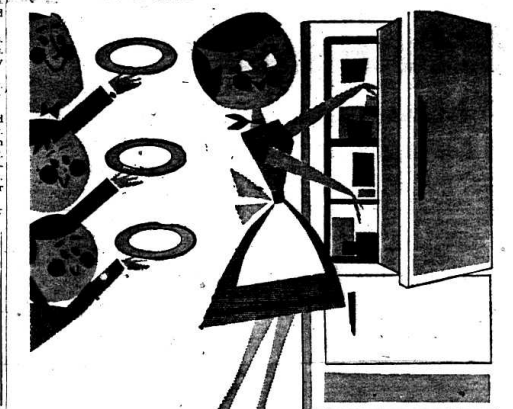

ACP Helps In Conservation Work

Conservation work costs money. That's why we have an ACP. Mr. Shellie Mullins, Chairman of the Rockcastle County Agricultural Station and Conservation Committee, said today:

He pointed out that being convinced about the benefits of conservation is not enough and expresses the belief that some farmers still may not understand that they can obtain program help in getting the needed conservation job done on their farms.

"Just drive around the county," the Chairman declared, "and you can easily spot the farms where conservation farming is being practiced. In many cases, the farmer would also find that the Agricultural Conservation Program is cooperating with the farmer in carrying out the conservation practice on the land."

For farmers who may not fully understand how ACP works, Mr. Mullins explained that the program's purpose is to encourage the establishment of soil, water, woodland, and wildlife conservation practices needed in the public interest. The program, therefore, has an incentive type of approach to the problem—share the cost of sound conservation measures which the farmer would not carry out without such assistance.

Funds for this purpose are authorized by Congress in recognition of the fact that the Nation's natural resources are vital not only to the farmers and ranchers who operate the land but also to the health and well-being of each citizen, both now and in the future.

ACP practices to promote conservation measures are selected to meet local as well as national conditions. Each county has a list of the practices, specifications, and cost-share rates approved for local farmers participating in the program.

In brief, the farmer obtains ACP cooperation by filing a request with the ACP county committee for ACP cost-sharing before carrying out the practice. He receives a definite notice from the committee of the extent to which his request has been approved. After completion of the practice, the farmer certifies this by filing the necessary report form with the county office. His cost-sharing assistance, in the form of either cash or a purchase order for a conservation service or material, usually covers about half the cost of the approved practice.

Under the cash plan, the farmer pays the total cost of establishing the approved practice, and he later reimbursed for the Government's share of the cost. Under the purchase order plan, the Government's cost-share is advanced to the vendor who supplies the farmer (1) a conservation material—such as seed, trees, fertilizer, lime, or tile; or (2) a service

material or service used. ACP also helps pay for technical service where required to determine need and practicability or to plan and lay out the practice. This is accomplished through special arrangements with the Soil Conservation Service, the State Forester and others. Farmers who wish further details about ACP are urged to call at the ASCS county office.

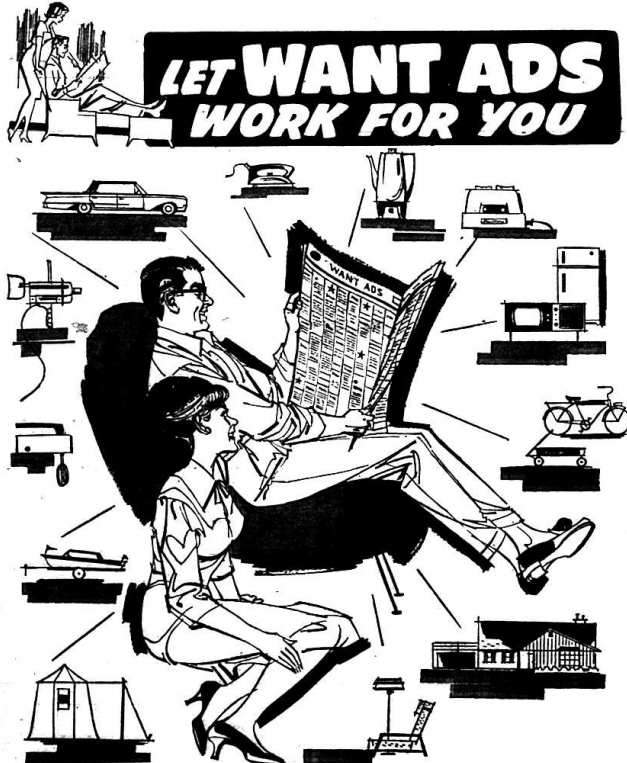

Tobacco Treatment Can Save Trouble
 Based on conditions July 1 Kentucky's 1963 Burley tobacco crop is forecast at 448,000,000 pounds, according to the Kentucky Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

This is one percent below last year's record production of 454,720,000 pounds and the third largest crop of record. For the Burley belt (Kentucky and seven nearby states) production is expected to total 674 million pounds—down one percent from 1962. An average yield of 1879 pounds per acre is forecast for the Belt.
 Kentucky's burley acreage is estimated at 2940 acres—the same as harvested in 1962. Acreage allotments are unchanged from 1962. Generally an adequate supply of plants was available to set alloted acreages. Some surplus plants from the burley grass counties moved into areas where plant beds were dry or failed due to dry weather.

The preliminary yield forecast is for 2,000 pounds per acre—slightly below the record 1962 yield of 2,030 pounds. Conditions during the remainder of the season will determine the final yield.
 Progress of the 1963 burley crop has been about the same as in 1962. Except for a few mountain counties, practically all of the crop has been set by June 24. In July 1, seven percent of the crop was over 20 inches high.

SELECT TOBACCO BEDS FOR NEXT SPRING
 Application now of a soil insecticide to tobacco plant bed sites can save farmers much trouble next spring.

Dr. R. L. Miller, University of Kentucky Agriculture Extension Service entomologist.
 "First," he says, farmers should destroy old plants in plant beds used this crop and sources of insect infestation from flea beetles, aphids, tobacco cutworms, budworms and hornworms.

If this plant bed got a soil-insecticide last year, it will not need one this fall or even next spring. Soil insecticides stay quite a while in the soil.
 However, if a new plant bed site is to be used next year, a soil insecticide now is definitely recommended.

It is needed particularly if soil is to be broken for this plant bed site. June beetle larvae live in soil, as do other insects such as wire-worms. They can and will attack plant beds as early as spring. The insecticides will be evenly distributed throughout this top earthen layer; insects will have longer time to come in contact with the material.

Applying a soil insecticide and then plowing soybeans (or some other cover crop) is quite safe, Miller says. The cover crop will not lessen effectiveness of the insecticide nor will it be necessary to apply more soil insecticide next year.
 Extension Publication Misc. 251-A, "1963 Insecticide Recommendations for Tobacco Beds," lists pertinent information on fall treatment of beds. Materials recommended are either Aldrin, Heptachlor or Dieldrin, liquid or granules. The chart is available at county agents' offices.

Corn Earworms Becoming Problem
 Home and commercial gardeners may be fighting the corn earworm moth, says R. L. Miller, University of Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service entomologist.
 "The corn earworm, a greenish colored caterpillar, develops from eggs that were laid on the corn silk by the female corn earworm moth.
 As soon as silks appear on sweet corn, apply Sevin (50 percent strength wettable powder), at the rate of two level tablespoons in a gallon of water. It will take about one gallon of spray mixture for each 100 feet row. First application should be no later than two days after the silks have appeared. Apply another application two to three days after the first, and a third application two to three days after the second.
 Use one of these: Two pounds actual per acre of 3-DT emulsifiable concentrate; or one and one-half pounds actual material an acre of Sevin (50 percent strength powder) in 25 gallons of water an acre. Use high clearance sprayers, having four nozzles per row. Direct the spray at the ears.
 If DDT is used, fodder or forage from this crop can NOT be used as feed for dairy animals, or animals being finished for slaughter. If Sevin is used, wait 7 days after spraying before feeding the crop as feed or fodder to cattle.

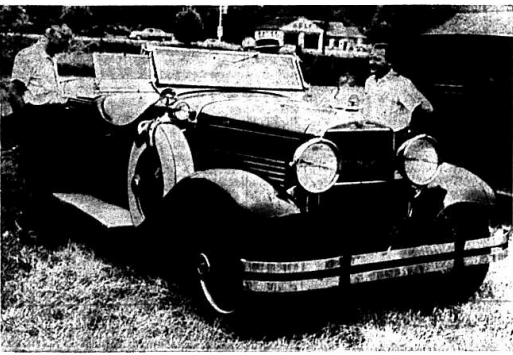

An appropriation for a new Rockcastle County courthouse-jail at Mt. Vernon will come before the Public Works Committee of the Board of Commissioners within the next 10 days.

This was learned Wednesday when Circuit Judge R. C. Tartar and County Judge C. Carter visited the Office of the Accelerated Public Works Program at Washington, D. C.

Also sitting in on the discussion was Sen. John Sherman Cooper, a member of the committee.

Johannes Heeber, director of the program, told the group the application for the courthouse-jail had been thoroughly reviewed and found to meet all requirements.

Heeber told the visitors that the plans for projects other than sewer and water facilities are limited, the courthouse application has a favorable position and he hoped it would be possible for the Public Works Committee to approve it.

During the discussion, Judge Carter gave Heeber photographs of the courthouse showing the need for a new building.

Heeber expressed his delight that a group had found time to visit the office for a friendly conference. He said most visitors came to register complaints.

Johnnie W. Adams, administrator, would not say what he believed the committee would do, it is generally believed a recommendation of the application by the head of the bureau would carry considerable weight with the committee.

As planned, the courthouse is expected to cost about \$400,000 with the government granting the county \$232,000 with "no strings attached." The county would have to provide the balance through revenue bonds.

The county plans to ask voters to "approve" about \$150,000 in general obligation bonds to replace the revenue bonds at the November election. General obligation bonds would cost property owners about 15 cents on the \$100 evaluation.

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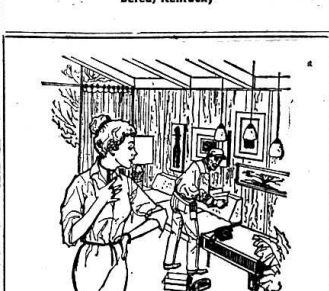
