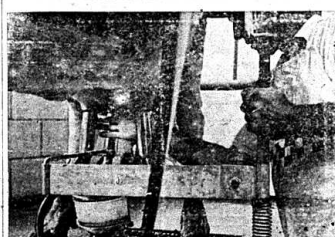

Livingston School News

Physical Fitness

A physical fitness program, involving grades 1 through 9, has been in progress for the past two years as a part of the physical education program at Livingston School. The physical fitness program was organized around the recommendations by the President's Council on Youth Fitness. In addition to physical education activities, consisting of games and sports, students are exposed to organized calisthenics daily. A physical fitness test was administered recently to determine how much progress has been made. Some results of the test are: 91.9 percent of the girls passed the test, 93.2 percent of the boys passed. In comparing our percentile score with the national average, we find our students rank considerably above the national average. This test also pointed out our weaknesses in the following areas: Arm and shoulder strength and leg strength. Activities are now being considered which will strengthen these areas. This physical fitness program replaces the Reflex period and is directed by Coach Preston Parrett.

Aptitude Test

An Air Force Aptitude Test was administered to members of the Senior Class on May 13. The test results are sometimes used in industries. It is also a help to apply when considering job opportunities in determining which occupation would be most suitable for the individual. Armed Services in the near future shall not be required to take this examination at the time of enlistment.

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COMPLAINT ASKS REPRESENTATION

A complaint against the Rockcastle County Board of Election Commissioners was filed in Rockcastle Circuit Court Wednesday by a candidate in a statewide race.

The complaint asks the court to allow at least one person per precinct be appointed from a list furnished by the plaintiff, R. K. Kenny Grant, Democratic candidate for attorney general.

The complaint was filed against three commissioners: Sheriff Lovell, Charles B. R. Wolfe and Opp Bussell Jr.

A hearing on the complaint is scheduled for 10 a.m. Saturday in the chambers of Circuit Judge R. C. Tartar at Somerset. A ruling on the complaint would have to be made prior to the election.

The complaint says under Kentucky Statutes, 25 percent of the bona fide candidates in an election can petition the court to allow one person of their choice from each precinct be included as an election officer in that precinct.

The plaintiff accused the Board of Commissioners of refusal to appoint election officers from that list, and his designated list.

The plaintiff said he and the other candidates who petitioned will suffer immediate and irreparable injury, loss or damage, if the present list of officers are allowed.

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No Sewer Bond Sale Possible

SETTLE SUIT, ATTORNEY SAYS

As long as a lawsuit questions the validity of Mt. Vernon's water rate there can be no sale of \$380,000 worth of bonds to construct a sewer system.

Such was the City of Mt. Vernon informed this week by Joseph R. Rubin, of Louisville, bond attorney for the city.

In his report to the city, Attorney Rubin stated: "It is essential to the authorization, sale and delivery of any bonds that there be no litigation pending challenging either the effectiveness of any necessary rates or the validity of the bonds themselves."

"Accordingly, I must advise you that until this litigation is cleared up, the city will be unable to proceed with the authorization, advertising, sale and delivery of any such bonds," Mr. Rubin said.

He pointed out that "one of the essential closing papers at the time of such delivery consists of a certification by the city officials to the effect that no litigation pending, or to their knowledge, threatened, affecting the validity of the bonds in any way. Of course, no such litigation certificate could be signed so long as such a lawsuit has not been resolved, and, of course, no bonds could be sold and delivered. The rule applies regardless of whether the federal government purchases the bonds," he declared.

In October, 1962, the city voted the base water rate from \$2 to \$3.30 for 2,000 gallons. With the additional revenue the city plans to finance a new half-million dollar sewer system for the city.

The revenue bonds were to be sold on the open market, with the expectation the federal government would buy the bonds at a low three and three-eighths percent interest rate.

Although Attorney Rubin's advice stops the sale of the bonds, actually their sale would be at least two months away, and after final plans, contracts and other necessary construction steps have been taken.

Planning on the sewer system will go on. The opening of bids has been scheduled for May 29. The delay of a week was granted by the city when contractors advised the city they needed more time in which to figure their bids.

The question to which Attorney Rubin refers is a suit in Rockcastle Circuit Court asking that rates be rolled back to the pre-October 1962 rate of \$2. The complaint calls the \$3.30 increase exorbitant.

Final written testimony (depositions) have been rolled to Circuit Judge R. C. Tartar for study. Judge Tartar has set the date for the suit to be held on May 29. He will make a ruling on the suit.

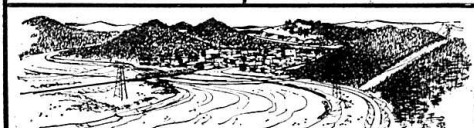
