## No Decision On Tax Bills

Further steps to be taken to get two tax measures on the November ballot apparently remain undetermined this week.

**Destroy Blue Mold By Disking Tobacco**

Blue mold, a fungus disease of tobacco plant beds, was reported in a number of Kentucky locations this year. Because blue mold overwinters in plant bed sites, such plant beds should be destroyed by disking or plowing now.

That's the advice of Drs. E. M. Johnson and W. D. Vauz, University of Kentucky Agriculture Experiment Station plant pathologists.

The researchers pointed out that blue mold appears

ed this year during or following setting-out. "It was in so mild a form that little damage occurred. Most growers noticed diseased plants" but few recognized the symptoms were not typical. Only rarely was mold visible on the undersides of leaves of diseased plants. Some growers thought the disease was a few regular leaf spot or wiltlike."

Both men say that using a new bed site for the 1964 crop—whether blue mold was known to be in the 1963 site or not—will entirely prevent carry-over of blue mold. If a new site is not used, then the 1963 bed site should be disked and sown in soybeans or cowpeas after setting-out is completed this year. Plow the soybeans or cowpeas under his fall and prepare and sterilize the bed site by any one of the approved methods (steaming, burning or chemicide). Such safety precautions will help greatly in preventing blue mold in 1964.

**Our Worst Season For Forest Fires**

Kentucky experienced its severest spring forest fire season on record this year, State Conservation Commissioner J. O. Matlock has reported.

A total of 3,351 reported fires damaged 23,350 acres of timber land during the period from March 1 to May 15, he said, topping the worst previous record set in the spring of 1959, when there were 2,675 fires and 99,629 acres were damaged.

The increased number this year was attributed primarily to high winds and below-average rainfall by Gene L. Butcher, director of the department's Forestry Division.

Butcher pointed out, however, that while the Conservation Department has no control over weather conditions that spread and nurture the fires it can and will put more emphasis on enforcing the fire control laws.

"All of these fires were man-caused," Butcher said. "Some were set on purpose and some were accidentally started, but every one of them was caused by a person."

It is our intention to step up the law-enforcement activities of the Forestry Division to cut down on the man-caused fires before the fall forest fire season begins," he said.

**Cattle Disease Becomes Problem**

Lepptopirosis, a disease in cattle, is gradually becoming more widespread in Kentucky dairy herds, says E. C. Scheidenhelm, University of Kentucky Agriculture Extension Service dairyman.

A recent report by state veterinary officials showed that 40 per cent of dairy herds tested in a given period had animals which had the disease. Number of

cattle in these herds having the disease was not high, Scheidenhelm pointed out, but even one infected animal in a herd is a source of further infection.

Dairyman can avoid leptopirosis in their herds by vaccinating against the disease, Scheidenhelm points out.

Lepptopirosis is very easily transmitted from animal to animal, he pointed out—even being carried in vapors arising from excretions.

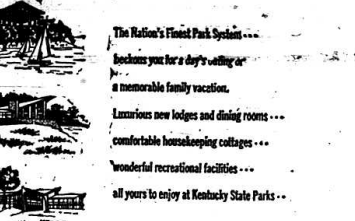

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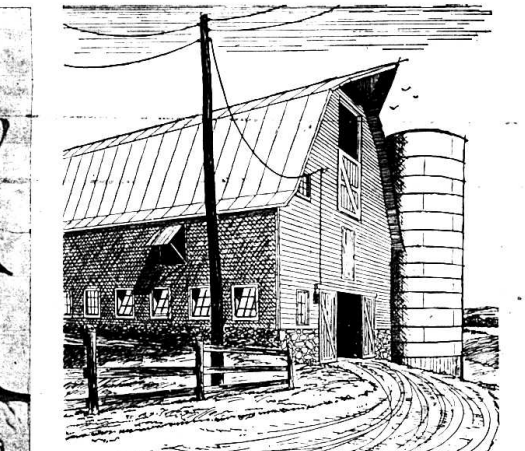
