employment pay for teachers. He voted to give townships more authority to manage their own affairs. He was one of the earliest advocates of water conservation, stronger curbs on gambling and a merit system for state employees. ## State Plans Rest Centers

Details of a program to develop combination information centers and rest areas on the Interstate Highway System was announced today by Commissioner of Highways Henry Ward. One such center probably

will be located at an undetermined point on Interstate 75 in Stockcastle.

This program calls for emphasis upon building of centers that will attract the tourists on the Interstate System and provide them with information regarding the tourist attractions within the state and private facilities available near the Interstate System, such as hotels, restaurants and filling stations, Ward added.

Under this plan, major information center will be developed at rest areas on the Interstate near the entrances to Kentucky and other strategic points along this major highway system, he said. Contracts have already been awarded for the building of the first of these combination information centers, and rest areas on Interstate 64 between Louisville and Frankfort and between Winchester and Mt. Sterling.

"The Department has designed a modern building to serve not only the need for public rest rooms, but also to provide information facilities, with a purpose of having a facility to match the modernistic design of construction of the Interstate System," Ward said. "This superhighway system is designed to meet the modern needs of today, rather than the horse and buggy days of the past. Therefore, it would be wholly inconsistent to provide an old fashioned privy, which might have been all right for the horse and buggy days but certainly would not contribute to Kentucky's efforts to move forward today."

"Because the Interstate System is being built on new locations with limited access, it is imperative that Kentucky provide information services which will give tourists the facts they need to locate commercial facilities near interchanges or other attractions in nearby communities or at more important points in the state," the Commissioner continued.

"Under the arrangement we have perfected, there will be maps and literature at all of these information centers, not only that advertises state

attractions, but private enterprises will also be invited to place their literature in racks at these centers. "The policy of building rest areas on the Interstate System was inaugurated under the past administration. The records in the Department of Highways show

that the Department of Highways, during the past administration, asked the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads to approve the location of 46 sites for rest areas. Many sites were selected and designed and in February of 1959, a contract was awarded for the building of rest area facilities on Interstate 65 in Hardin County, at a cost of approximately \$181,000.
