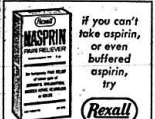

Tartar, Cummins Elected

It's all finally over, and a weary group of Kentucky voters are now prepared to go back to uninterrupted television programs, and the election winners to get on with the plans for the November campaign.

There were few out-right upsets in the primary election. Generally, Rockcastle voters did exactly as they were expected to do, with the exception that in some cases on a larger or smaller scale.

Edward T. "Ned" Breathitt, Hopkinsville attorney, scored a smashing 62,000 majority victory in his first try for a major public office. At the latest count in the Democratic gubernatorial primary Breathitt had 308,377 votes, former Gov. A. B. Chandler had 247,661 votes and Mary Louise Foust had 13,288 votes.

The victory by Breathitt was marked because of his tremendous majority he was piling up over Chandler, who had never lost a campaign except to the late Alben Barkley.

At the same time Chandler was losing his running mate, Harry Lee Waterfield, Lexington businessman, was won on his way to a victory in the lieutenant governor's race. Waterfield had 233,756 votes, and John Breckinridge had 185,026 votes.

The great majority Breathitt was piling up, served notice to Republican Louis Nunn, of Glasgow, that Nunn will have his hands full in November. The presence of Waterfield on the ticket only lent support to the theory that the Democrats would close ranks for future elections in Kentucky. As expected, Nunn had only token opposition.

As most believed, Chandler carried Rockcastle County. Chandler received 713 votes. Breathitt got 623. Mary Louise Foust got 5 and Wilton Bengue Cupp, 7.

Also as expected, Louis B. Nunn, Republican, won the nod in Rockcastle in an easy victory as he did in the state. Nunn had 298 votes, Jessie N. B. Cecil got 178.

In one other statewide race of more importance, Rockcastle Countians than usual, Harry Sparks won handily in his bid for Superintendent of Public Instruction. Mr. Sparks, a native of Mt. Vernon, had backing both from Breathitt and Chandler in his bid for the Democratic ticket.

State Trooper Shot To Death

A state trooper and an ex-convict were killed early Sunday near Pittsburgh during a gun battle in a police cruiser.

The dead trooper is William E. Tevis, 28, Columbia, and formerly of Fayette County and Richmond, who was shot in the neck and left shoulder.

Tevis is the first state trooper ever killed during a gun battle.

The other victim was Arnold Roark, 35, Manchester, who had just been arrested on a charge of drunk driving.

State Police Lt. James Mays said Roark was shot five times. He said Roark pulled a gun and shot Tevis while another trooper, Sgt. Leroy Faulconer, was driving Roark, his wife, Nettie, and brother, James, 33, to jail.

Faulconer pulled the cruiser to the roadside and shot back at Roark, who returned the fire from the back seat. The two other prisoners escaped, but were arrested later.

Faulconer, unhurt, said, "I regret to have to take anyone's life. But if I hadn't I surely would have been killed."

Mays said Mrs. Roark was picked up in a cab between London and Manchester about 30 minutes after the 2:40 a. m. shooting. He said James was arrested two hours later in a wooded area about one mile from the scene in trapshooting.

Sewer Bids Go To 2 Firms



Two firms were awarded tentative bids on Mt. Vernon's proposed sewer system when the city council opened bids Wednesday afternoon.

The two bids totaled \$373,050 and were for all phases of construction on the sewer system.

Freston Carroll Construction Co., of Clifton, Tenn., was the low bidder on sewer lines. Their bid was \$273,250.

Frue Engineering Co., of Winchester, was low bidder on the sewer treatment plant at \$99,800.

The bids were awarded tentatively since official awarding can not come until a water rate increase against the City of Mt. Vernon has been settled.

The construction companies, however, can go ahead with scheduling work and preparing plans for the system.

A ruling on the water rate case could come at anytime. The case, asking that the base water rate be rolled back to a pre-October 1962 rate, is now before Circuit Judge R. C. Tartar.

Failure to get the city water rate increase could mean no sewer system for the city.

Courthouse Sure-- Cooper

Rockcastle County can be a reasonably sure of a loan survey for a new courthouse and jail.

This was reported Monday by Sen. Robert Sherman, who Cooper when he visited at Mt. Vernon.

Senator Cooper said funds will be available shortly under a new allocation appropriated by Congress under the Public Works Acceleration Act, and the Rockcastle County Courthouse will be one of the first projects to be processed.

Rockcastle County has applied for a loan to construct a \$400,000 courthouse-jail at Mt. Vernon. The plans and loan have been approved by the field office of the Community Facilities Administration at Atlanta, Ga., and have been forwarded to Washington for approval. The next step would be the allocation of funds.

A dam on the Rockcastle River will not be as easy to construct as a courthouse, Senator Cooper indicated.

For those who participate, trap and skeet shooting can be as much fun as plain old bird hunting.

So it is with Willie Kidwell, of Brodhead, who has won several trophies and prizes since he took up trapshooting in 1954.

Mr. Kidwell is an ardent supporter of skeet and trapshooting and has his own trapshoot located on the farm of Colson Stephens, on Negro Creek.

He began his trapshooting career in 1954 just for fun, but as he explains, he got the bug, and since 1959 he has received four trophies as well as other prizes, such as turkeys, at trapshoot meetings.

The last trophy he received was recently at the Pulaski Outdoorsmen Trapshooters at Somerset, a division of the Amateur Trapshooters Association. He scored an association score of 87 for the runner-up spot.

In 1959, Mr. Kidwell won first place in an overall shoot. In 1961, he won another trophy in a division of the Amateur Trapshooters Association. His son, Larry, also won a trophy at the same time.

For those who don't know, the necessary equipment for trapshooting is a gun (see picture) and a machine that throws small discs, into the air. The object is to break the discs. The shooter never

knows which direction the disc will fly, similar to ordinary bird hunting in which the bird may fly in any direction. In the case of skeet shooting, the disc always comes from the same spot and flies in the same general direction, making it somewhat easier to hit.

Mr. Kidwell says he enjoys trapshooting as well or better, than bird hunting. When he began trapshooting he

didn't care greatly for the sport, but says "after a few times, I got the bug."

He and his son, Larry, joined with Joe Noe and Robert Reedy, of Mt. Vernon in a trapshoot which they conducted near Horseshoe Bend, but the group was unable to "make a go" of the shoot, he said.

It is reported trapshooting is very popular in surrounding counties, but has never

"caught on" in Rockcastle. He said he would like to see the Rockcastle Fish and Game Club try to interest the area in trapshooting.

Mr. Kidwell is shining his gun and preparing to enter the district trapshoot at Lexington on June 9. He won't venture a guess on the outcome, but he's hoping to make a good showing.

Judging from the trophies, he probably will do all right.

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State Program

Rockcastle County's share in new and expanded state government programs since 1960 has given this area a boost in such fields as education, roads, health, welfare, and library services, according to the state's annual report.

Since 1960 local public schools have received more state money than ever before in the history of our schools. For the current school year, Minimum Foundation education funds for the Rockcastle County School District are \$731,367, a big increase over the \$472,994

provided during the 1959-60 school year. The current year's Minimum Foundation funds include \$438,188 for teachers' salaries, \$112,898 for other expenses, \$75,265 for capital outlay (buildings and equipment), and \$60,015 for pupil transportation.

For public library services, Rockcastle County received \$2,698 in State aid during the 1959-60 fiscal year. During fiscal year 1961-62, this had been increased to \$3,911.

Rockcastle County is part of the Valley of Parks Library Region which receives financial aid from the state. Other counties in the region are Bell, Laurel, Pulaski, Whitley, and Clay.

During the years 1960-62, a total of 1,897 books were distributed by the state to the Valley of Parks Library Region as well as 2,540 long-playing records. Some 3,733 bookmobile books were furnished by the state to this region during 1960-62.

The state provides financial aid to county health departments by a formula based on such factors as local needs, amount of funds provided locally and amount of State funds available.

During the current fiscal year, the state's share of the Minimum Foundation Health Program in Rockcastle County totals \$13,482, an increase of 7.1 per cent over 1959-60. Health money is sent to the counties to pay for the services of county health officers, nurses, sanitarians and others. It also pays for vaccines, serums, and other aid to public health.

Another State-sponsored health agency which benefits Rockcastle County is the Kentucky Commission for Handicapped Children. During the 1960-62 period, a total of 51 local youngsters were among those receiving treatment for such disabilities as twisted backs, cleft palates, and paralyzed muscles.

Through its program of public assistance for needy Kentuckians, the state will have made \$2,080,121 available during the years 1960-64 to the needy blind, the totally or permanently disabled, the needy elderly and the dependent children of Rockcastle County. This program brought 30.5 per cent more money into Rockcastle County than during the preceding four years.

During 1962, welfare payments in Rockcastle County totaled \$489,082. Broken down into categories, the payments were made as follows: old age assistance, \$239,465; aid to needy blind, \$7,953; aid to disabled, \$60,518; aid to dependent children, \$171,438; and medical care, \$5,708.

Unemployment compensation checks are larger now than in 1959 when maximum payments were \$34. The General Assembly in 1960 and 1962 approved Administration-backed measures to increase these payments which today are \$40 weekly.

As a result, unemployed workers in Rockcastle County received \$157,291 in compensation payments from 1960-62.

As part of its over-all industrial development program designed to bring new industries to the state, the Kentucky Department of Commerce published brochures to inform prospects about agricultural business potential in Rockcastle County.

and industrial resources in Livingston and Mt. Vernon.

Farm ponds in this county were among 2,500 ponds stocked last year with fish, by the State Division of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

In the three calendar years through December 31, 1962, this Administration spent a total of \$972,792 in Rockcastle County to build and maintain roads.

Benefits to be derived by Rockcastle County from the completion of Interstate 75 through this county will be substantial. The recent approval for Interstate 75 from Richmond south to the Tennessee line emphasizes the fact that the Kentucky Highway Department is rapidly moving to begin construction on this important segment of I-75.

The raising of the gross load-limit for U. S. 25 and U. S. 150 to Class "AAA" classification of 73,280 pounds will be an industry attraction which will result in benefits to the entire area.

Of the seven major improvements made in Rockcastle County by this Administration, work on the Mt. Vernon-Stanford Road at a cost of \$51,000 and the Brush Creek Road at a cost of over \$37,000 stands as the most

significant in terms of dollars spent.

An impartial formula adopted in 1961 guarantees every county a fair share of rural secondary road funds. Rockcastle County's allocation for rural secondary roads and rural highways for the 1962-63 fiscal year is \$190,502.

Under the previous administration, only \$94,586 was spent in Rockcastle County for rural secondary roads and rural highways in fiscal year 1957-58.

The 3 per cent sales tax, principal basis of the state's revenue program, provides the financial backbone for the broad advances being made and has even permitted an average 28 per cent reduction of the State income tax.

In addition to direct local expenditures, Rockcastle County benefits from all the other services of state government, such as state parks, colleges and universities, agricultural research, tourist promotion, and the many other activities designed to benefit all Kentuckians.

Gov. Bert Combs pointed out He also cited the state's six tuberculosis hospitals, the four mental hospitals, the two training homes for the mentally retarded, the schools

for the blind and deaf, the growing network of vocational schools, and the recently launched program of community colleges.

"The list is extensive," the Governor continued. "All Kentuckians benefit from the funds which operate the courts, the Legislature, the State Police, the Child Welfare Department, the Department of Mines and Minerals, and the prisons, to name but a few."

These services combined are State Government in action, Combs emphasized. "This," he said "is the reason the people have established state government-to

do the things that individual citizens acting alone could not accomplish."

Tobacco Cultivation Discussed By Official

Cultivation of tobacco fields after setting-out (transplanting) is completed in an important crop job, says Ira Massie, University of Kentucky Extension Service specialist.
Here are some tips on this job:

1. After transplanting, cultivate the crop deeply enough to break up wheel (equipment) tracks that are compacted. This will help the ground's absorption quality and aid in weed control.
2. After the first cultivation, re-cultivate only for weed control and to break the ground's crust. Use cultivation equipment that go no deeper than the top two inches of the soil.

If use of herbicides is planned to control weeds, the Extension Service recommends they be used only for trial purposes. Use either Eptam or Diphenamid on very small areas in the tobacco patch. Massie recommends that a strip four rows wide across the middle of the patch be used. Make observations on the interior two rows; in a four-row strip the outside of the outer rows will probably have been cultivated.

Diphenamid will probably reduce the growth of a cover crop planted after the tobacco crop is harvested, Massie warns.
He recommends that producers who use the same tobacco field each season definitely not use Eptam or Diphenamid.

Setting-Out Time Here For Tobacco

Two bacterial diseases, wildfire and angular leaf spot, may be found in burley plant beds soon.
Both diseases will appear in plant beds on tender, rapidly growing plants if cool rainy weather occurs. Wildfire shows up as circular dead areas of various sizes marked by broad bands of lemon-yellow tissue. Angular leaf spot (sometimes called rust) shows up as smaller spots than wildfire, that are irregular in outline and usually are brown.

Both diseases are capable of causing damage in plant beds and in the field. Both have been known to destroy entire fields of dark tobacco after topping and suckering. Control measures, according to M. Johnson, U. S. K. Ag Experiment Station plant pathologist:
Apply a mixture of bluestone lime when plants are producing the first leaves and again when plants are the size of a dinner plate for mixing bluestone-lime can be obtained at county agents' offices.

Johnson emphasizes that after the diseases develop in plant beds, bluestone lime is not effective. He also emphasizes the mixture should be applied through bed canvases. Streptomycin should be used to control the diseases after they develop.
Burley 21 and KY 12 are highly resistant to wildfire.
