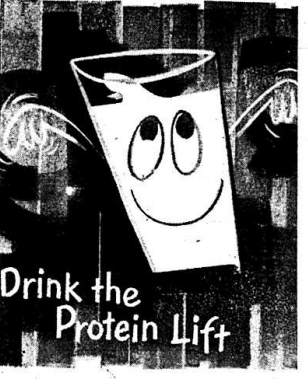

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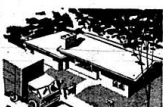

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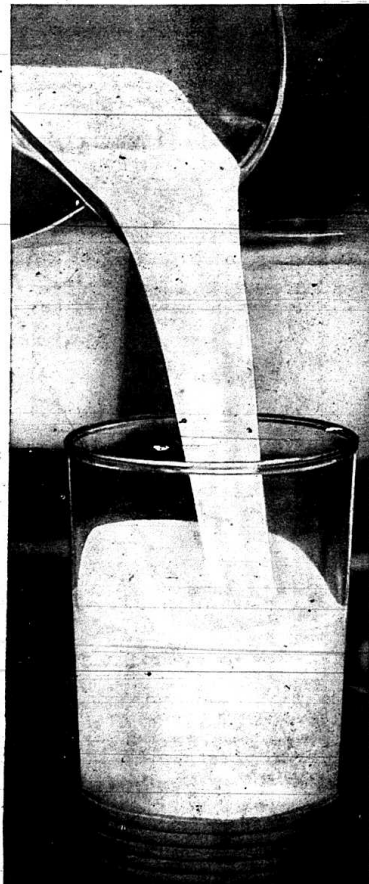

KU Plans Rate Reduction

Kentucky Utilities Company will reduce its electric rates to residential customers by about a million dollars a year beginning July 1, under a rate schedule set this week for the approval of the Kentucky Public Service Commission.

The reduction amounts to about 5 1/2 percent of the company's total residential revenue. The new rates will result in a saving on all bills for residential service using more than 100 kilowatt hours a month.

More than 139,000 of K. U.'s 186,000 residential customers will save under the new rate schedule the first year it is in effect.

The reduction of the company's income taxes resulting from the recently enacted federal and state regulations for more liberalized depreciation allowances under the new "guidelines" is one of the factors enabling the company to propose the rate cut, according to W. H. Skinner, K. U. vice president. He said other factors making the reduction possible included the growing acceptance by its customers of electric living with their addition of appliances and electric heating.

"This increased use enables us to effect operating economies and pass the benefits to our customers," he said.

The new rate schedule is "promotional" in nature in that it is designed to encourage greater use by more customers by making it more economical for them to add new appliances and services, particularly electric heating and air conditioning.

Mr. Skinner pointed out that the proposed reduction is the second within the last year and a half. A reduction for large use residential customers saving them more than \$350,000 a year was put into effect in February, 1962.

"The new reduction brings the cost of residential electric service below what it cost in 1940, even though almost all other household costs have doubled or tripled," Mr. Skinner said.

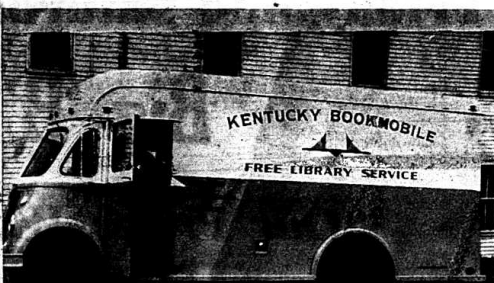

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AGREEMENT SEEMS REACHED

All indications point toward two local tax measures on the November ballot instead of three as expected.

As things stand, it appears officials of the Bookmobile Library will not make an effort to have a tax increase measure on the ballot at the general election.

Bookmobile officials and the Fiscal Court met Monday and reportedly reached an agreement that the county will make every effort in the future to keep the Bookmobile operating. For this agreement, the Bookmobile officials will not insist that a five cents on the \$100 property assessment go on the ballot this November.

Reason for the agreement stems from the belief by officials on both sides that if voters are faced with a courthouse bond issue, a half-cent department tax and a Bookmobile tax, then the chances are likely all three will be defeated by the voters.

Probably on the November ballot will be the proposed courthouse-jail project which needs five cents on the \$100 property assessment, and the Health Department tax which calls for a maximum of 10 cents on the \$100 property assessment.

Whether the "gentleman's agreement" between the Bookmobile will stand until November remains to be seen, but no effort was made to bring it before the Fiscal Court at its Tuesday meeting.

The most discussion at the Fiscal Court meeting revolved around the Health Department tax. Dr. John D. Henderson Sr. appealed one again to the court to allow the tax on the November ballot.

Generally, the court agreed that enough time remains for a decision and a vote on the matter before the deadline, and that the final decision should wait until after the county budget is approved in July.

The deadline for a tax measure to go on the ballot is 45 days prior to the election.

Magistrate G. H. Griffin told the Signal after the meeting he made a motion to include all three measures on the ballot, but there was no second to his motion.

No account to his motion, apparently did not understand Mr. Griffin was making an official motion since no usual procedures were followed by the court. The court did not ask for a motion as it did last year.

A check of the proposed Rockcastle's County Budget, which is still to be approved, shows the county again appropriated \$750 for the Bookmobile and \$100 for the

active forestry program in our economic and conservation outlook. The contest closes August 15, 1963.

The contestant may have accomplished his forestry program in several years or in a single year to be eligible for the Grand Prize or the Second Prize. Only the Improvement Awards are based on the current year's progress. Applications may be obtained at the Kentucky Division of Forestry Office, Marcum Building, McKee, Kentucky, or by writing the Kentucky Division of Forestry, Box 76, McKee.

Health Department. With other available money, it is not likely that either will have to close or curb services. But both the Bookmobile and the Health Department say they need considerably more money to operate and expand services. Currently, the Health Department receives about \$2,000 from various local income sources and \$16,737 from the state to operate the department. Under the new tax measure the department

would receive about \$4,364 from local sources and would receive \$36,257 from the state. This would allow the department to be under a state program similar to the school's Minimum Foundation Program. In the case of the Bookmobile, until last year the Bookmobile was able to use state funds to pay the Bookmobile driver's salary. This expense must now be borne through local support. The money received from the state must be used to improve the library's services available, such as purchasing new books.

To keep the library open officials say, they are having to use their reserve fund which has been held to be used in the event of a major breakdown of the Bookmobile. The bulk of the fund will be exhausted this year. With the special five cent tax, the state support of the Bookmobile will automatically increase \$1,700. The court was also handed another tax problem at its meeting. C. G. Stewart, forester for Rockcastle County, asked the court to consider an increase of the county forest tax rate one cent per acre in order for the forestry service to continue to provide adequate forest fire

protection to privately owned forests. Only property owners with forest acres pay the tax. Currently, it is two cents per acre, and provides about \$1,200 a year. An added cent would up the \$1,200 to about \$2,100. A three cent maximum for forestry service is set by state law. Only approval by the Fiscal Court is necessary for a new motor grader for use on county roads. The court reported the present grader is worn out.
