ever to serve as Chairman of this very important Committee under a Democratic Administration. I invited him to go. He may or may not have signed a petition of Clay County People. I got the signatures in Clay County and Mr. Luther Farmer of the Jackson County RECC, McKee, Ky., filed them along with Jackson County's petition to Colonel Carlson on that night.

My opponent who further stated in both Rockcastle County papers, last week, that he is a Citizen of Rockcastle County, yet filed his declaration papers as a citizen and voter of Manchester Precinct No. 1. I own property in Owsley County and pay taxes there but I do not claim to be a citizen of that County. It seems my opponent and I have been going to Rockcastle County to see different people and at different places and times.

There are many other things to discuss in this campaign and I may plan some speeches later if the people think I should.

My opponent does not mention the times he lost for Clerk in Clay County, the three or four times he lost for Congress, and two years ago he ran for representative in Clay and Leslie Counties and he ran the last man of 3, the winner getting more votes than both the others.

Re-lect a man that is interested in you and your needs and not only himself. I speak to you through this news media only because I have been attacked and reserve many other points for later use.

I have campaigned for my opponent in his Congressional races, taken valuable time, spent my own money, and worked counties for him. He is repaying me very dearly now and may do you likewise, if you aren't careful.

Thank you for your kindness toward me and your assurance of my re-election because you, the people, are the only ones that can assure such success. I can assure you that your talk to me makes my race far brighter at this time than it was four years ago when I was elected.



Judge Over-Rules Motion To Dismiss Water Suit

A motion for a summary judgment on a water rate suit against the City of Mt. Vernon was turned down by Circuit Judge R. C. Tartar this week.

In essence, the city asked Judge Tartar to rule that plaintiffs failed to make a case.

Over-ruling the motion came as no surprise to the city since Judge Tartar previously had indicated he wanted to study the case in detail, and through written depositions rather than oral testimony. The depositions are expected to be presented in court May 4.

The plaintiffs in the water rate suit are asking that city water rates be rolled back to the rate charged previously to October 1962. At that time the city increased the base water rate from \$2 to \$3.30.

With the increased rate the city hopes to improve the existing water system. It also plans to construct sewer system with a sewer rate based one-half the existing rate. A roll back in rates could affect the repayment of a loan from the federal government to construct the sewer system.

The council will open bids on the sewer system May 23. The bids are for general construction work. The bid opening date was changed from May 16 to May 23 at the request of the Housing and Home Finance Agency.

COURTHOUSE FUNDS IN BILL

The Senate Wednesday approved \$50 million bill for Pres. John Kennedy's stepped-up, job-creating, public works program which includes money for the Rockcastle County Courthouse as well as some 30 other Eastern Kentucky projects.

Thus the final hurdle standing in the way of a new local courthouse-jail was jumped.

The vote approving the funds came after the Senate over-ride 60 to 26 a Republican attempt to slash 200 million from the program which was called by Sen. Everett Dirksen of Illinois a "grab bag" that would snowball into more millions.

The appropriation will now go back to the House to consider the minor changes made by the Senate. The House will not vote in a body on the changes. A committee approves or disapproves any changes.

The outstanding fear of the vote was the Republican majority lost seven of its members in the shogout, while the Democrats lost only five.

The Republican deflection was by Sen. John Sherman Cooper. He carried the fight for the money on to the Senate floor in a speech.

But although he got six members of the GOP to follow him and vote for the money, he could not persuade fellow Kentuckian, Sen. Thurston Morton, Morton voted to make the 200 million dollar reduction, which Administration sources said would render the bill ineffectual.

Morton said he felt that he should stand up and be counted for fiscal integrity, especially since he believes the works program, even with the additional money, will have to turn down nine out of 10 requests from localities.

Urging members of his side of the aisle to oppose the reduction, Senator Cooper told Republicans that it was not the proper place to reconzone.

Cooper said he believed Congress could find reductions of three or four billions in total expenditures. But, he said, "I do not wish to make a reduction in the expense of the people who do not have jobs."

Congress said the country has to take action to help those who are out of work through no fault of their own, Cooper said.

"I do not see how we can fail to take note of the plight of the many people who have been out of work for so long."

An aide to Senator Cooper told the Signal by phone the Rockcastle County Courthouse project is one in which Senator Cooper is most interested, and money for construction should be one of (Continued on page 4)

The Sherman auto overturned on a curve near the home of Mrs. Lou Payne on U. S. 150 south of Brodhead. Rainey was killed and two other men were treated and released at the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital. They were James R. Powell, 21, and Leonard Powell, 19, both of Clinton.

State Police are investigating the possibility that auto racing may have been involved in the accident.

Micro-Wave Tower To Be Constructed

A micro-wave tower similar to one used by the Kentucky Telephone Company will be constructed at Mt. Vernon by Southern Bell Telephone as part of its long distance relay system across the nation.

The tower and adjacent building will cost approximately \$750,000. Construction will get underway in May.

The new tower and relay system does not affect local telephone service and communications.

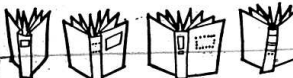
