**Low Quality Tobacco To Be Discounted**  
The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced that low quality tobacco will be sharply discounted.

Grade standards and price supports now in the process of revision will reflect quality according to present market standards and consumer preferences. Tobacco in the lower grades will be supported at a low price level.  
USDA noted it is essential that the fine quality reputation American tobacco has earned be maintained. Otherwise tobacco producers will not be able to meet competition which is increasing every year, particularly from Rhodesia and Canada.  
The Department emphasized that quality tobacco will be supported at a strong price and poor tobacco at a low price. It urged farmers to use approved varieties and follow sound cultural practices, and noted that the farmer who tries to produce a big crop and gets poor quality will find his income cut sharply next summer.

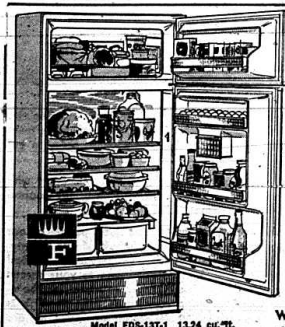

Court Delays Health Tax Until July

SET DISCUSSION AFTER BUDGET

The first request this year by the State Health Department that county health tax be voted on at the November election was scheduled to be discussed at a meeting Tuesday of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court...

Dr. M. A. Shepherd, Rockcastle County health officer, asked the Fiscal Court on behalf of the State Health Department to put the health tax on the November ballot...

Although the court discussed the tax at length, it did not vote on the request. Judge C. C. Carter told Dr. Shepherd to come back after the budget was made up in July and discuss the question again with the court...

The tax would call for an increase of one cent to 10 cents on the dollar on the \$100 property valuation, with the exact amount set yearly by the county Board of Health within the one cent to 10 cent limit...

The Health Department says the county would have a taxing district and Foundation Program similar to the program under which the state issues a health bond annually, and similar to a taxing program voted over a year ago by McCreary, Clay and Jackson counties...

For the amount raised locally, reported by the department to be \$434,244, the state would give the county \$36,257 annually. The county now gets \$16,757 annually from the state...

The department asked the court last September to put the measure on the ballot, but the court did not vote on the ballot when the motion was made in the Fiscal Court and died for lack of a quorum...

Judge Carter told Dr. Shepherd a bond issue for a new courthouse was probably being put on the November ballot, and that it was his understanding the "Poke" would vote on the tax to support its activities...

The judge noted the total tax included in the three tax issues would amount to a total of 30 cents on the \$100 property valuation. He will do not think the voters will support such an amount at one time. Three tax issues on the ballot might kill them all, Judge Carter said...

Dr. Shepherd replied it would be necessary to get out "and work" for the bond issues. He also noted he would not wish his position to withdraw the request that the tax be on the ballot...

At the meeting that the local health department would continue as it is as long as the present amount of money is raised locally. More money, however, would allow for increased services, such as additional nurses, equipment, and other personnel. 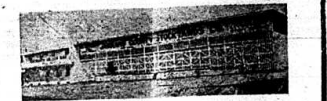

The 13th Judicial District, composed of Lincoln, Boyle, Garrard and Mercer Counties, has two candidates for Circuit Judge; Hon. P. J. "Joe" Clark, Danville, Kentucky, and Hon. Gilbert M. Wilson, Lancaster, Kentucky. Both gentlemen are registered Democrats and both have filed for the Republican and Democratic nominations.

## Chandler resigned his commission and served himself



On November 7, 1941, the United States Senate voted to arm U. S. ships going into war zones. On the same day, Senator A. B. Chandler, a reserve captain, issued this statement: "I AM A CAPTAIN NOW AND WHEN I VOTE TO SEND ANY BOY IN THIS COUNTRY TO WAR, I AM GOING TO ASK FOR LEAVE AND MARCH WITH MY REGIMENT. I WANT THEM TO

KNOW OLD HAPPY DID NOT TURN HIS BACK ON THEM." THIRTY DAYS LATER THE JAPANESE BOMBED PEARL HARBOR AND WAR WAS DECLARED. THREE DAYS LATER CHANDLER RESIGNED HIS COMMISSION, STATING THAT THE WAR DEPARTMENT SAID HE COULD SERVE HIS COUNTRY BETTER IN THE SENATE.

## How did Chandler serve his country?

On April 8, 1943, the Truman Committee, in a report, questioned the value of the junkets that Chandler was making to behind-the-lines areas overseas.

In February 1943, in a talk over Cincinnati radio station, Chandler denied rumors that he was about to accept the job of Baseball Commissioner. To do so while the war was on, he said, would be to think his duty to his country.

LESS THAN 2 MONTHS LATER, APRIL 9, WHEN FIGHTING ON OKINAWA WAS AT ITS FURTEST, CHANDLER ANNOUNCED HE WAS RESIGNING HIS SENATE SEAT TO ACCEPT THE BASEBALL JOB AT A SALARY OF \$50,000 PER YEAR.

As he remarked later, a man has to look out for himself. Veterans know how well he did this when he was supposed to be looking out for his Country instead.

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**Corn Planting Time Close For Farmers**

Corn-planting time for Kentucky farmers is almost here, says S. H. Phillips, University of Kentucky Agriculture Extension Service crops specialist.

Here are some pointers:

(1) There was a record yield in Kentucky in 1962—588 bushels an acre. High yields should be sought, he notes—despite surpluses—because most Kentucky corn is fed to livestock and lower unit costs prevail where cropping efficiency (higher yields) is practiced. Most farmers are shooting for 100 to 150 bushels an acre yields, Phillips says, and such yields are not at all uncommon here.

(2) How can high yields be obtained? One way is to use a good recommended hybrid. Progress Report No. 123 of the U. K. Ag Experiment Station lists the 1962 performance of major hybrids.

Plant early, Phillips advises, from April 20 to May 10. After the middle of May, corn crop yields are down from a half to three quarters of a bushel an acre for each day planting is delayed past May 10. June plantings' eventual yields can be from a bushel to a bushel and a half lower. Planting dates, of course, depend on weather and soil conditions.

(3) Plant population should be from 12,000 to 16,000 plants an acre. In

more fertile soil, this population can be upped. Plant the 12,000 population rate every 12 inches in rows 40 inches apart; for the 16,000 rate, kernels eight inches apart in 40-inch rows.

(4) Soil tests are needed to determine fertilizer needs. In fertilizing, nitrogen is the big limiting factor, Phillips notes. As a very general rule, Kentucky corn fields will profitably use 1,000 pounds of 10-10-10.

(5) Weed control can be by cultivation, or use of such chemicals (pre-emergence) with Atrazine, Lorox, Randox-T and 2, 4-D. However, 2, 4-D should not be applied until 3 to 4 days after planting.

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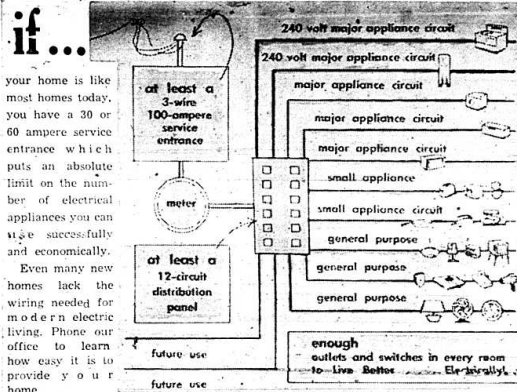
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
