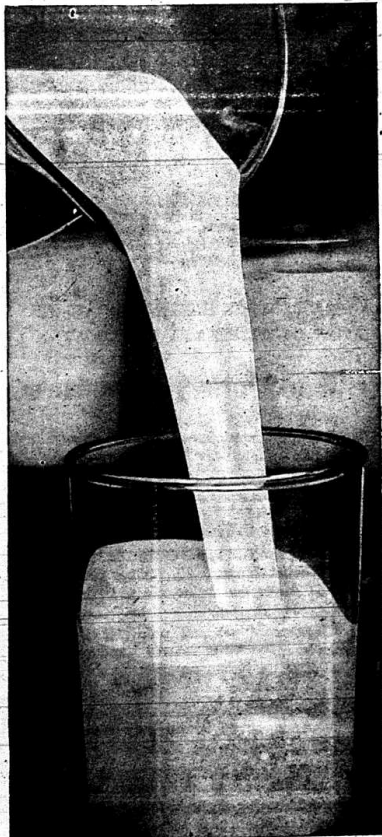

The Rockcastle County Bookmobile must have funds with which to operate and the current tax measure can only be delayed if the Fiscal Court allows sufficient funds to operate the unit for the year, according to an announcement from a County Bookmobile Board Member, who said that it does believe the tax to be necessary.

"There was an indication by some members of the Fiscal Court that the voted tax would not be needed. Because of this suggestion the Board has not yet asked for a voted tax so that the Fiscal Court will have further time to determine whether the library can be adequately supported out of normal income of the county."
